

"The best rooting section in the OAL," was the aim of the yell leaders. Everyone at Fremont agrees that Jim Johnson and his


assistants, Rhea Dunn, Ruthie Ruskofsky, Don Tafjen, and Bruce Wilson accomplished their goal.




We enjoyed the good food and good talk at our senior dinner. We listened to the past, present, and future of our class being revealed.

A desperation pass by Mack in the last minute and a half of play, made the Kittens' first OAL tilt a 6-6 tie.

Fremont received its only defeat of the season at the hands of the Oakland Wildcat Bees. Oakland scored in the last three minutes of the game, making the score 6-0.

Taking their first win of the season, the Bengals trounced San Leandro, 30-6, on the Pirates' home gridiron.

A previously unbeaten Technical Bee team fell to Fremont 12-6, and the Tigers boosted their standing to a two win, one tie, and one loss position.

In the last game of the season, the Green and Gold took a 6-2 decision over the Junior Knights of Castlemont and ended the season in a tie for first place.

Edwards, proving to be a valuable player, was enrolled on the varsity squad in the last two tilts and was unable to play with the Pussycats in the Technical and Castlemont games.

Other valuable men on the team were: Quarterback Paiva, Halfbacks Larsen and Deane, End Cordes and Guard Vargas.

Tigers Dump Tech, 14-6

Bengals Jinx Knights, 13-0

• Winning two games of the season's eight scheduled tilts, the injury-ridden Tiger eleven took fourth place in the OAL flag race with a .400 average and a total of 34 points to their opponents' 139.

Aided by three Tiger injuries and a strong wind at their backs, the Alameda Hornets swamped Fremont with a 47-0 score in the Bengals' first game of the season.

The Green and Gold lost its second encounter to a strong San Mateo team. Fremont, outclassed in the second half, was defeated 12-0.


A pass from Ray Ironsides to Ben Perry during the Vallejo tilt, gave the Tigers their first TD of the season, although it was to no avail, as the final score was 34-7, with Fremont on the small end.



In their first OAL game, Fremont lost a hard-fought battle 8-0, on the McClymonds' gridiron at Filbert Street.

Losing the next two encounters to Oakland, 14-0, and San Leandro, 7-0, co-champions for the '48 season, Fremont stood a winless ball club in the cellar.

Fourteen to six was the score in favor of the Green and Gold as they dumped the Technical Bulldogs.

Outclassing their rivals in both the first and second halves and ending the 1948 football season in a blaze of glory, the Tiger eleven managed to turn the tables by defeating the Castlemont Knights 13-0 after an eleven-year jinx. This game, it might be added, is the only game in which the opposing team ended with a goose egg.





• For the first time in OAL history, Fremont had two girl yell leaders along with the other assistants. Much credit is deserved by Jim Johnson, '48 head yell leader, and his assistants, Rhea Dunn, Ruthie Ruskofsky, Don Tafjen and Bruce Wilson.


Handling the guard posts were Glen Ashcraft, Ron Tomsic, Gil Perry and Ron Holm.






