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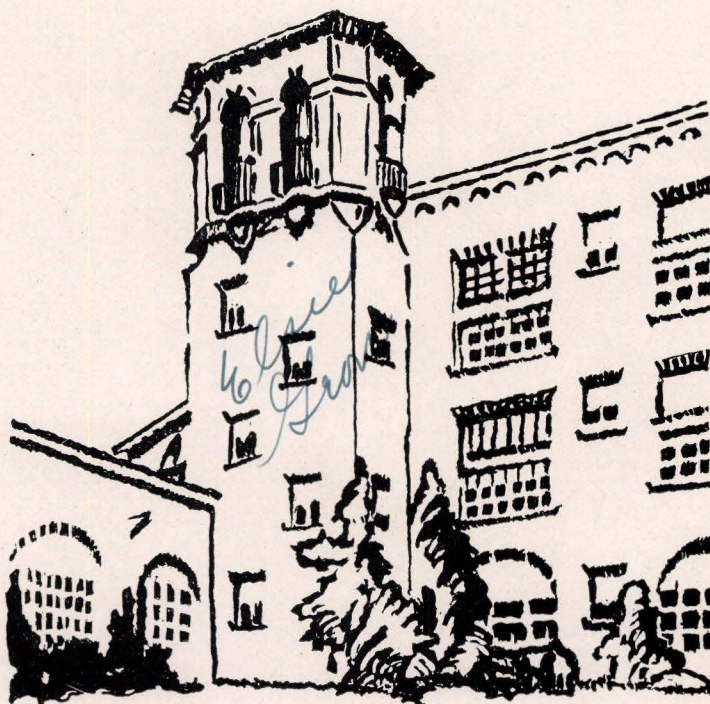
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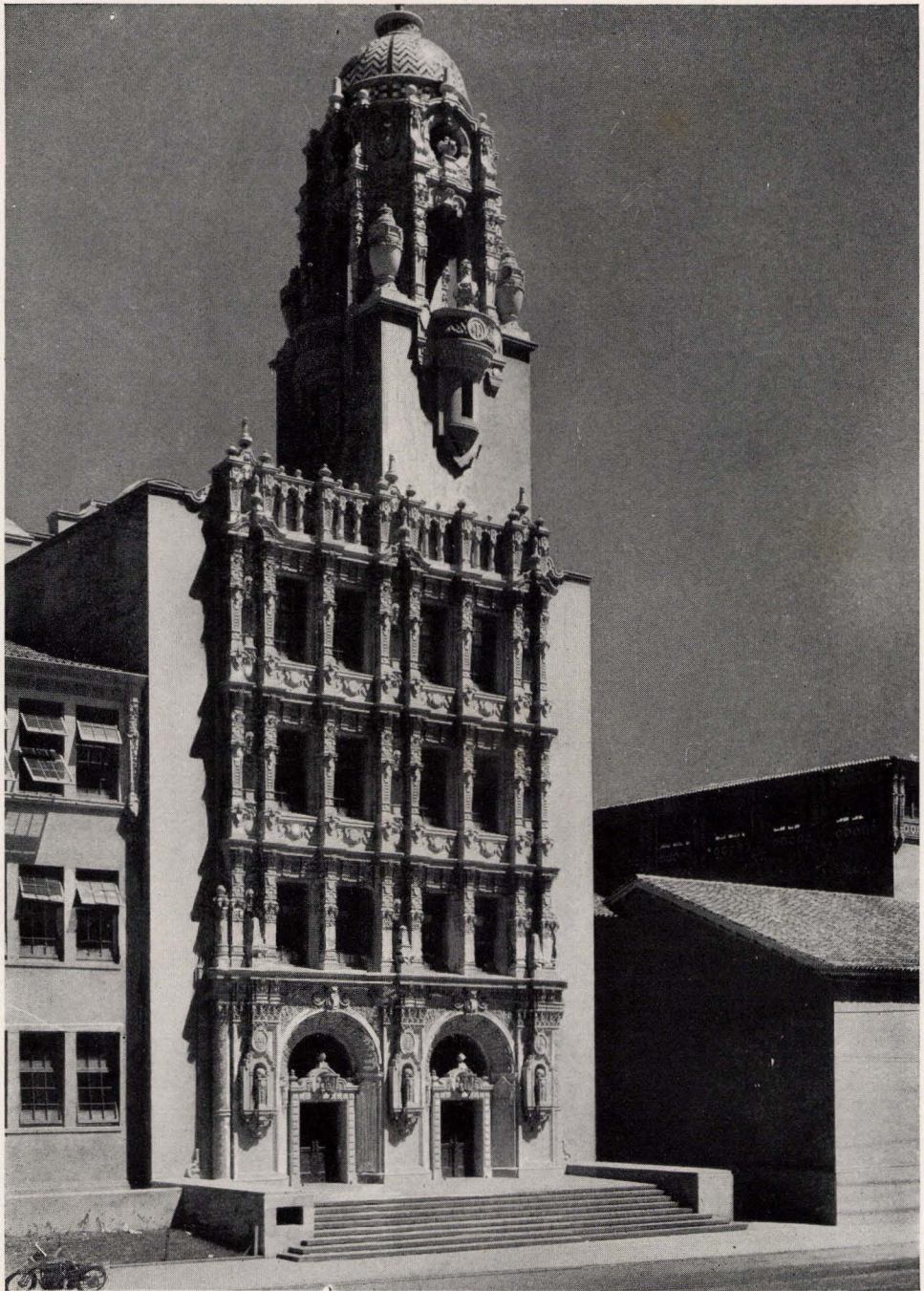

