History

The site where Mission High School stands was the location of an Indian Community when Father Junipero Serra visited this area in 1777. Fray Francisco Palou, who was in this area in 1776, is accredited with the founding of San Francisco de Asis-Mission Dolores. The Indian community was situated on a narrow creek which flowed eastward to the Bay. The creek has long since been filled in, and its ancient bed is now Eighteenth Street on which Mission High School faces.

Mission High was founded in the year of 1896. It was so named because of its association with the scenes and events described above. Its colors are brown and gold symbolizing the gold of California and the brown of the habits worn by the Franciscans.

The class which constituted the original student body, in charge of Miss A. Goldsmith, had accommodations in the Valencia Street Grammar School Building at 22nd and Valencia Streets under Principal Joseph O'Connor's supervision. The school began with a single class, and in 1919 there was an enrollment of nearly 600. From a single teacher in 1896, the faculty has grown to a staff of 117 certificated school people.

Under the leadership of Principals Joseph O'Connor, F. H. Clark, William J. Drew, Joseph Newman, Louis Conlan, Alvin Morse, E. K. Frederick and presently Barton Knowles, Mission High School has become one of San Francisco's best high schools - academically, athletically, and socially. Though the school has been damaged by fire, removed and rebuilt, Mission has managed to turn out good material. Mission High is proud of the many alumni who have established themselves in all walks of life; for example, Dr. Robert Gordon Sproul, President-Emeritus of the University of California; John Shelley, Congressman from San Francisco; Eugene McAteer, State Senator, and many others.

When I browse through this bit of history, I am reminded of a poem that explains our history perfectly. It goes something like this:

" Bells of the Past, whose long forgotten music
Still fills the wide expanse --
Tinging the sober twilight of the Present
With the color of romance."

Principal Frederick said that he has enjoyed every minute at Mission, and that the school has "a tremendous future".



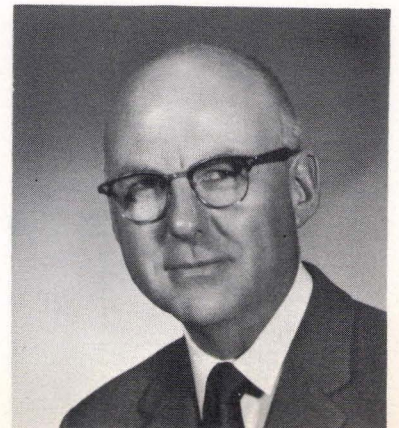

The A Cappella Choir frequently performs at special assemblies, as well as community functions. During Christmas vacation the choir sang at Lettermen Hospital and City Hall.

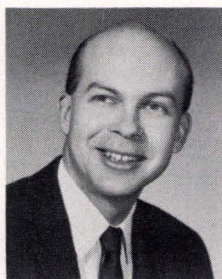

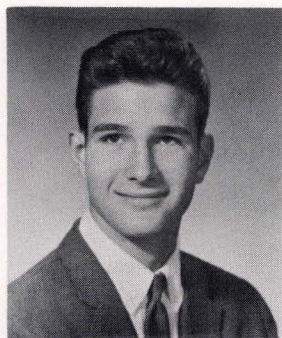
The student officers of the fall term witnessed and participated in the first football game ever to be televised of Mission High School.

Other activities included arranging dances, rallies, and the clean-up campaign.

