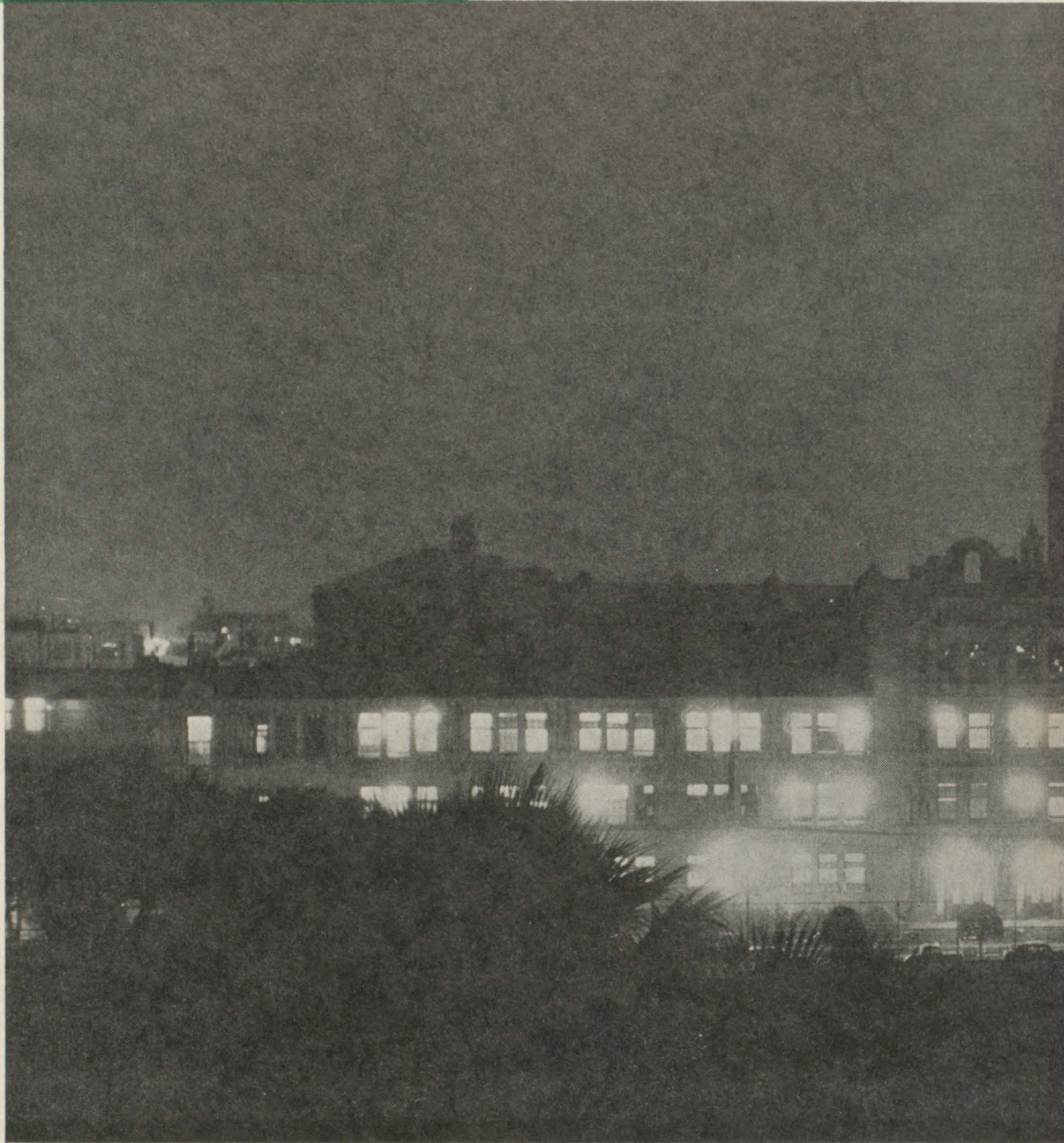

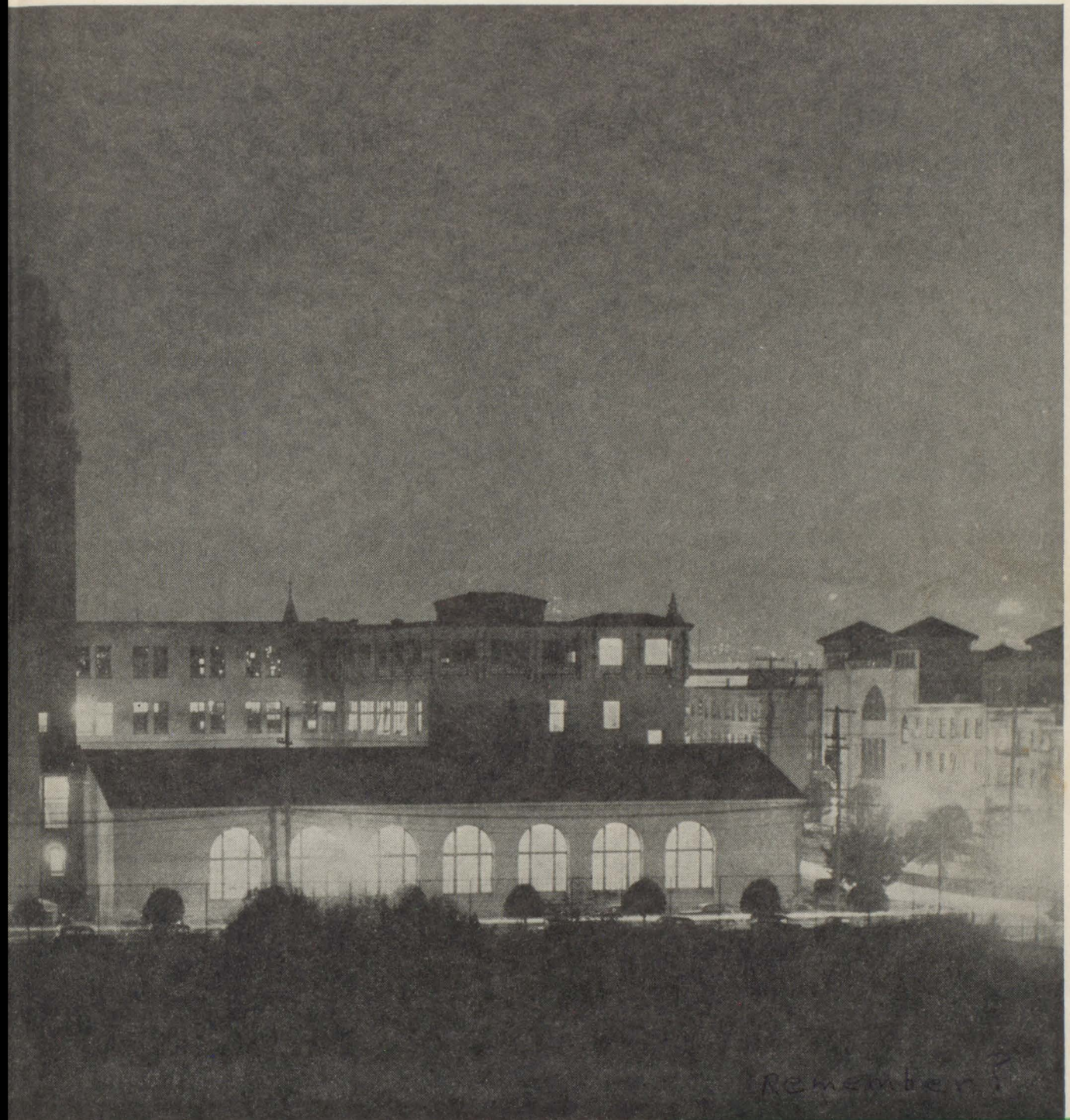

Messages from the Administrator

MR. DREW'S MESSAGE

The operation of a large, modern cosmopolitan high school in many respects, is similar to that of a large manufacturing institution. Each must have a guiding time schedule, a plan of procedure contemplated in the one case to produce a finished product of materials, or machines, and in the other case, a finished product of students of high school age.