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OUR SCHOOL

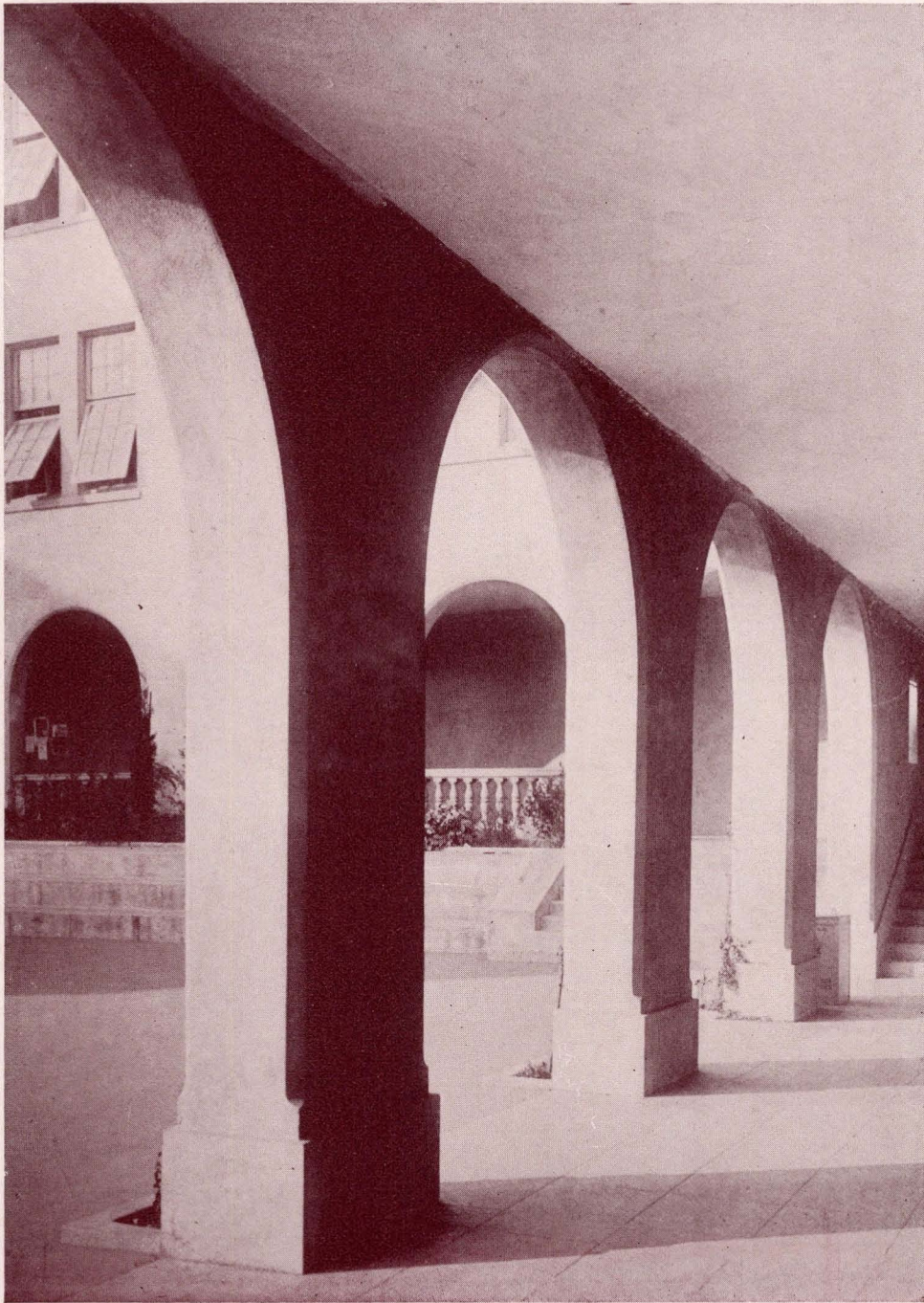

THE "Goose Hangs High," by Lewis Beach, proved to be one of the most charming of the modern plays presented by Mission High School students. The committee in charge of the production included:

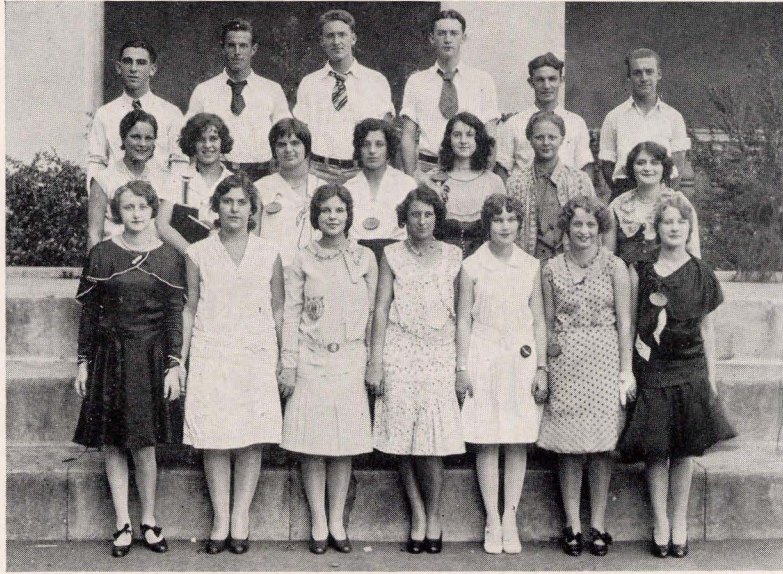

It is hoped that in the near future the orchestra will participate in a musical festival.

