

They Also Serve

"It can't happen here" . . . It HAS happened here! Now, we the students of today, must be prepared to face the worst. We must be prepared to face disaster when and if it strikes. In the event of disaster all Red Cross activities will center in George Washington High School for this area. Symbolizing the important part the school will play in the darker, as well as the brighter hours, of community life, is a sign at the central entrance:

But the sign alone does not tell the story. Behind the sign are the faculty, the parent teachers' organization and numerous other groups, who, for the present time, are walking behind the banner of the American Red Cross. The call to duty is answered in many ways. Typical of this is the sign on the door of our principal's home, "Air Raid Warden."

Among the services offered at the Sea Cliff Relief Center are rescue, first aid, surgery and medical care, relief, and child care. This relief center is manned by doctors, nurses, social-workers, teachers, and by your neighbors and friends. Among them is one Heavy Rescue Squad, using a rescue truck, manned by a dozen or more well trained men. On each alert signal at least six of these squadsmen respond to each district headquarters. During alerts the rescue truck, conveniently quartered nearby, is always brought to headquarters.

Rescue has also five Light Rescue Squads of at least six men each, equipped with hand tools, axes, shovels, crowbars, handjacks, rope, stretchers, and blankets. The auxiliary ambulance crews take patients to emergency hospitals. There are two First Aid Station Teams, each consisting of at least twenty women trained in advanced First Aid. Only when hospitals can no longer handle the situation will the Disaster Relief Station's medical service be used, in which event the Medical Aid Committee consisting of a large corps of volunteer doctors and registered nurses, well supplied with equipment, surgical dressing, instruments, and so forth, will care for you.

Although disaster may strike it also may leave many people unharmed physically but in need of help. If so, a social service work staff of professional workers and assistants will provide you with clothing, shelter, food and blankets, or any other emergency relief you may be in need of. A Missing Persons Bureau is provided for persons who become separated from their families. Area couriers (ROTC boys) assist in getting information concerning the safety and health of residents of your district for the Welfare Inquiry Department.

Professional and needed lay groups, organizations, schools, and P.-T.A.'s in the district have cooperated to make these units real communal responsibility.

We all know that there is one army which has never admitted defeat. It has been on every battlefield in the world. It is the American Red Cross. They Also Serve.

R.O. T.C.

George Washington students looked at the R.O.T.C. here as a source of high pride and satisfaction to the entire Student Body during the Spring term of the war year 1942. The students did not have to look far for evidences of major successes in two different fields of military endeavor.

The winning of the coveted second prize in the National Rifle Championship matches in competition with units throughout the United States brought joy to every man in the organization. The victory reflected the training of Sergeant Ferdinand Feliciano, in charge of the Washington Battalion, himself an expert rifleman for many years.

Appointment of Colonel Robert Jakob as regimental commander of the R.O.T.C. cadets in this area was in itself a highlight of this term's activities.

The R.O.T.C. Rifle Team is basking in glory this spring after breaking all previous records in the Ninth Corps Area, and winning over all high schools in nine western states. After this triumph the team placed second in the entire nation, and broke records as being the school to win both the Ninth Corps Championship and place so high in the National standings. Cadet Lt. Col. Louis North, commander of the George Washington Battalion, heads the list of "hot-shots" after being awarded a fine gold watch as the highest individual marksman in the San Francisco high schools. Following by only one point Albert Malouf is next in line, with Bill Childers, Gail Mountford, James Harvill, Ed Blair, David Haskell, Robert Kincaid, Albert Kipnis, Myran Close, Alan Regan, Ed Hoffman, Al Tuckey, Bill Van Steenburg, and Donald McDermott completing the championship team. Cadet Kincaid is now a member of the tank corps in the regular army.

The Hearst Trophy Match was fired by the first five members of the team and third place medals were presented to these highest marksmen.

Actual award of the Hearst Trophy occurred on a day long to be remembered by the Cadets at Washington High. The sun shone down on the North Court upon the

entire battalion and the members of the rifle team lined up before Principal Cummings who presented engraved medals to Louis North, Albert Malouf, James Harvill, Gail Mountford, and William Childers.

Mr. John Stalker, representative of the San Francisco Call-Bulletin, presented the trophy to Louis North, captain of the rifle team, who received it for the R.O.T.C. and student body. The plaque was engraved as follows: William Randolph Hearst National R.O.T.C. Rifle Match—Won by: George Washington Team No. 1, San Francisco, Calif., High Schools—9th Corps Area—Third Place 1942. The plaque was also engraved with the names of the members of the team. It will hang in the trophy case of the school, a reminder to future generations of marksmen that they must aim high if they are to maintain the standard set by the present generation.

More important than the Hearst Trophy award was the National R.O.T.C. High School Championships in which Washington won second place. Out of all the high schools of the entire United States and its territories, the Washington Rifle Team took second place, an achievement attained only once before in the Ninth Corps Area.

On June 10, in the Kezar Stadium, Superintendent of Schools Joseph P. Nourse presented to the members of the rifle team all the medals and trophies won by them during the term. This ceremony, one of the largest held this year by the cadets of the R.O.T.C., was the official ending of a very successful year of training for the future soldiers of the United States.

All the credit for building up this championship rifle team and coaching them to victories goes to Sergeant Feliciano who instructed the marksmen in all the four stages of rifle firing—prone, sitting, kneeling, and standing, or off-hand positions.

At a banquet given for the members of the rifle team by Major Rudolph Scholz, in charge of this regiment of R.O.T.C. cadets and instructors, Corps Area championship medals were pinned on the riflemen. A cup, engraved with the names of the members of the rifle team, was presented to Sergeant Feliciano by the team in appreciation of his leadership, without which no trophies could have been won.

Instruction in marksmanship was given to one-hundred Army Nurses and an additional hundred members of the Women's Auxiliary Ambulance Corps by the R.O.T.C. rifle team, in accordance with National Defense requirements.

At a review of all R.O.T.C. units in San Francisco, Cadet Colonel Robert



Cadets Earn

Jakob received the official flag of the city from Mayor Angelo J. Rossi, in honor of the Washington Cadets and the championship rifle team. Lieut. Col. Thomas G. Bond, P.M.S.&T., arranged the ceremony. Three other downtown parades have been held this term, two of which have been held on Sunday holidays.

Air-raid duty was the first war-time innovation for all cadets. The need for the rapid clearance of the building of home-going students and the direction of those staying was answered by the members of the Washington Battalion as posts were assigned and noncommissioned officers placed in charge. 


