



FOREWORD




If the nations of the world lived as peacefully, as coöperatively, as happily as we here at Berkeley High have been living, a World Conference would not now be in session.

The High Seniors can well be proud of the leadership which they have taken in living up to the recognized rules of authority and living and working together in a friendly atmosphere.






STUDENT GOVERNMENT




shown great enthusiasm. Your Red Cross contribution topped all previous drives by a great margin.

Every girl in the school being a member is proportionately responsible for the acts of friendship and deeds of service which the association renders.

The beginning of our friendship program this year was a Freshman Reception held in the Little Theatre, where all new girls were welcomed and provided with entertainment and refreshments. A busy group during the first weeks of each term is the Senior Friends, this year under the able leadership of Martha Curtis. Each girl in this group gave much of her time in making newcomers feel at home.

The services rendered by the Girls' Association are varied and far reaching. An appeal was made to our G.A. Council, composed of one representative from each Home Room, for dresses to be collected and distributed to needy children by the Needle Work Guild.

On Spring Day, the G.A. and Senior Friends sponsored a booth for selling cokes and doughnuts. Proceeds were divided among several organizations.





In terms to come we all hope to see the Honor Society grow in both size and importance here at Berkeley High School.







It is hard to imagine a spring term without an operetta and yet there wouldn't be one if there





The swimming team is well on the way to their fourth North Coast title, under the able hand of


Coach Frank Gross, having been defeated only once by the powerful San Francisco Olympic Club.


The female athletic activities were confined to their own gym classes. Nevertheless, Berkeley High is still producing the healthiest and most beautiful girls in the state.

Since the "B's" received no credit during the season, the POD Staff would like to take this space to commend them for their fine work.


Paced by "Billy" Martin, veteran forward, who broke the ACAL seasonal scoring record, the Jackets

The Berkeley High School Cadet Corps has another successful semester to add to its record of training young men for our country's armed forces.






SWIM




Last year the Yellowjackets won the Alameda County Swim Title and the North Coast Title. This year Berkeley High is the strongest contender for both titles.