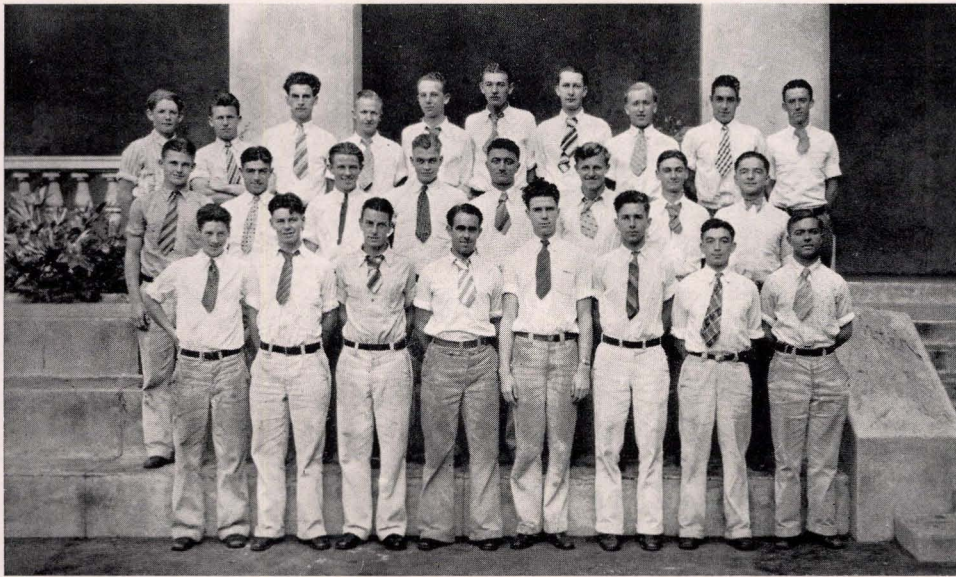


Debating

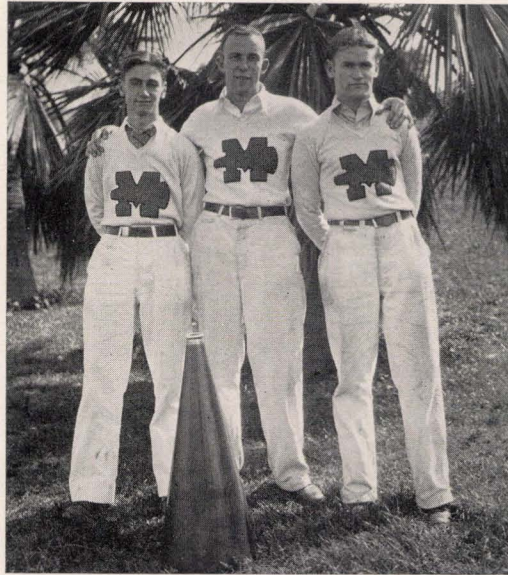

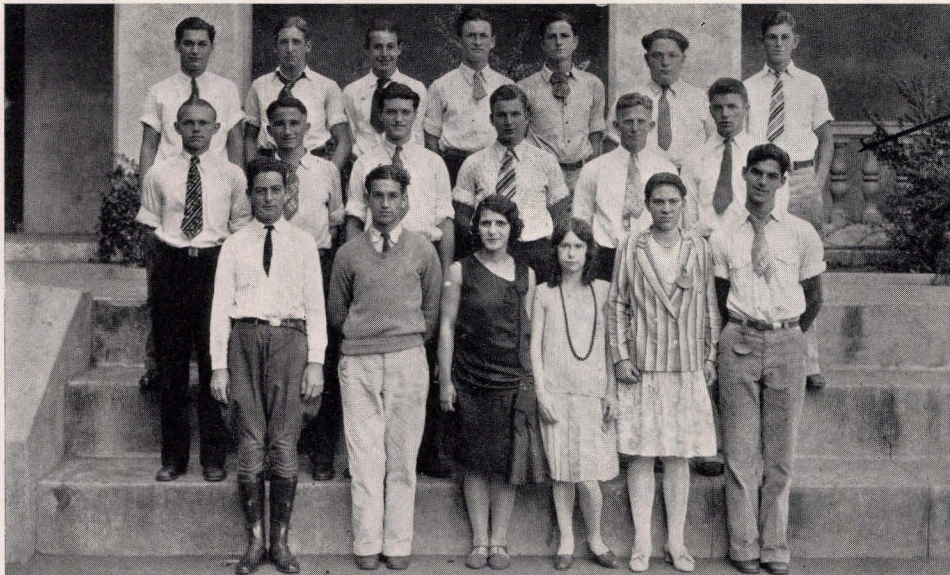

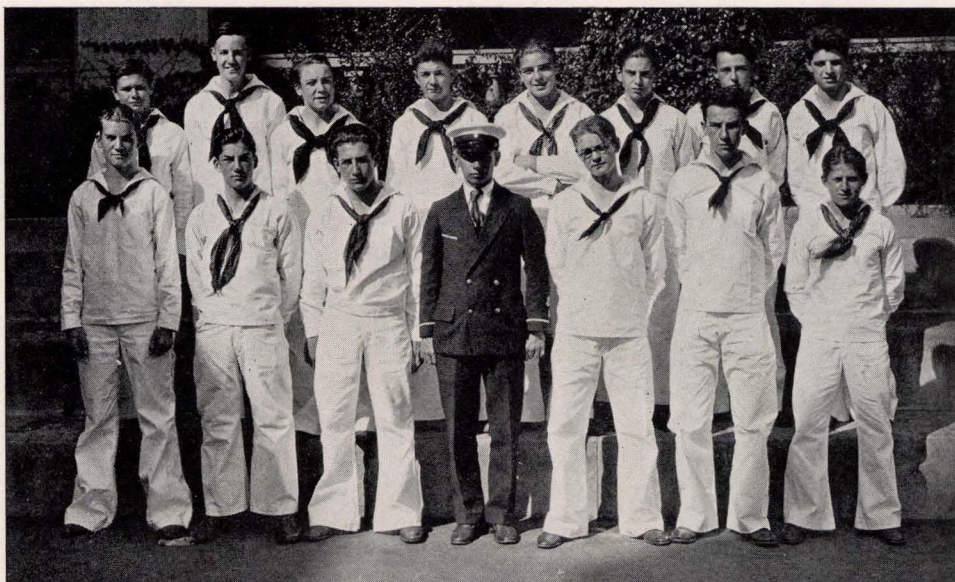

The Columbus Day Regatta and Navy Day races, as well as the San Francisco News Regatta on November 