A factory must have a manager, foreman, and employees to work on the materials and machines. By comparison the school must have a competent managerial staff, consisting of the school executives, and as well, the teaching staff to train the students in the lines of endeavor that they pursue.

In recent years a new phase of school management and school government has come into being, namely, student government. However, in Mission High School, the student government involves only the voting on student propositions, and the allocation of student money. Students who commit minor infractions are summoned to appear before the student court by student officials. This court is composed of a chief justice, a bailiff, and a recorder. In these respects I am heartily in favor of student government.

MISS SIMON'S MESSAGE

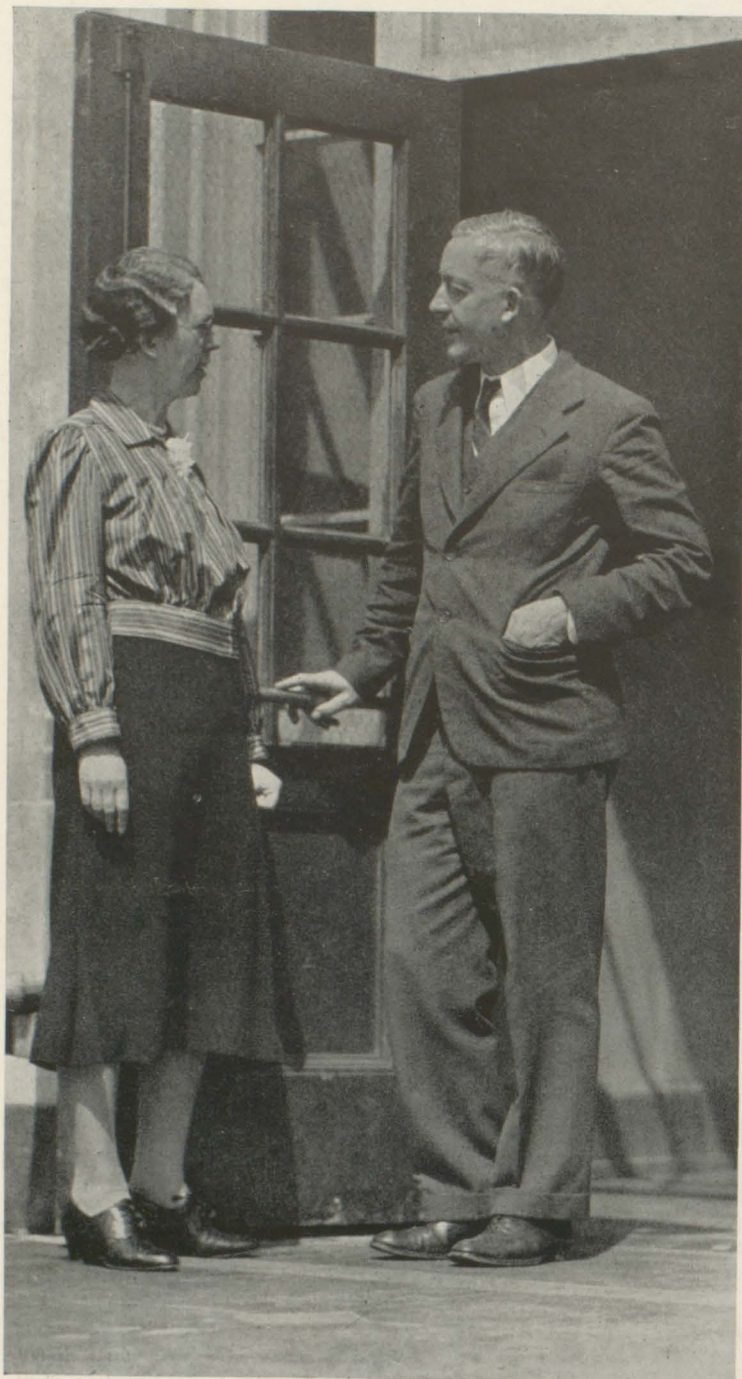

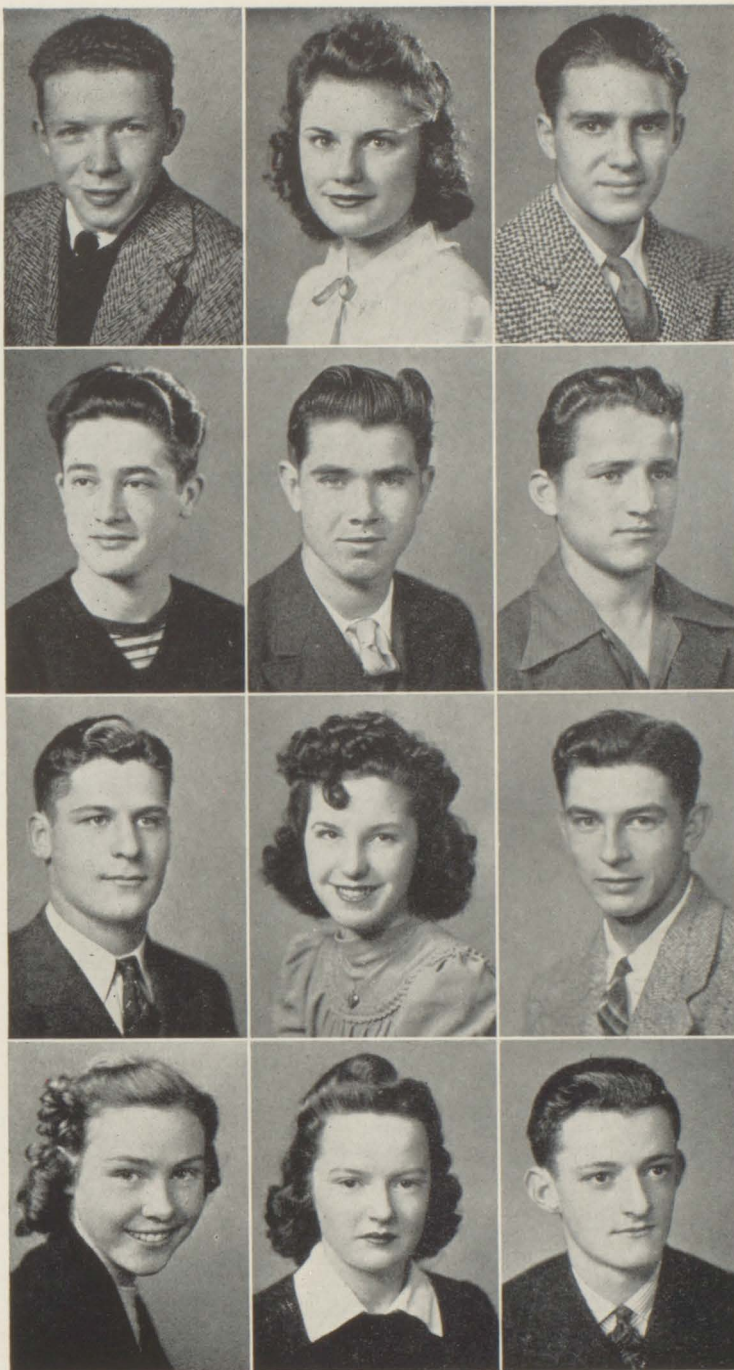

Counselors ... Student's Aid

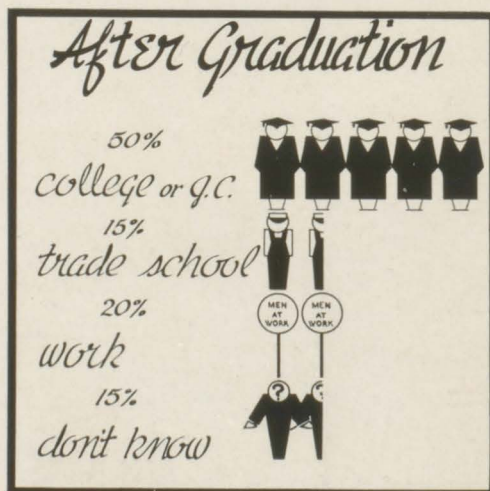
To guide the faltering steps of Mission's 2600 students through the complex maze of its curriculum is the task of our friendly counselors. *Lots of Luck to the Biology Club*

To help the bewildered low twos, counselors try to find their ambitions and help them make their programs accordingly. Some time during their first semester all commercial students take a test which indicates their ability to do certain types of commercial work. Vocational students take a test which shows the speed and accuracy with which they can handle objects so necessary to success in all types of vocational work. Programs are gone over very carefully for academic students to make certain all requirements are fulfilled. *Science Program*

Each grade period, F report forms are sent out by counselors in an attempt to help failing students raise their grade through knowing exactly why they have failed.

For students requiring information on what to do after high school, the counselors keep files of bulletins put out by business colleges, universities, and trade schools.

A valuable function of this department is to acquaint students with clubs and organizations that offer opportunities in cultural work outside of school, such as music, art, and drama.

