## PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE




# *Classes*

# CLASS HISTORY

A phase of history is like a drop of water, but history itself is a great river. And what the drop of water is to the great volume of the river, the story of our class is to the volume of history. But when a drop of water is studied under the microscope of the scientist, it reveals a fascinating story. "Why, then," we asked ourselves, "shouldn't we study our class under the magnifying glass of affection and common interest and see what might be revealed?"

After making enormous allowances for the personal equation, we discovered that our class has reached a rather high mark.

We entered Lowell in August, 1937, a heterogeneous group of youngsters, eager yet shy, curious yet modest, only a drop in the stream of American life, yet a very important drop. Four years ago, we were entering upon new activities that produced new confusions and necessitated new adjustments. Today, we are leaving the familiar scenes of these activities to enter upon new and different ones. Old Man River goes rolling along carrying the little drop with him.

Four years ago, we were astonished by the swarms of our fellow classmen, and impressed by the legions of upperclassmen, their imposing statures and independent airs. However, before we realized what was taking place, we were all working and laughing and playing together so democratically that we soon ceased to feel like outsiders breaking in, and began to feel that we were an integral part of the school. Soon, we were rooting our teams on to victory with all the vim and vigor that have made Lowell spirit famous.

Thanks to Mr. Stephens, the vice-principals, and the faculty, we were gently inducted into the strain of the curricular subjects, the relaxation of the extra-curricular clubs, and the excitement of the Freshman Reception.

During this time, were we concerned with the undeclared war that was raging in China or the civil war that was tearing Spain asunder? Hardly. We were only youngsters intent on our own little rallies and games and report cards and cut slips, and widely removed from the great currents of world affairs. In short, we were isolationists.

Even in 1938, when we became sophomores and absorbed the junior high school tributaries; when we had the opportunity to give school service, to help in the library, the offices, and the cafeteria; when we became members of the California Scholarship Federation, or wearers of the Block L; we didn't give much thought to our fellowmen on distant shores. Hadn't we enough to do to get on the honor roll and the bandwagon, to swing class elections and to build our own new gymnasium? Because we were engrossed in high school life, the fact

that the smaller countries of Europe were being devoured by the German monster, and the fact that the river of history was becoming red with blood meant little to us.

In the summer of 1939, we entered our junior year, and we were confronted by the problem of choosing our subjects and arranging our own programs. It certainly seemed a problem; nevertheless, it was a symbol of our budding independence. We also chose class officers, who, with the help of the dance committee, presented the low junior dance. Our importance in every aspect of school life increased from term to term, and some of us, as a result of leadership in various activities, gained membership in the service societies. Those of our class who had special talents were prominent in such phases of Lowell life as debating, journalism, and dramatics. Yes, our junior year was a memorable one. We were neither beginning nor ending; we felt ourselves the center, the nucleus of Lowell life. It was a glorious year! As it drew to a close, the rest of the civilized world burst into flame—but we were about to become seniors.

In the past year, we have been leaders in every phase of Lowell life, in athletics, in scholarship, in student body affairs, and in all of the activities in which we had been participating. However, when we were measured for our caps and gowns, we realized that graduation was upon us. Graduation? What did that mean? It not only meant that our high school life was ending, but also that a new life was beginning. We were about to be ushered from the sheltering walls of Lowell into—what?

We are appalled by the prospect. Under normal conditions, this class would have much to which it could look forward. But during our late school years, the whole world has been shrinking. Not only millions of inoffensive people have been conquered, but time and space have been conquered, too. Planes daily fly back and forth across the Atlantic Ocean, across the Pacific Ocean, and what we used to think were impassable barriers are now only short hops. While we have been placidly and, let us hope, effectively studying Latin and French and Geometry, the most cruel dictator the world has ever seen has been liquidating the democracies, one by one. "Divide and rule," the old Roman technique, is his "new order."

An early plan of his provides for destroying our beloved democracy through the internal dissensions that his agents will foment here. Hence, our peace-loving United States has, like the rest of the free world, been forced to think and act in terms of war. America is calling upon all of its loyal citizens to unite in keeping our blessed country democratic, and a happy place, in which its citizens, regardless of race or religion, can live.