16 are other events in which the Mission unit participated.

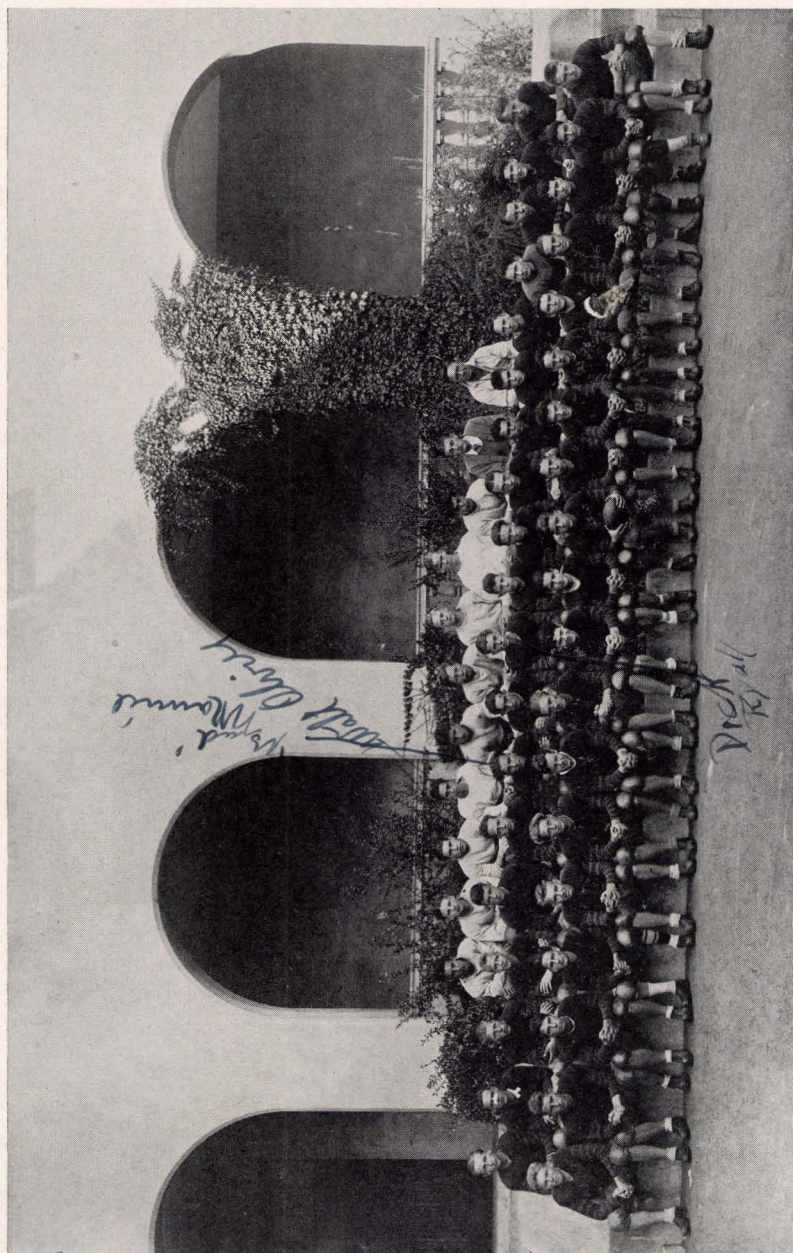

FIVE letter men and many good substitutes from last year's team formed the nucleus of Coach Elder's machinery which has only one default, Piedmont's 26 to 6 beating.