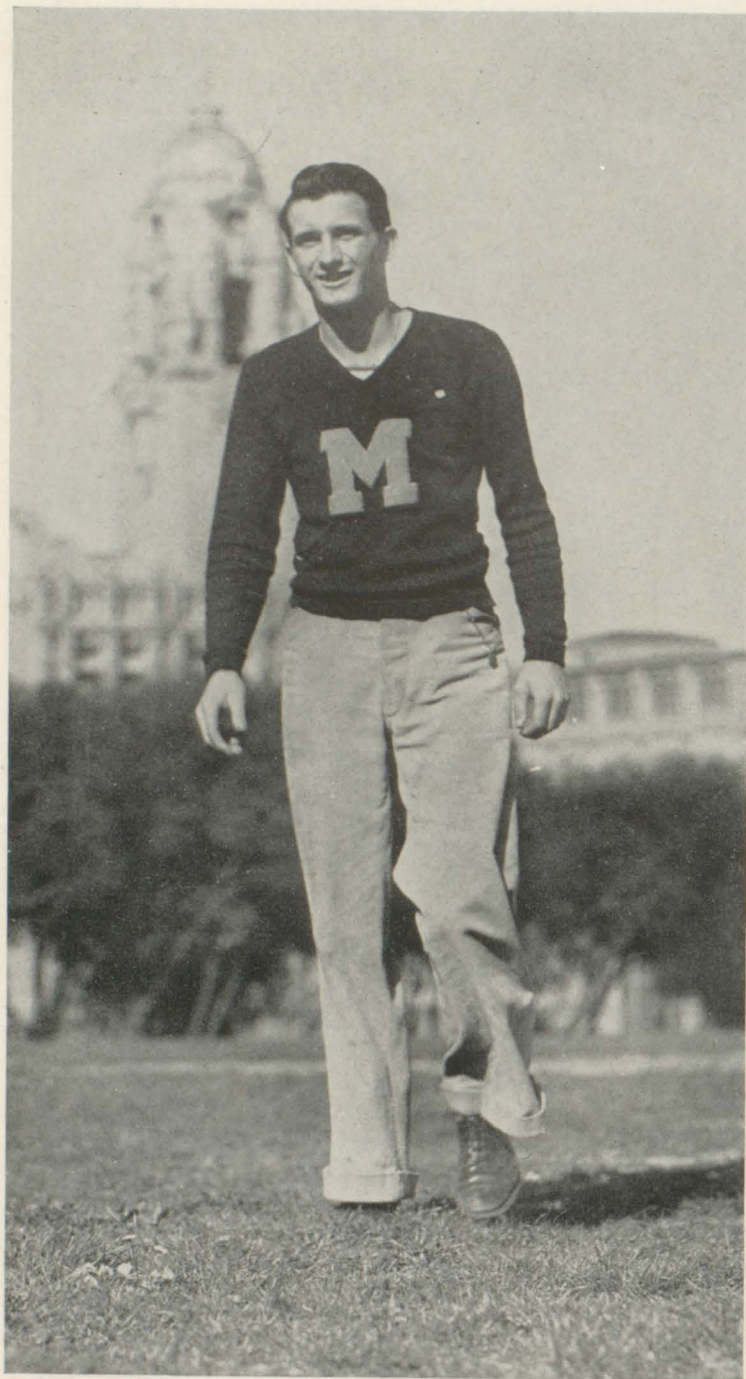

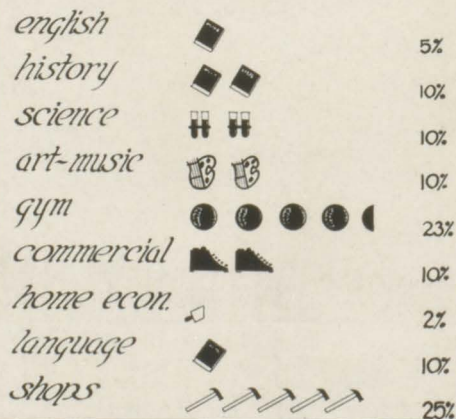

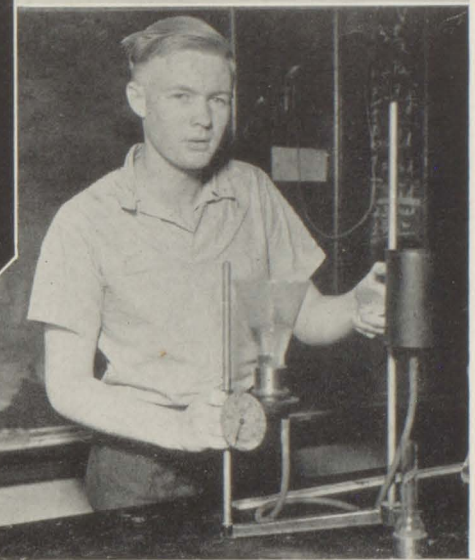

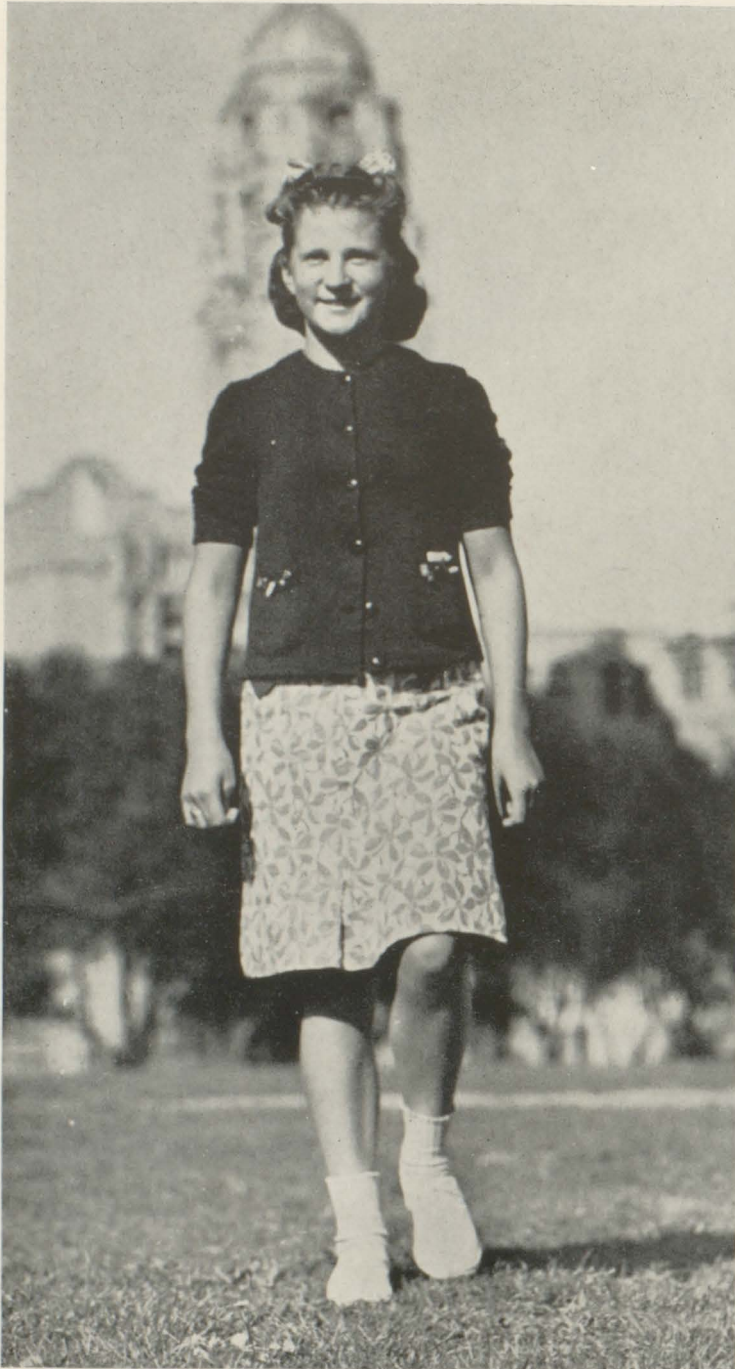

Auli does all the housework at home, even the cooking. Miss Olliver's ideal man must be dark, handsome, and about six feet tall.

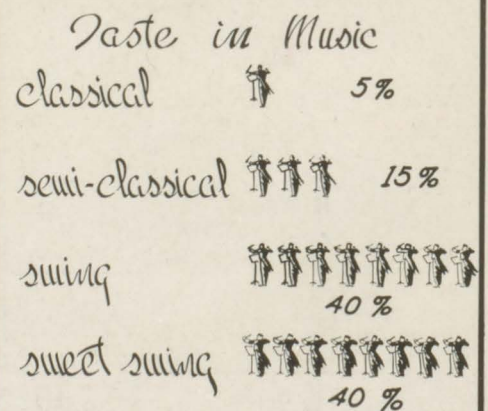
In Music, Art Honors Won

The fundamental purpose of the Home Economics Department is to train children for the home, but many who major in it are able to use it in vocational fields.

Shops Train For Trades

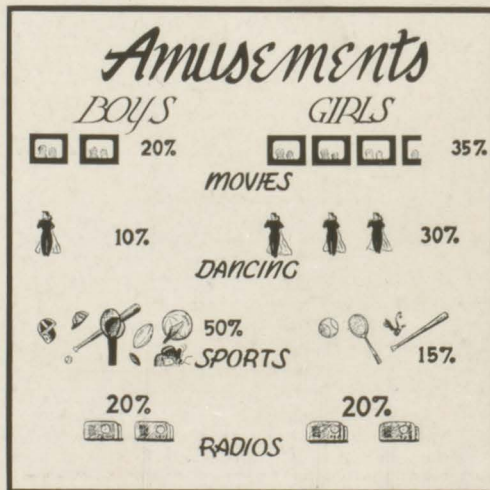

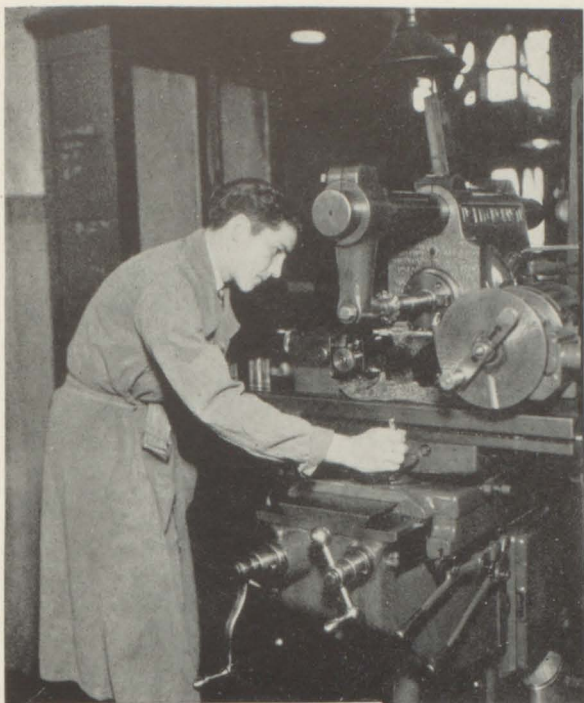
Experience in shop work is invaluable in training for both avocations and vocations.

