
Because Emery is small we have many privileges and school events that will always stay in our memories as the wonderful incidents that made life at Emery really tops.



Commercial classes were practicing shorthand.


A Junior High class in Geography was having a quiz contest about Germany.









Duties of the Block "E" are to keep general order around the school grounds and during assemblies, and also to exemplify sportsmanship to other students.


A yearly social event is the Block "E" picnic, held in conjunction with the G.A.A. A movie is usually sponsored by the boys as a money-making activity.








