


Sending Eagles to the servicemen was the Low Junior project for this class. The same year they edited their own class newspaper, The Inkspot.


Senior Day Spring 1957


Lincoln was just too big and too strong for us. Tom Wishom, Lester Eng and Joe Olds played fine defensive games.




112's

Track Season






The eight sports that were opened to the girls this year were: volleyball, ice skating, basketball, tennis, bowling, swimming, modern dance, and badminton.