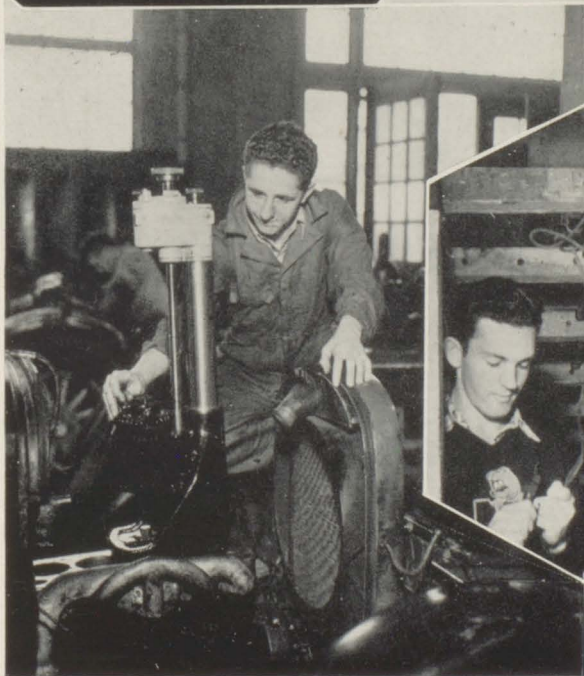

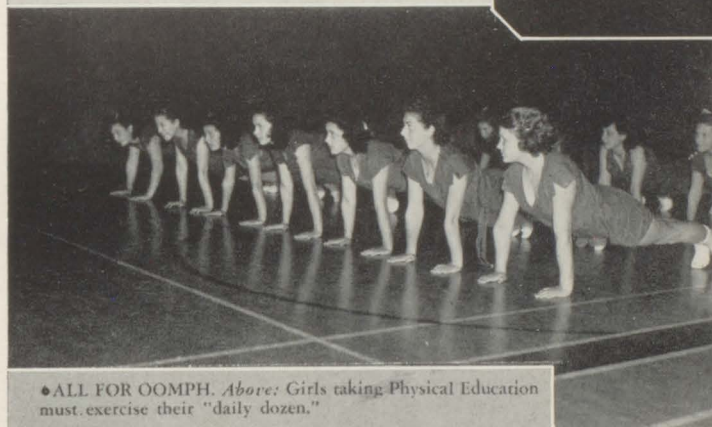

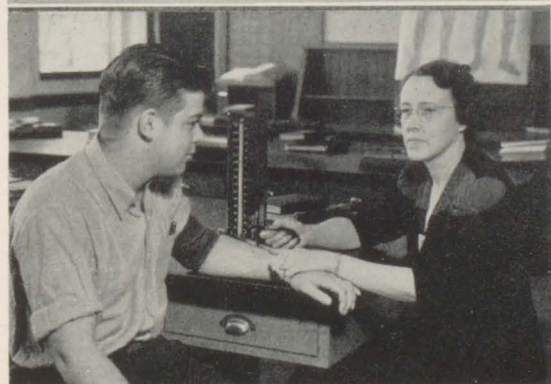

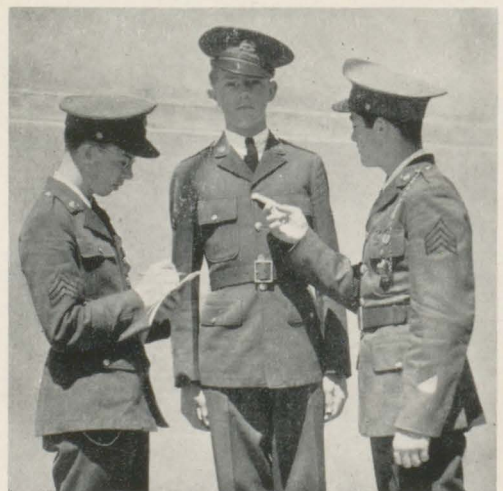
Being more adept at extended order than the sophomores and juniors, the senior R.O.T.C. cadets proceeded against an imaginary enemy skirmish line.

Football is Dell's favorite spectator sport.

