







Twenty-Five Years at Polytechnic

After serving as principal and teacher of schools in New Orleans, San Jose, and Oakland, Mr. Addicott was made Principal of Polytechnic in 1913. He was a man well suited to the position because of his wide training, not only in academic fields, but also in Polytechnical art subjects. He had studied advanced mathematics at Columbia University. At one time he conducted an art school. Previous to his appointment to Polytechnic, he held the principalship of other schools throughout the United States.



As principal of Poly he has always been enthusiastically interested in all student activities and has constantly encouraged the various interscholastic competitions, both on the athletic field and in the class room.

It was through the untiring efforts of Mr. Addicott that Poly was so successful during "Boys Week" several years ago.



He organized the celebrated faculty tennis team and played first base on the faculty baseball team. He was extremely interested in music and was the distinguished baritone of the famous Faculty Quartette.

Mr. Addicott is a man of high ideals based on the principles of unselfish service as is exemplified by the record of his volunteer civilian work during the World War. Obviously his stay at Poly has been successful. May it also have been happy and satisfying.

Boys' Block "P"



In order to fulfill this desire, one point of the ten points necessary for membership may be obtained by participation in some school activity. The remaining nine points are based entirely on scholarship. Three points may be earned by receiving an "A" in a prepared subject and one point for a "B" in a prepared subject. $1\frac{1}{2}$ points are given for an "A" in an unprepared subject and $\frac{1}{2}$ point for a "B." With these qualifications, membership is limited to those who are honestly interested in high scholarship.

It is the aim of every member in the federation to receive a gold pin and a gold seal on his diploma which represents six terms of membership, and which constitutes a life membership.

Since its beginning fourteen years ago, the C.S.F. has steadily grown until now, under the guidance of its beloved sponsor, Miss Roddy, and its president, Marian Leva, it has completed its most eventful term. Highlights of this term's activities were two convention trips to the fair as guests of Mission and Alameda High Schools respectively, a tour to a well known commercial industry, and the semi-annual banquet.




Poly's student body cheers the team on to victory.






