

BANKING CLUB


Headed by Mrs. E. Logan, the Banking department won the silver cup for the highest record in the city for the second consecutive time. If won again, the trophy will belong to the school.






The rifle team, consisting of fifteen members, was entered in the interscholastic meet and was coached by Sergeant Feliciano.

The drill platoon will enter into Civic Auditorium competition this year, determined to improve the showing made last year and to bring home a cup.


A new activity this term was the Saber Club, under the leadership of Capt. Herman Stirnus. The faculty sponsor is Mr. W. Wieland.

Varsity Team





130 Basketball



John Spargo was spiked in the first lap of the 880, but kept courageously on to finish a very good fifth, right on the heels of the leaders. Leo Leggett became city champion in the 130 pound 100 yard dash, winning in the fast time of 10.6. 