After trouncing Petaluma 38-7, and Fremont 25-0 in their only pre-season showings, the Mission Bears had the honor of officially opening the A. A. A. football season for 1929 with Cogswell at Ewing Field on September 12.

Mission defeated the "Dragons" 25-7, and in doing so the Bear lived up to many of the expectations. Joe Curtin was the outstanding star of the day, making a thrilling 70-yard sprint to a touchdown, on the opening play after the kick-off.

The next game on Mission's schedule was St. Ignatius High on September 20. This was the "Wildcats" first league game, and the "Bears" took advantage of this, handing the "Hayes Street Players" a 13-0 lacing. Captain Jack Baat and Milton Evans scored the touchdowns. In this contest the line showed a marked improvement with Heinbockel and Krohn as stars.

Just before the Lowell-Mission game the dopesters picked the "Cardinals" to beat the "Bears" by at least one touchdown, but instead it was vice-versa. Coach Elder's fighting gridmen downed the 1928 champions, 7-0 at Ewing field, September 28, before 10,000 spectators. "Milt" Evans scored on a center rush and he also converted.

Coach Elder and his players on Friday afternoon, October 4, were the guests of Piedmont "Highlanders" at the latter's field. The "Highlanders" trounced Mission 26 to 6.

Mission's next league game was with Galileo on Friday afternoon, October 11, at Kezar Stadium. A few days before the game Coach "Horse" Chase, of Galileo High School, made a statement that Mission was four touchdowns better than Galileo. Every one took this as a joke (this accounts for his nickname) knowing that Mr. Chase wanted to make the "Bears" over-confident. The game was won by Mission 32-7 and Johnny Kelly and Wisherop were the star linesmen for Mission. The contest was featured by Louie Haas' spectacular open field sprinting.

After beating every A. A. A. eleven that it has met on the gridiron, Mission took on its most important game of the season against Polytechnic High at Ewing Field, Saturday afternoon, October 19, before 17,000 or more witnesses that crowded into the grandstands.

At the end of four quarters of fighting, with Mission out-playing Poly, the "Bears" were held to a six to six deadlock by the "Mechanics". Poly scored first on a 21-yard pass, Sauter to "Toothache" Decia, who stepped two yards to the goal line. Mission was placed in a position to tally by Pete Giras' interception of Sauter's pass on his own 48-yard line. Louie Haas, on the next play, which was a false punt formation, passed the oval eight yards to Jack Baat, who on receiving the pigskin, dodged his tacklers and ran 46 yards to a touchdown.

In their next game-track meet and practice for Mission the "Bears" established an A. A. A. record for the past two seasons, the highest score by trimming Lick-Wilmerding 71-0 at Kezar Stadium, on Saturday morning, October 26.

Playing a steady and fighting game the Mission gridders downed the Sacred Heart Team 26 to 0 at Ewing Field, on Friday afternoon, November 8. "Babe" Dahlgren, Jim Carlyon, and John Mottram each played a splendid game.

In the BIG GAME of the San Francisco High School, Mission defeated their ancient rival, the Commerce Bulldogs, 20 to 0, ending the season with a splendid record of seven victories and one tie. The battle was fought at Kezar Stadium, Thursday afternoon, November 14. For three plus quarters, our ancient rivals fought like Bulldogs and held Mission scoreless, but in the middle of the last quarter, the Bears broke loose with an attack that netted them three touchdowns in less than nine minutes. Charlie Heinbockel, Louie Haas, Jack Baat, Harry Krohn, and Milt Evans were the outstanding stars for Mission.

Mission automatically won the CHAMPIONSHIP of the A. A. A. by Lowell's 6 to 0 victory over Polytechnic in the Little-Big Game of San Francisco Prepdom.

Captain Jack Baat, a fast and intelligent halfback (sometimes acting as quarter or safety man), directed the team's work excellently. Besides being one of the most capable team leaders in the league, Baat was a good ground-gaining back, passer, and kicker; the course of the season Jack was nicknamed "Snake-Hips" because of his ability to shake off his tacklers.

Louie Haas, triple-threat halfback, who is better known as "Swivel-Hip" Haas or the "Ghost of Mission's backfield", was the best ball carrier on the local prep gridiron. Louie was always fighting with the ever-burning flame of clean sportsmanship before his eyes. Haas became famous because of his clever and thrilling runs.

Joe Curtin, Mission's big halfback, was about the fastest and the most elusive backfielder for his size in the A. A. A.; besides being a good line plunger, he was a good drop kicker. Joe still has one more year of competition.

Richard "Dick" Silva was one of the "Bears' "signal barkers this year. "Dick" was a flashy quarterback and a good line hitter, fighting all the time with that true Mission spirit.

James Carlyon was another quarterback in Coach Elder's machinery. Whenever "Jimmy" played, he would direct the team in brilliant fashion. Carlyon has still another year to call plays for Mission.