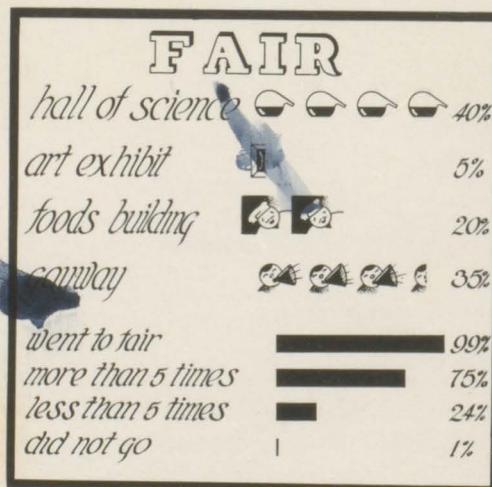
Senior Class Bids Farewell

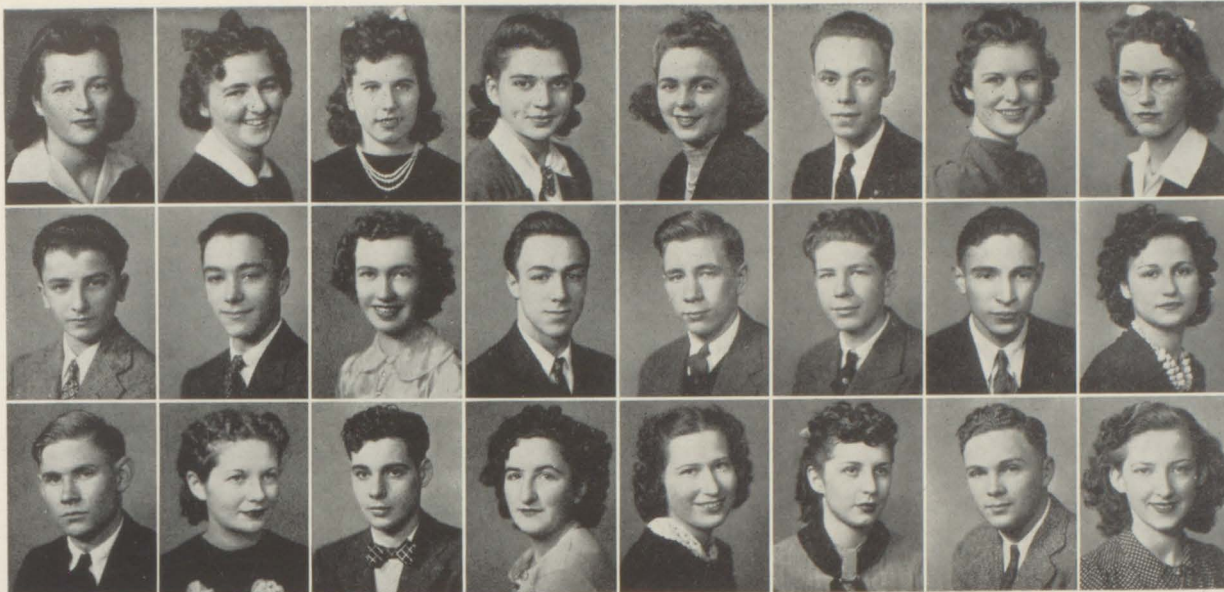

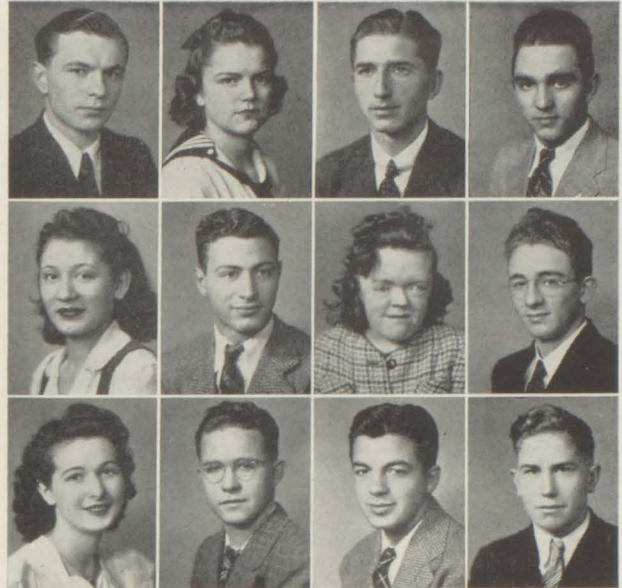
Where Will You Go? Answered by June '40

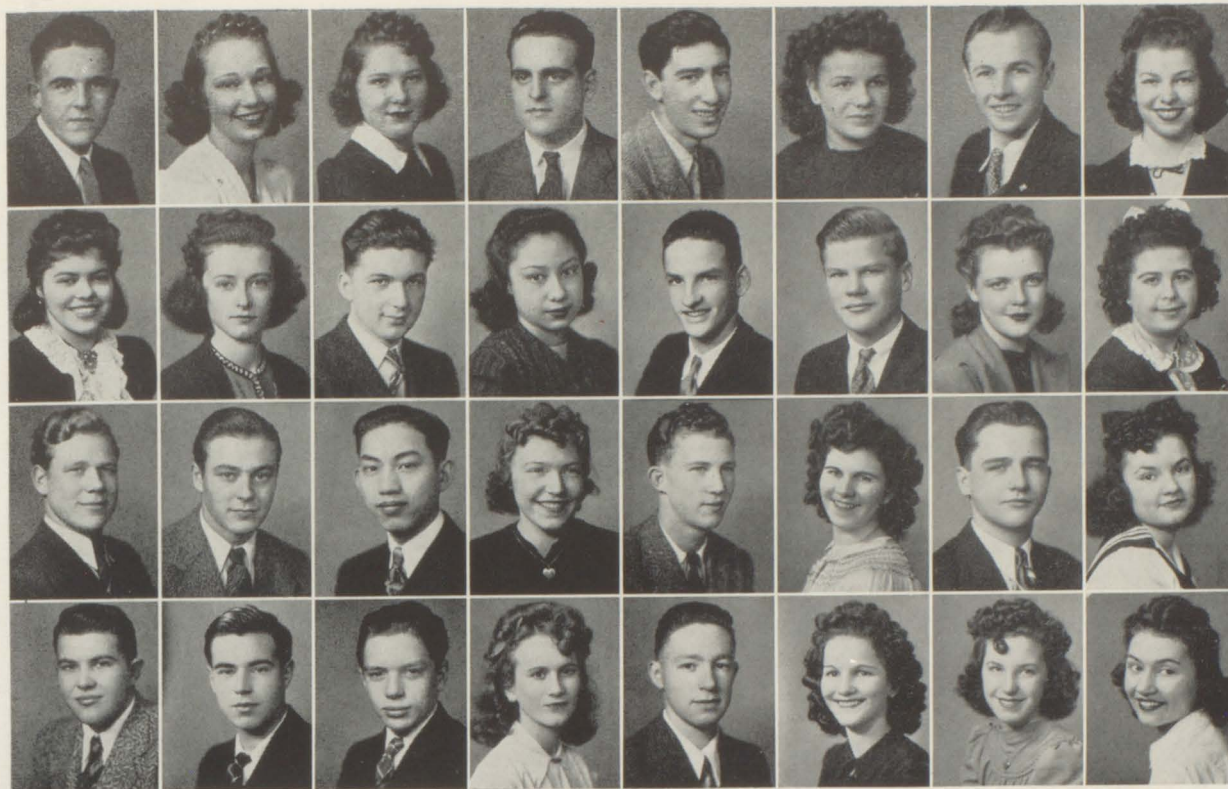

Senior Views in Journal Poll

The Journal staff has found by poll, by interview and by questionnaire many pertinent facts about the problems of the high senior students and prospective graduates of Mission High School.

We find that he is on a whole a rather level headed person whose judgment on local and world problems is sound and conservative. He has tried to give himself adequate training for his future economic life, but looks forward with trepidation to the time when he must make his own way in the world. He thinks and states with frankness that he thinks the prospects for a job are not too bright. He thinks that his education at Mission has been good but wishes that he had taken better advantage of the opportunity put before him. Often, too, he wishes that he had known sooner what he intended to do after graduation so that he could have made better preparation while in school.

We have found that 85% of the students interviewed are opposed to war but that 75% of the boys state that they would volunteer immediately in case America should enter world war; also 75% of them have pro-Allied sympathies. In affairs closer to home the Mission High Seniors think that unemployment is the major problem; however, he is not in favor of any of the so-called Utopian plans. His greatest hope for the future seems to be economic security. As proof of this we see him thinking more and more about training for the lower paid but more secure civil service positions.

All in all we have found that the Mission seniors fit one definition of an educated person—"He is a well-rounded and well-informed individual."

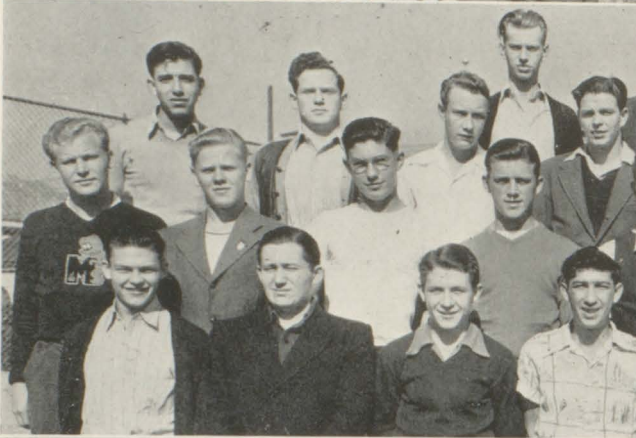

