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## STATISTICAL REVIEW

Form of Government—City Council, City Manager.

Population—30,693. Metropolitan area, 60,300.

Area—11,126 square miles or 7,121.57 acres.

Altitude—167 feet.

Native born population—91 per cent.

Parks—12, containing 420 acres.

Financial—9 banks.

Post Office Receipts, 1959—\$809,318.21.

Telephones in service—28,450.

Building permits for 1959—Number of permits 1,240—\$8,905,123.00.

There are 45,000 volumes in the Carnegie Public Library.

City Statistics—Police department has 34 men on force; fire department has 38 men on force.

Street Mileage—114.5 miles (June 30, 1960).

Junior College—Nine modern and well equipped buildings have been erected on the 53-acre campus. These include three class room buildings, science, liberal arts, commerce and home economics, a large theatre with separate wings for music and dramatics, a library building which includes reading, stack and a listening room, new administration and business education buildings, a shop and mechanics building with separate museum wing, and two large gymnasiums, one for men and one for women, which have complete facilities for all types of athletics. A new student center was built during 1953 which includes a new cafeteria. Other athletic facilities include football field, a clay track, 8 tennis courts, a baseball diamond, a hockey field and 1 putting green.

Graduates are accredited to all universities by virtue of its high scholastic rating. In addition, a nursing school was added in 1948—set up for nursing and psychology students, as well as an aid to veterans. There is a veteran's village adjoining the campus, accommodating 48 families, plus a large dormitory which accommodates 100 male students. Eight temporary barrack buildings are used as classrooms.
