
'Fly on You Eagles,' says Mr. Cummings

"Let's get back to fundamentals" is a slogan that we hear on all sides. School publications discuss it. Newspapers complain. Everybody is talking about "fundamentals," all saying different things.


It seems agreed that we have gone away from somewhere and must get back fast. We have found ourselves in an educational desert, so to speak, and must, like the cowboys, slap leather home to camp.

But the word "fundamentals" comes from a Latin word meaning foundation. So the picture is more properly that of a building than one of a desert camp. A building must have a foundation. The educational building has to have "fundamentals," but the foundation is useless without the structure on top.

Our critics tell us that the boys who go to war haven't learned enough at school or haven't learned the right things. This, we are told, would not have happened if all the schools had taught "fundamentals"

instead of what some of them are teaching.

But records and reports of George Washington boys in the Armed Services and of George Washington boys and girls in civilian life don't support this contention. True, our graduates do write back to urge us to study harder and to get more of this and more of that, but they don't say anything about giving up what we have for the so called basic simplicities.

Let's get back to fundamentals" is only a half-truth. Life leads upwards, school life included. Soldiers who hide in the Cassino caves won't win the war. That's why we must never forget another better, more personal, more familiar slogan:


The senior-soph reception and Hello Day, received wholehearted support from the students and thoroughly accomplished the task of getting newcomers acquainted.

A terrific upset and a long-awaited victory came in our win over the highly-favored St. Ignatians by a 26-17 score in the fourth game.


The next game was with Galileo, and proved to be a disappointment as Washington suffered a 25-15 defeat.





Washington took the measure of Balboa, their seventh opponent, in a smooth game by a 39 to 30 margin.


Finding little opposition from Commerce, the '30's went on where the football team left off and handed the Bulldogs a clean 26-18 defeat.







From across the seas, from every fighting front, there comes a cry which echoes and re-echoes in the hearts of Washington's students. It is a cry for men . . . men with experience . . . men with the initiative and intelligence so necessary in the successful prosecution of this war. Washington, with her Service List of over five hundred servicemen, is doing more than her share in preparing America's youth for the great task ahead of them.

Paramount in the training program here at Hilltop High is the Reserve Officers' Training Corps, or R.O. T. C. The corps, under the supervision of Sgt. Ryan and Sgt. Hackley, has its primary objective the training of over three hundred and fifty cadets in the rudiments of combat and other subjects met in regular army life. The R.O.T.C. has a two-fold program consisting of practical drill and of theory. The former is taken four out of the five days and consists of close-order drill,

extended-drill, and physical-drill. The latter involves practical knowledge of the armed forces.

Washington's battalion consists of four companies, A, B, C, and D, and is a part of the regiment. The fall term of 1943 saw a very active battalion under the direction of Lieut. Col. Tom Hall. The regimental commander was also a Washington cadet, Col. Harold Polonsky. Completing the "Big Three" was Major Herbert Mandler. The company commanders were as follows: Co. A, Cadet Capt. Fred Alberts; Co. B, Cadet Capt. Donald Devlin; Co. C, Cadet Capt. Edward Eassa; Co. D, Cadet Capt. William Moore. This term's battalion is under the direction of Lieut. Col. Charles Haller, and Col. Donald Devlin is commander of the San Francisco Brigade. Major Edward Eassa is second-in-command of the battalion. 