Joe stands 5 feet 10 inches, tips the scales at 155 pounds, has brown eyes and black wavy hair, and has let 17 baseball seasons pass him by. As Athletic Manager he handles the finances for athletic trips, helps in the scheduling of games, and assists the other student body officers.

When asked about what he thought could be improved in Mission's sports program, he answered immediately, "more intramural sports." He believes that with the new Drew Field, intramural sports will become "very popular and successful."

A.A.A. Champions in Two Sports

Mission, like all other schools, must have downfalls. Ours came in basketball. Mission went through a brilliant practice season. Going into the A.A.A. season the "Bears" didn't click. In some games they were almost perfect, but the breaks were against them. Being one of the smallest varsity teams in the league they were predicted to end up in the cellar but they fooled even the sports-writers by ending up in fifth place.

The miracle has happened! Mission's track team has placed in the upper division, taking third place in the league of nine schools. This is the best Mission has ever done in track. Drew Field, with its new track and pits has put out a third place team the first year that the "Bears" track team has used it.

Taking the baseball championship in 1938 the "Bears" were expected to repeat themselves the following year, but the boys slipped up a little and placed third. 1940 came, and with it a new championship in baseball. Losing but one game in eight starts Mission went into the play-offs which they took with the ease of a professional team. This year's ball club is one of the best ever produced at Mission.

The "Bears", not satisfied with the baseball championship, Mission went on to win the crew title. The crew was led by coxswain Dick Curtaz, who has been coxswain on two crew championships during his three years in Mission. The "Bears" outstroked the Balboa crew to win the title with three and a half lengths to spare.

Hopes for another crew championship next year were high. For the junior varsity has also finished its season undefeated.