Harold Seramin, quarterback, showed Coach Elder what he could do in the Lick game. Although it was his first league game he ran the team exceptionally well. Much can be expected from this athlete within the next two years.

Probably the best fullback in the league this year was Milton Evans. In every game Evans caught the eyes of the spectators because of his brilliant line plunging. "Milt" has still one more year to fight for Mission.

Charlie Heinbockel, who played right wing, was one of the finest ends in the city. Charlie always played a fighting game, getting "his man" every time. Heinbockel was one of the best receivers that Mission has ever had.

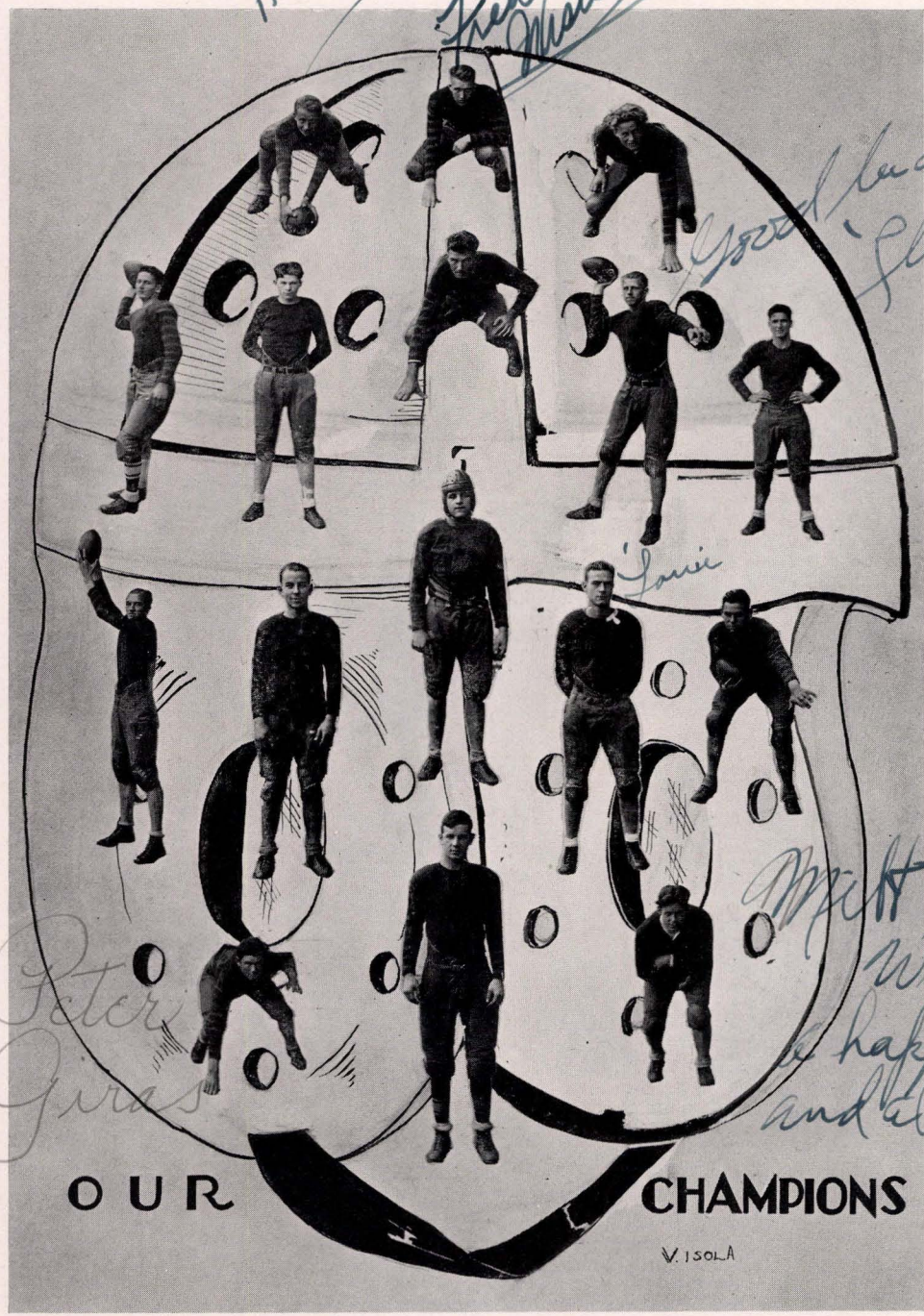

Joe Vercelli, a guard, is a clever player. He has plenty of fight and always succeeds in breaking up opponent's plays.

