



This time we met a tougher Lowell, but had to settle for a 0-0 tie after two overtime periods.







Although the Varsity trackmen got off to a slow start at the onset of the 1962 season, they have picked themselves up and are forging ahead with speed and determination.




With such a fine record already under their belts, the Eagles are expected to maintain their strength for the entire season.