130's Season

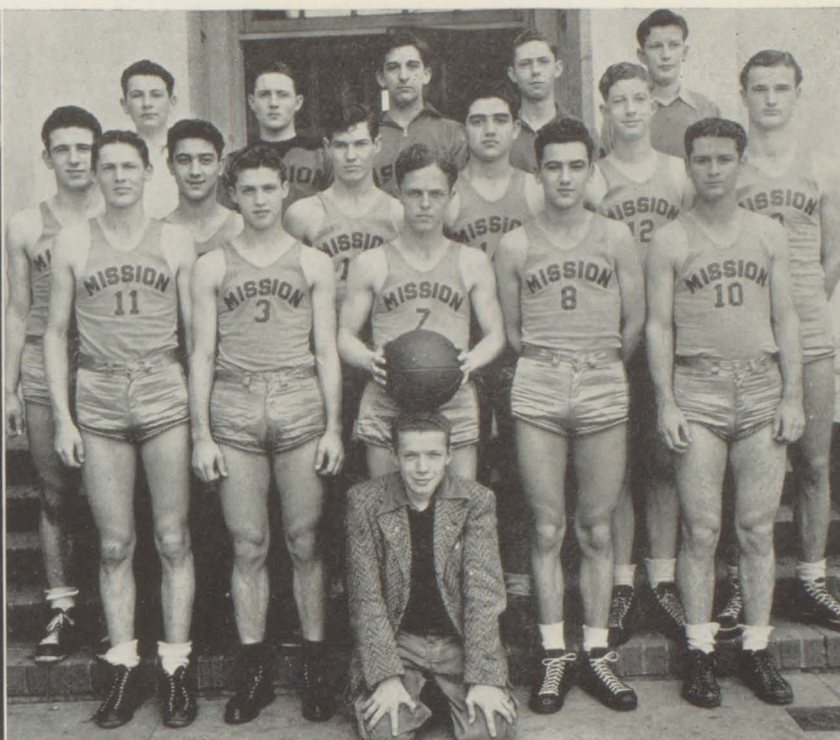

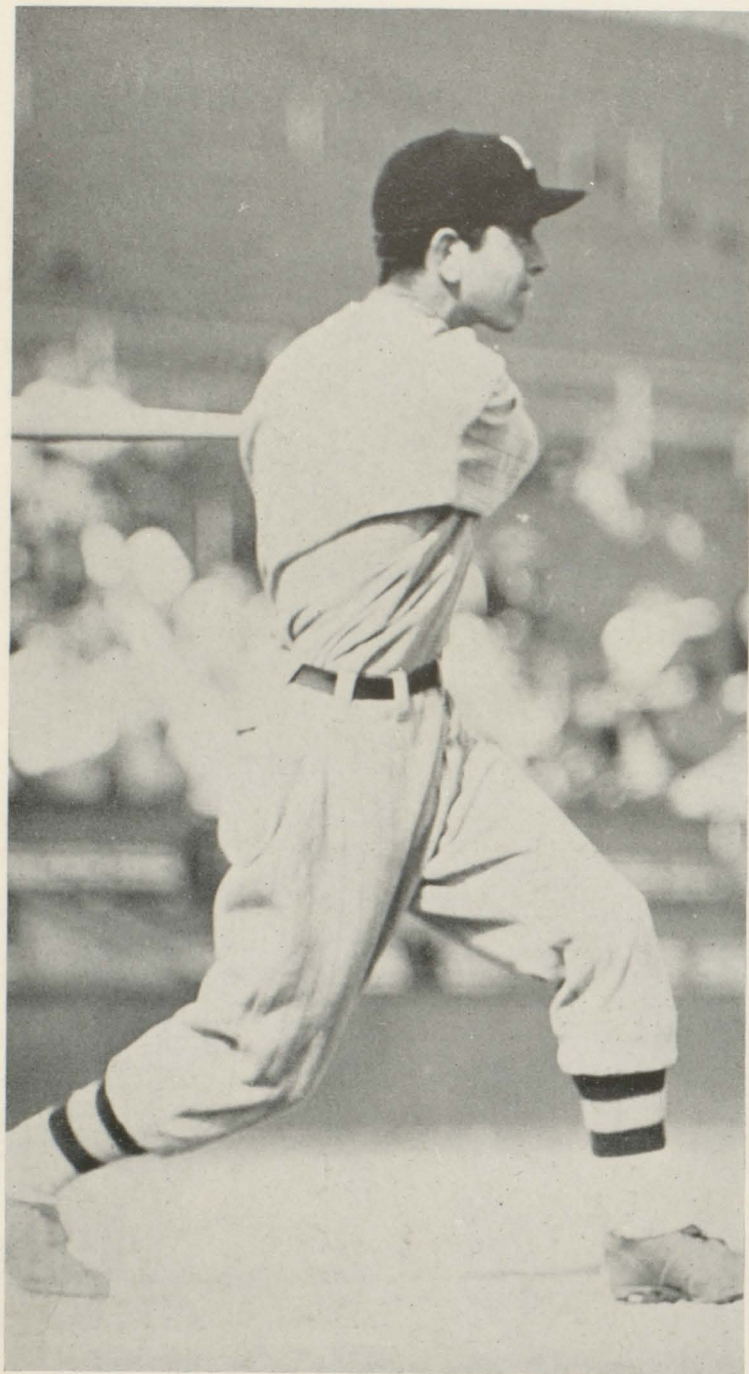

In the regular league clash the "Yankees of the West," encountered only one defeat—that at the hands of Johnnie Luscutoff, Commerce hurler, who checked the Mission Bears down to 4 runs, while his teammates scored seven.

The O'Shaughnessy playoffs included 4 leading schools, Mission, Commerce, St. Ignatius, and Galileo. The Bears downed S. John Hernandez, league leading slugger could not be stopped. In five times at bat, 4 doubles and a single were his contributions.

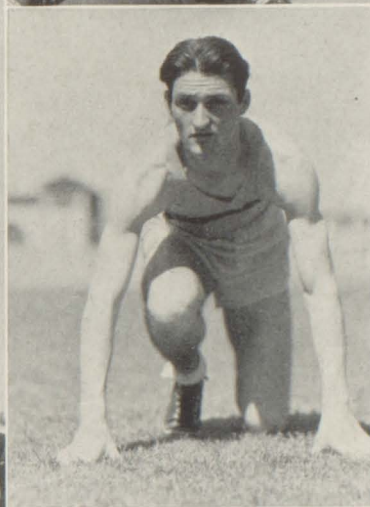
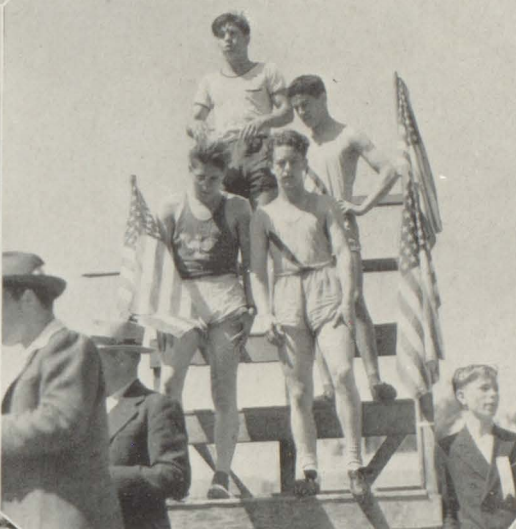
Crew Champs... Track, Tennis

Twelve Mission boys with swinging racquets invaded the local prep circles. Led by Capt. Clarence Swensen the "Bear" racquet-eers downed both St. Peters and Poly high. Losing only to St. Ignatius the "Bear" will enter A.A.A. competition the first week of June, after the Journal has gone to press.

"Stroke, you lubbers, stroke" yells coxswain Dick Curtaz, with a gleamful look in his eyes. Sweat rolling off their foreheads, backs bent with strain, Mission's crew strokes its way into the second crew championship in three years. They won it also in 1938. Every eye is on Dick Curtaz, every arm drawing back in perfect unison keeping even strokes. This excellent crew of boys captained by Dick Rogers won every race they entered in. Wait a second we're wrong, they lost one practice to St. Ignatius when George Stokes was carried as only a sightseer, after a big heave resulted in a broken oarlock.

Ace track men like the two Renes, Del Carlo and Rebollado were responsible for the teams placing third in the A.A.A. finals. Del Carlo, who pulled a muscle during the finals, placed second. In previous years varsity men who could place in the finals were scarce. Keenan, the red haired high jumper, took a third place. The varsity men saw their little brothers, the lightweights, take a third place, and knew that they would have to keep up the good work. As a result they dug their spikes harder into the earth and also finished third.

Not meaning to take any glory from the senior team captained by Tillie Dondero and Norma Sanoff which won the interclass playoffs, but the Juniors were a very close second.

