Hospital, east side of San José Avenue between Twenty-seventh and Twenty-eighth Streets, and near the terminus of the Market and Valencia streets Railroad.

ST. MARY'S BENEVOLENT AND LIBRARY ASSOCIATION.—Organized 1867. Regular meetings first and third Sundays of each month. Number of members, sixty. This association has been organized for the purpose of protecting the Catholic working man against the moral and social evils usually attendant upon a life of arduous and precarious labor. A large reading room has been fitted up for the accommodation of the society in the basement of St. Mary's Cathedral. It has a carefully selected library, numbering at present over one thousand five hundred volumes, consisting of all the Catholic works published in America, to which will soon be added those of Irish and English publishers. There is also a good collection of other useful and instructive works.
