

Dear Reader:



MR. NEWMAN'S MESSAGE

A high school graduate has encountered many problems during his three-year sojourn in his classrooms; he will encounter many problems after graduation. But these problems, if we adopt a broad viewpoint, can be said to be only one main problem. The big problem for any human being is adapting himself to his environment. The opposite proposition of fitting the environment to one's self, has worked successfully for very few in the past and the ones who are busy at it have not achieved complete results, by any means.

What qualities are useful to this adaptation? Make a complete list of them— honesty, industry, resolution, and the rest—and you will have a list of virtues. One definition of virtue can thus be obtained, as the type of action that leads to success. Distrust anyone who claims to know a better trick—the whole experience of mankind shows that he is wrong.

This then is the ideal that our graduate must keep before him. To adapt himself to his environment; not to attempt to force environment to adapt itself to him.





Noah is a member of the championship basketball team, and of the track team.



Ever since the days of the great earthquake and fire of 1906, Mission High School has been producing a yearbook. Each successive year since then, THE MISSION has been improved upon. Finally, in 1936, and every year from that time on, we have been granted the highest award possible. We were given the All-American Honor Rating. To gain this award is the ultimate goal of all editorial staffs. Many yearbooks have received this honor for one term, but for the first time in San Francisco's journalism history, a school was granted this rating for both Fall and Spring term. The school was Mission High.






Varsity crew passes next in review. Beaten only by the championship St. Ignatius boat they are credited with second place in final league standings.

Lincoln fell easily 42 to 28 the "Fighting Irish" from Sacred Heart sent the Bears down to defeat in their last contest of the season 34-33.




Both Morales and Del Carlo have been outstanding in athletics during high school and have gained the attention of college coaches as possible material.

After this heart-breaking defeat Mission came back to defeat former champions, Galileo, and in the final race of the season went on to defeat the crew from Sacred Heart.


By winning all but one race the Bear crew won second place and were awarded medals by the A.A.A.