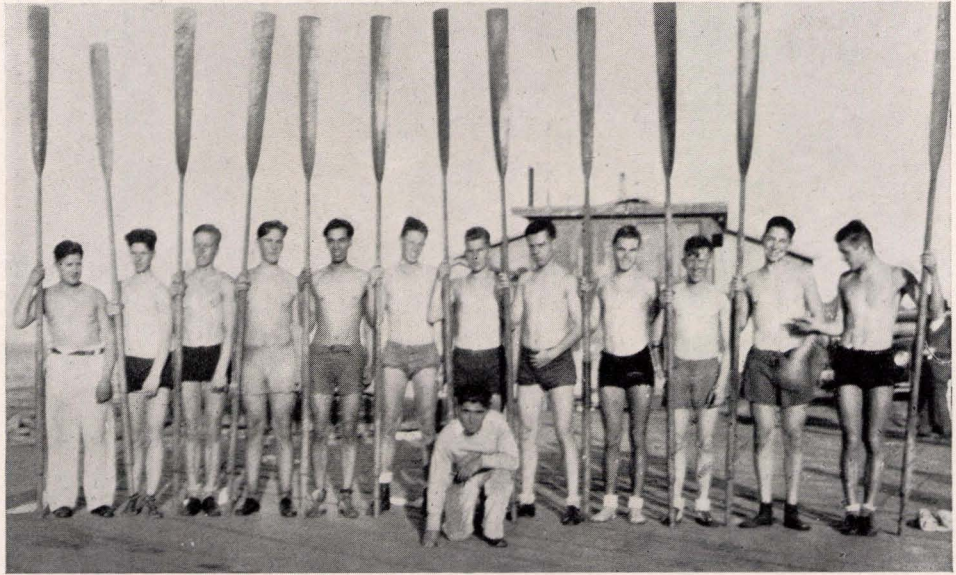
John Arteseros, a guard, has natural ability. He played last year.