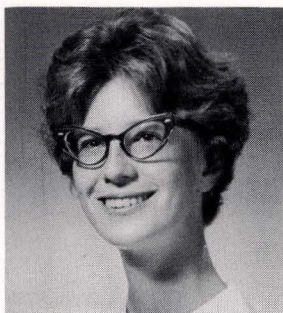

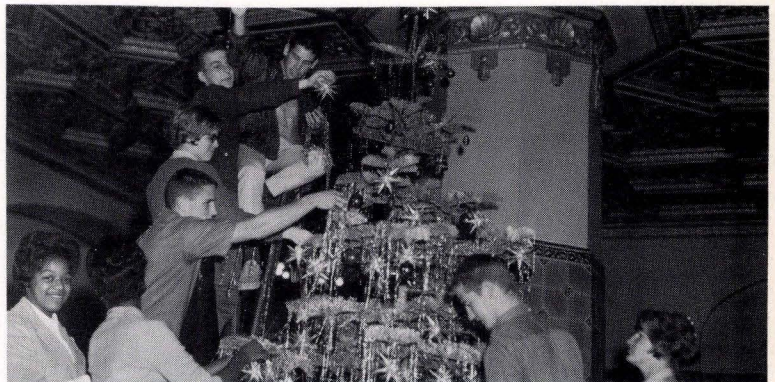

Next year it will be a different story. Almost the entire team will be returning to play. We'll no longer have an inexperienced team.

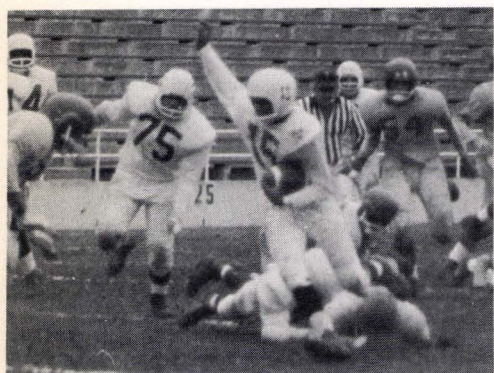

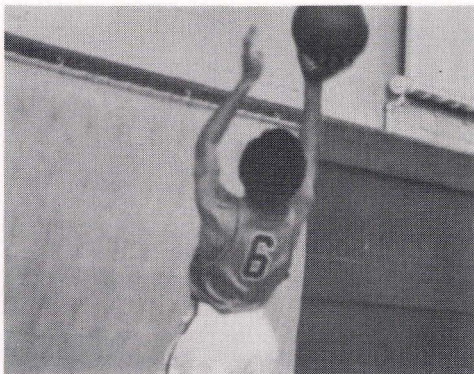

The Bear hoopsters look promising for next year's go. With the exception of Bill Valentine, the other members of this year's team will return to cage action next season.

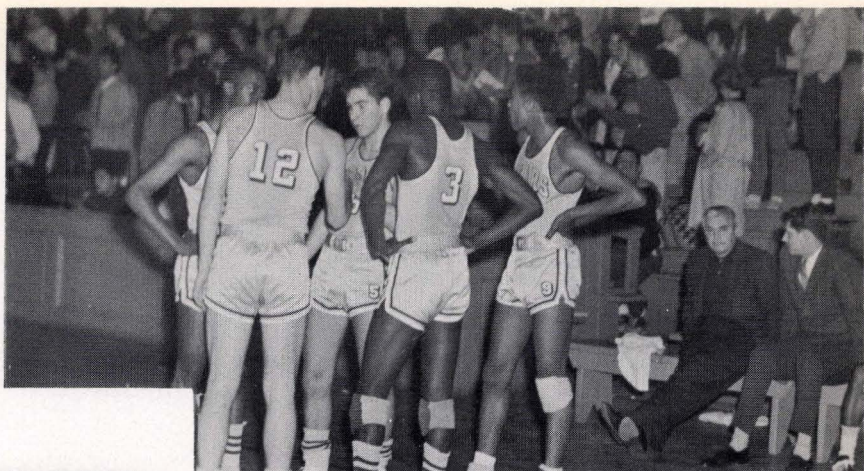

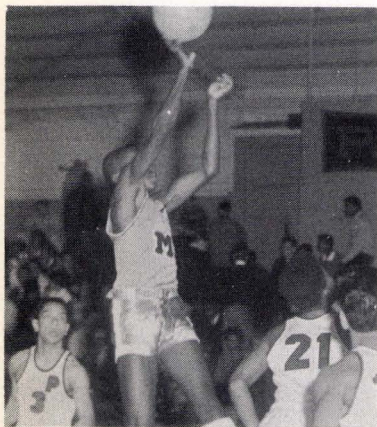
Led by All-City Dexter Garnier, our 130 pound basketball quintet won four and lost four. This record won us a playoff berth.