This class, which four years ago gawked about the halls of Lowell, has reached the age at which youth in other countries are seeking ways to serve their people. We realize that the earth is a small place, in spite of big talk. Since no man and no nation can stand alone, what affects other people affects us. As Herbert Spencer once said, "No one can be perfectly free till all are free; no one can be perfectly moral till all are moral; no one can be perfectly happy till all are happy." And so, we close the pleasant story of the past four years and reach out to turn the first page of the future with regret, but with confidence and hope and with the Lowell spirit that will live forever in the minds and hearts of every one of us.



# SENIOR MEMORIES

Thirty-two members of the H3 class belonged to the California Scholarship Federation.










# *Activities*


Don Brush as Bunny, the male lead, won top honors in portraying this clever, eccentric, young traveler obsessed with a foggy background.


Sports



Paced by such outstanding players as Bob Cherry, big junior forward; Billy Kotta, slim senior forward; gangling Center Bob Arnold; Court Porter and Bob Troppmann, two steady guards; ably supported by Coleman, Lew, and Cooke; Lowell's varsity eaglers, although fighting every second of play, experienced a "hot and cold" season. Benny Neff's hoop-men had a final A.A.A. standing of five wins and three defeats. But what the '41 squad lost in prestige it gained in experience and showed Coach Ben Neff enough to warrant high hopes for next season.

The Card quintet opened up with a bang and eked out a 21-20 victory over the Commerce Bulldogs in prepdom's opener on the Kezar hardwoods, Tuesday, January 7. With only a few minutes left of play the Bulldogs were leading 20-18.

Cherry then whipped a pass to Center Arnold who pivoted on the foul line and counted a hook shot to tie the struggle 20-20. But the frigid little fellow who decided the contest was Bill Kotta, diminutive forward, who coolly meshed in a free toss with forty seconds of the game remaining. On two different occasions after Kotta's tank, a Commerce man went up to the foul line, but each try was muffed. High point honors went to Arnold, who rang up six digits, and to Cherry, Kotta, and Lew, with five points apiece.

On January 14 the Injuns took Sacred Heart to the cleaners although it looked dubious at the outset of the third quarter with Lowell trailing 12-8. It was then that Oriental magic worked wonders before thousands of bewildered fans. Tom Lew, the five foot four Houdini, rang the bell for eleven straight points before the period ended. Shooting with unerring aim and faking towering opponents out of position, he put Lowell definitely on top 22-14, with neither opponents nor teammates scoring during his one-man-revolution.

During the quarter, Tom unwound six floor shots, registered five of them, and dropped in a charity toss to boot. The remaining portion of the game was uneventful although Lew garnered three more points to cinch high point honors with fourteen. Lowell won the game 27-20.

Galileo next fell before the Injun's ax to the tune of 36-15. Coach Neff used three complete teams which all but smothered the hapless Lions. Jerry Coleman, a junior guard, sparked the team to a 12-4 lead at the quarter. Lowell's first string went into action and swished ten straight points. At the third quarter, the Card seconds went in again with Charlie Cooke doing most of the shooting. Every one but Neff himself played during the last period as the Lion five was litterly swept off the court. Southpaw tanker Bill Newman accounted for three buckets. Jerry Coleman captured high point honors with eight tallies.

The Cards scored their fourth straight win by snatching a 25-24 thriller away from Balboa on January 29. The Balboa Bucs, fighting to remain in the title race, out-scored the Indians in floor shots, but the locals sank eight out of nine free throws to go staggering through to nip Balboa in the last minute. Balboa led at the half 11-10 but the Injuns got hot and accumulated a 20-16 lead. Then Balboa cut the margin to 23-22. Jerry Coleman came into the game and dribbled into the forecourt counting a one-hander from just outside the foul line. Lowell won 25-24. Injuns Cherry and Arnold led the scoring with six points with Porter closely trailing with five.

Next the Cardinals suffered a heart-breaking loss when Poly took them into camp 21-18 at Kezar on February 6. The Injuns fought hard not to lose their first place rating, but all in vain. 
On the cinders and fields of Kezar Stadium, May 10, the Lowell High varsity track team lost its prep crown to the Balboa High Bucs after a two year reign. The Buccaneers rolled up a total of 47 points while the Indians could gather but 33. However, they were figured by the dopesters to finish much closer to the first place money. Following the Bucs and the Cards in the triple "A" meet were Commerce with 25 points, Mission 17½, Poly 10, Washington 5, Abraham Lincoln 3½, and St. Ignatius with 2.