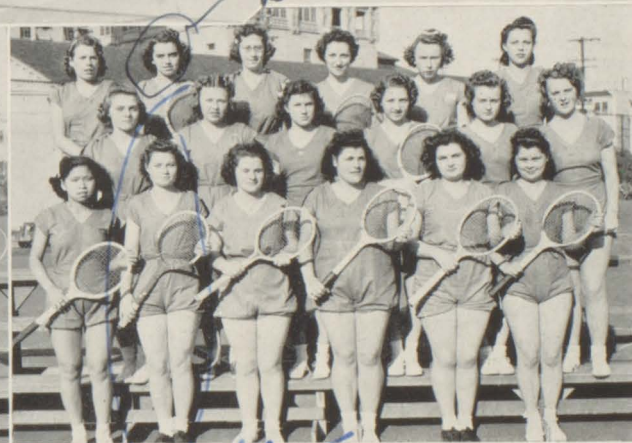
CROP AND SADDLE CLUB

THE MISSION

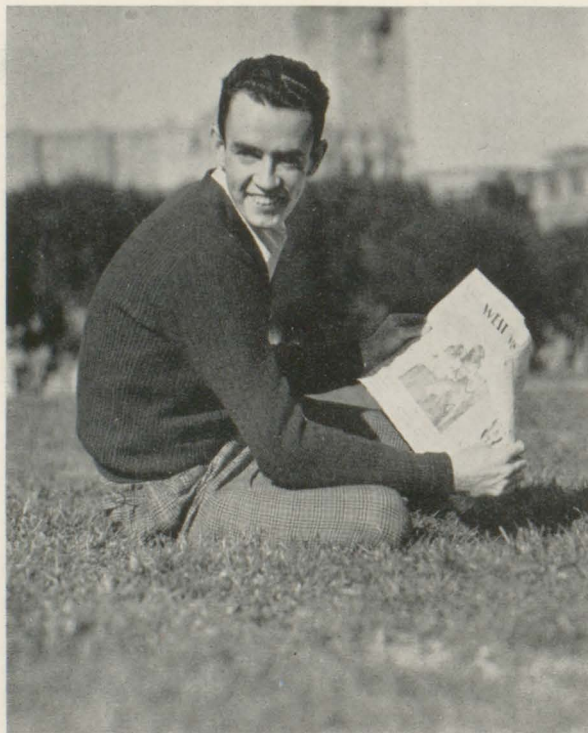

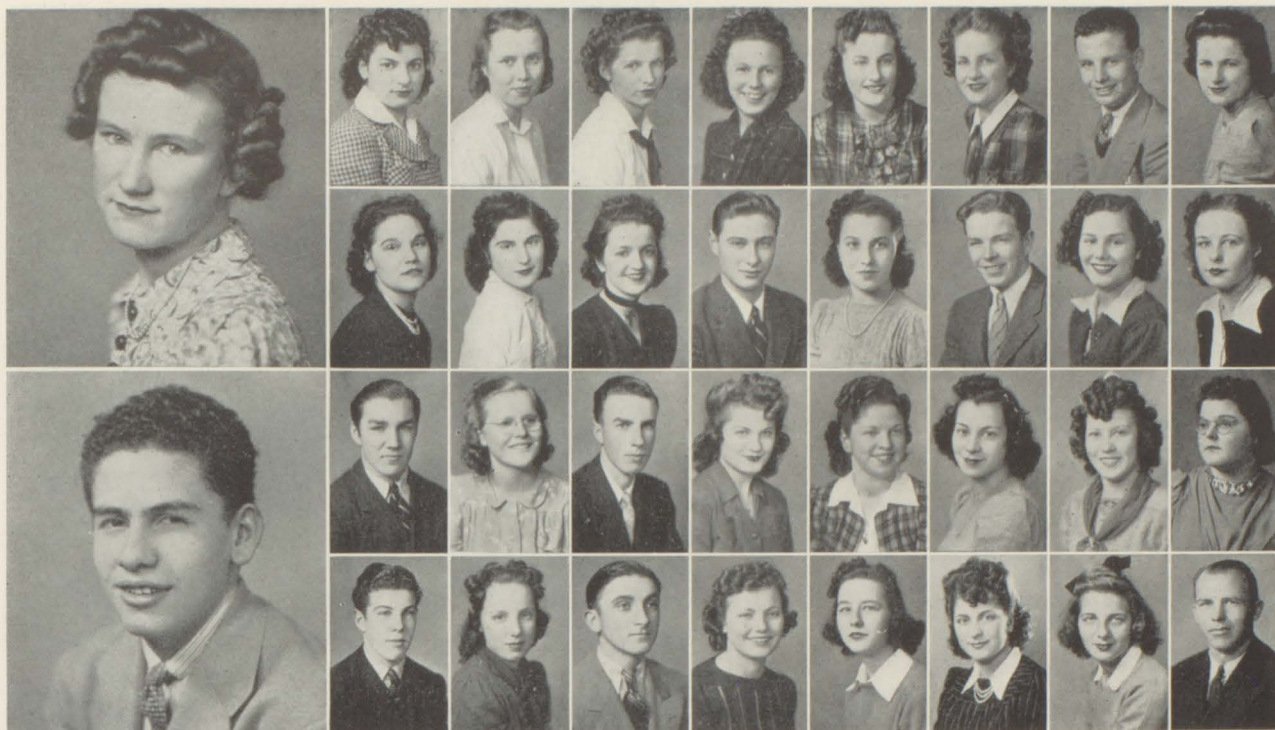


THE WEST WING

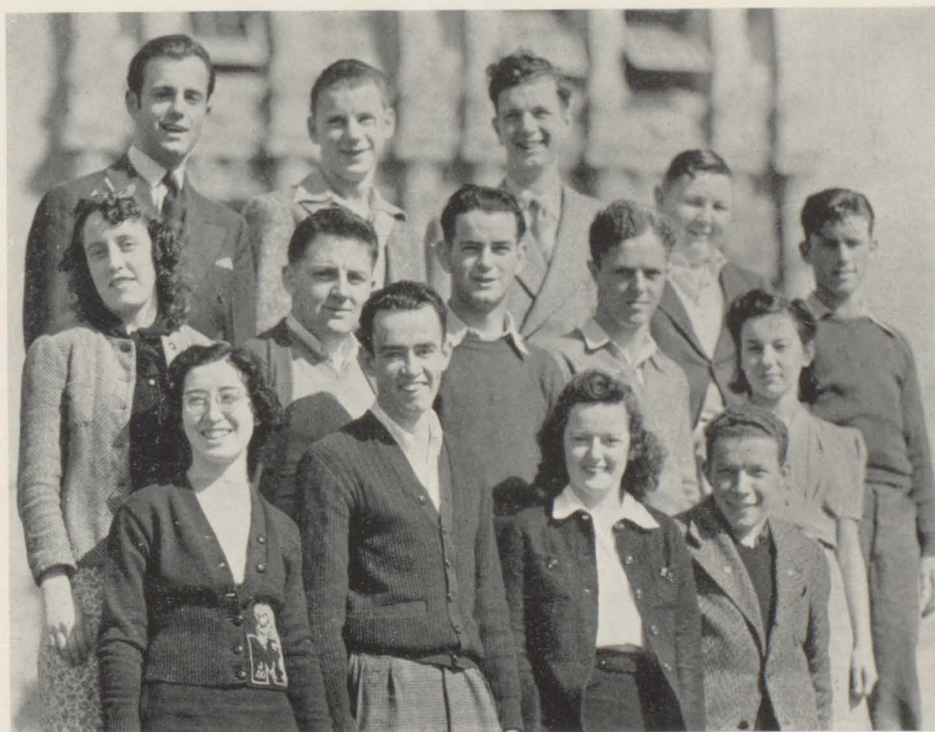