The Band

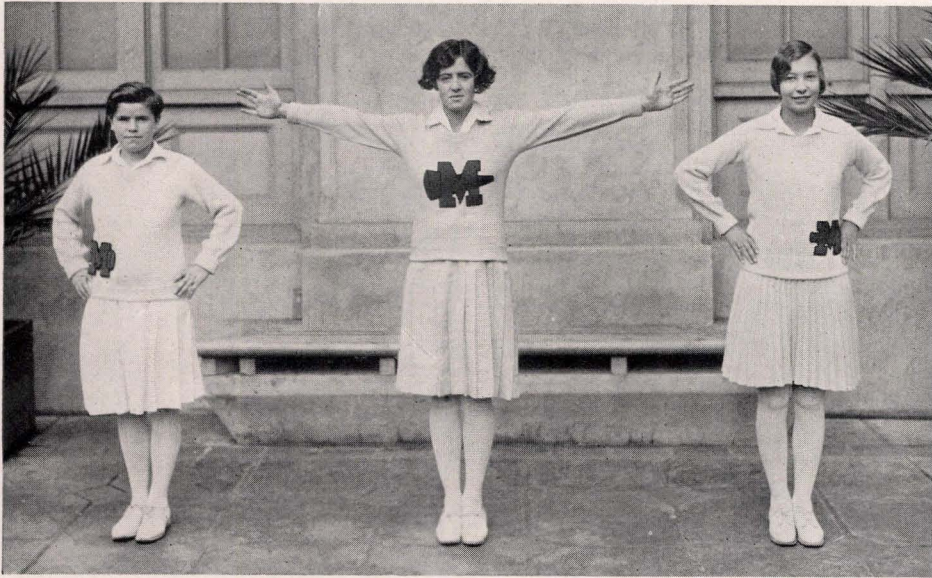

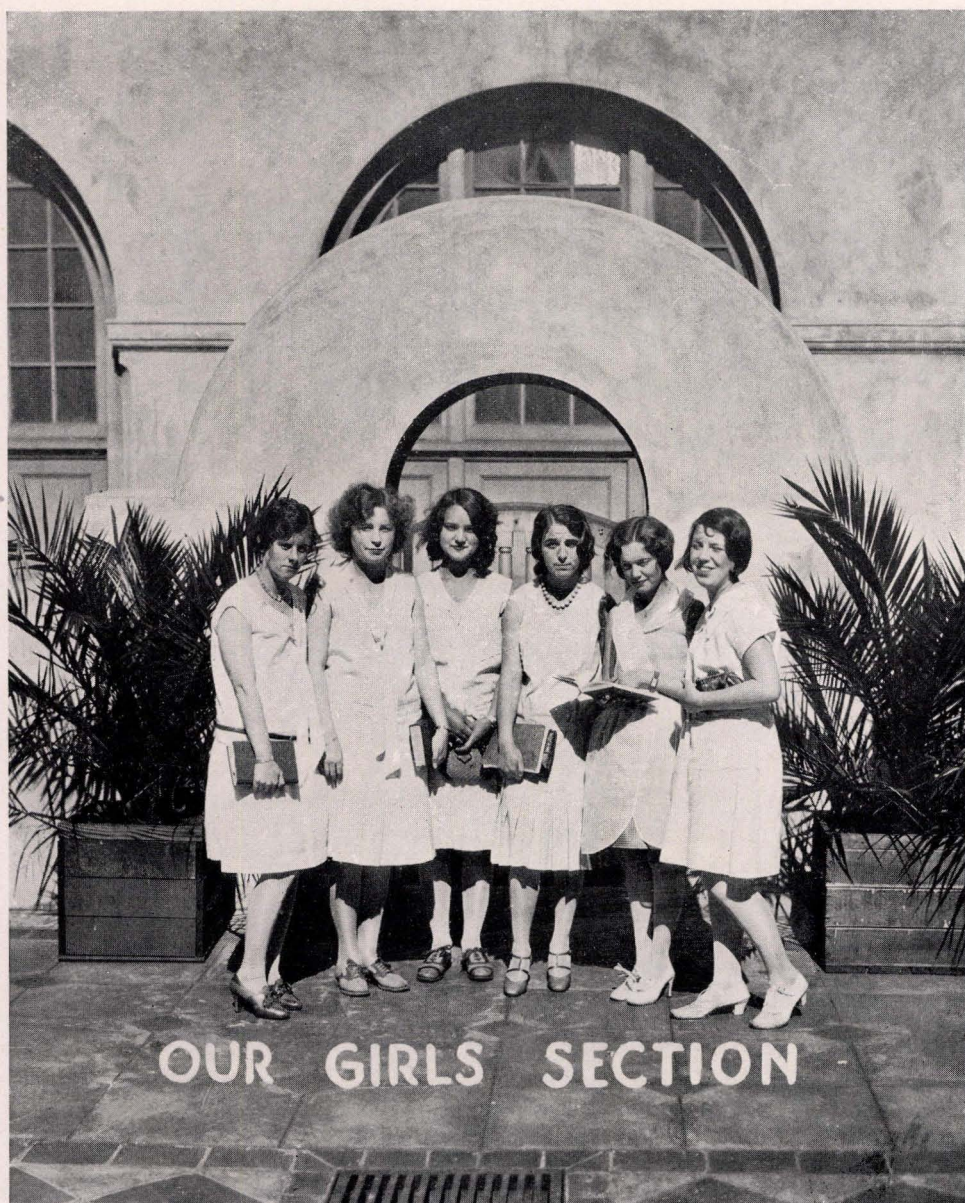

Some of Our Graduates Who Have Been Successful

RECENTLY at a very interesting reunion of one of the classes that had graduated from Mission High, a chronicle of the students who have graduated from school and have made exceptional records for themselves in their chosen vocations was read. Here are some of the interesting records.

On the Faculty list of the University of California, we find the name of Robert G. Sproul, the President of the University of California. Robert Gordon Sproul was the manager of the Journal and President of the Student Body while at Mission High.

Outstanding, we find among these names on the "Mission High Book of Fame" that of Milton Almquist, the medalist of the University of California. This means that he was deemed the most distinguished graduate in a class of over four thousand graduates.

Here is the name of Vincent Butler, our first Oxford scholar, that is, he was the highest student in the examinations in a competition which included all graduates of schools west of the Rocky Mountains. Students who win these coveted scholarships must not only show excellent scholastic ability, but they must excel also in some athletic line, and in addition to these requirements, they must give evidence of high ideals and noble purpose. Vincent Butler is now the attorney for a system of banks in San Francisco.

Axel Gravem was our second winner in the Oxford Scholarship Competition. While at Mission High he was the holder of the San Francisco Tennis-Singles Championship. Axel Gravem has taken up engineering as a profession.

Mission High School is the only high school in California that has had the honor of winning two Oxford scholarships. This scholarship entitles the winner to a four-year career at Oxford University and provides, as well, a sufficient fund for summer travel to other European countries on the continent during vacations.

At Stanford University, on the University Faculty list, we find the name of Dr. Margery Bailey. Anita Eldredge's name appears on it as one of the chief statisticians of our state. Her office is at the Capitol at Sacramento. Ayleen Monahan graduated with honors in mathematics from the University of California and is teaching in the University of Washington.

Crossing the continent to Annapolis, we find Sherwoode Taffinder, Lieutenant-Commander in the Navy. He was captain of the Mission High football team in his undergraduate years. Under his captaincy, Mission High won the championship trophy. He now expounds the intricacies of mathematics at Annapolis when he is not reviewing and inspecting the naval cadets at Annapolis.

Louis Enos was one of our famous all-round athletes in football and in track. He made the All-Star Track Team at the University of California and on that team he was sent East to represent California. Louis is now at the Kelly Aviation Field in Texas, and we may hear of him any time as a second Lindbergh.

In the financial world, we find the name of James Fuller, who held the long-distance sprinting record. He is now the junior member of the firm of Sanborn and Fuller. He has become a successful financier, selling stocks and bonds. Recently, his firm purchased a seat on the Stock Exchange, for an amount in the neighborhood of twenty-five thousand dollars.

Harmon Skillin, former student body president of Mission High School and manager of a very successful Journal, is now making a name for himself as Assistant District Attorney of San Francisco.

Wendell Butts, a Lieutenant in the World War, who was decorated with the Croix-de-Guerre, with the Palm, and the Legion of Honor medal, has made a reputation for himself as a consulting engineer.

Far away in the Philippines two of our former Mission High students met recently. They were not acquainted at Mission High but each one recognized the Mission High School pin on the lapel of the other. These two are Doctor Joseph Doyle, now a successful dentist in Manila, and Edward Grimm, a leading engineer in the Philippines. Immediately they became staunch friends and they spent some very happy moments recounting incidents and renewing associations of their Alma Mater.

Robert Dougherty graduated from West Point, one of the five highest in mathematics. He was given the commission of lieutenant in the Engineering Division of the Army.

Robert Levy was assistant editor of the Oakland Tribune, and recently has gone to New York to continue in journalistic lines.

These are only a few of the many names of Mission High graduates who worked without hope of reward of any kind save that of accomplishment, and they are now spelling out the word Success in the "World's Work", but these examples are of sufficient variety to show the opportunities that are open to all high school students who have the "forward look".