In the opening event, the mile run, the Balboa star and captain, Tony Piazza, got off to a flying start by winning the event handily in the record shattering time of 4:29.6, erasing the year old mark of 4:31 set by Lowell's great runner, Gene Clark. Piazza, along with the Cardinals' captain and ace sprinter, Ben Silva, were the only double winners of the meet; Piazza fought off the brave challenge of the Injuns' Phil Arnot to win the 880 also in the record-equaling time of 2:00.6, held by University of California's wonder, Grover Klemmer.

The Lowell cinderlemen garnered their points in the following manner: Vazkin Tashin earned three as he crossed the finish line second in the mile run; Captain Ben Silva copped a first and five points as he breasted the tape in front of his arch rival, Rene Del Carlo of Mission; Jim Sheppard tied for second in the 440 which gave Lowell 2½ more digits on the scoreboard; 3 more were gained as Ed Rogers and John Hardgrave captured third and fourth, respectively, in the 120-yard high sticks; Silva won his second race of the day as he sped down the 220-yard straight-away in the blazing time of :22.3; Sim grabbed a fourth in the 220 low hurdles; Phil Arnot took a second in the 880; and the three-quarter mile relay team composed of Jim Sheppard, Bob Hermansen, Art Kittlemen, Don Freethy, Don Yasinsky, and Ben Silva finished fourth. Lowell had her difficulties in the field events, not placing a man in either shot put or high jump. If they had



Co-Captain John Fonaas for the second consecutive year captured the discus throw, slinging the platter 126 feet, the exact distance that he won the event in the 1940 meet. Bill Sheridan tied for second in the pole vault with a vault of 10 feet, 6 inches, and Silva's leap of 21' 2 1/2" was good for third in the broad jump.

This season Coach Elmer Harris scheduled for his athletes a fine amount of dual meets, but unfortunately all but four were cancelled because of rain. In the opener against Richmond, the Injuns continued their remarkable record of not having lost a track meet for 2 1/2 years with a decisive win. Roberts' Stadium was the scene of action between our squad and that representing the San Francisco junior varsity, the Cards walking away with a 71-51 victory. Poly was next to bite the dust as they could offer no resistance to the overwhelming 91-24 score. The Sacramento Dragons, champions of the inter-valley league, finally ended the Cards' winning streak by a close 58-53 encounter. With but the final relay remaining and the Sacs leading by one point, the Indians really felt a tough blow as the baton was dropped after the Indians had built themselves a substantial lead in this deciding event.

With only three point winners, Fonaas, Silva, and Tashin leaving, the Lowell squad should have an excellent chance of regaining the heavyweight throne next year. Such men as Phil Arnot, who off his 2:01 race in the 880 this year, should have an excellent chance of breaking the city record in next year's meet, John Hardgrave, Bob Carlson, Jim Sheppard, Ed Rogers, and Bob Sim should bring the title back to the old red brick building on Hayes and Masonic.

In the year's track finale, the Lowell lightweight squad, composed of 110, 120, and 130-pound divisions, lost by a close 43 to 40 to the winning Poly team. Following in team scores were Commerce with 34, Balboa 22, Sacred Heart 16, Mission 13, Washington 11, Lincoln 9, St. Ignatius 5, and Galileo 5.

In the 130-pound class, Al Dean took a third place in the 100-yard dash, and Ernie Greenebaum grabbed a fourth in the 220, and Dick Hirschfield ran a good third in the 440-yard run. George Poulo's toss of 48 feet 3 $\frac{1}{4}$  inches in the eight-pound shotput was good for a second place; Joe Nowack had a leap of 19 feet 7 $\frac{1}{4}$  inches which took fourth spot in the broad jump, and the 880-yard relay team of Al Dean, Jack Keefe, Burleigh Burshem, and Ernie Greenbaum ran in third position.


# TENNIS


# V A R S I T Y   S W I M M I N G


## LIGHTWEIGHT SWIMMING


## VARSITY CREW
