

The 1950 AAA prep football pennant siege came up with the most surprising and controversial argument of recent years.

The debate concerned a ruling by league officials which denied the Poly High gridsters the right to meet the Commerce Bulldogs in the long delayed championship game.

It was claimed that the Parrot's use of a so-called ineligible man (Jim Blankenship, all-city Parrot back) in the Semi-finals should disqualify them from entering the championship tilt.

Prep football enthusiasts, coaches, and sportswriters all agreed on the unfairness of the ridiculous, although legal, ruling. The decision prevented the Mechanics from snaring their fifth straight AAA crown.

Although the club missed out on the pennant race and the championship went to the Bulldogs, who the Parrots had whipped 7-0 earlier in the season, the Red and Black aggregation still held the spotlight for being what the prep sportswriters termed the "cream of the AAA grid crop." The plucky Parrots rolled up a total of 158 points while allowing their opponents only 37 points in six games.

The Red and Black not only claimed one of the best offensive teams in the city, it also had one of the best defensive teams.





POLY 19 — WASHINGTON 0

The fine punting of Jim O'Neil and Willie Sampson's two all important pass interceptions were the main factors in the Parrots 20-6 triumph over Lincoln.

The Red and Black drew first blood on Joe Escobar's 45-yard T. D. scamper in the first minutes. The Links came back to make it 7-6, Poly's favor at halftime.

end zone for the one and only touchdown. The ball was passed over for the final 7.







SECOND CONSECUTIVE CROSS-COUNTRY CHAMPIONSHIP FOR POLY

Poly's hard-working endurance men wound up the cross-country season very nicely, sharing championship with Washington. Before the All-City meet, Poly's runners were victorious in all their practice meets with other high schools. These victories were over Balboa, Tamalpais, Palo Alto, Commerce, and Saint Ignatius.

The five members of the team were Warren Fairbanks, Bill Rodarte, Dan Radke, Frank Wright, and Milton Howard.

In the championship meet, the best high school runners in San Francisco fought it out for supremacy. The meet was held on a marked course in Golden Gate Park, ending with a lap around the three-quarter mile track in the old stadium. It turned out to be a Poly harrier who conquered the pack of eighty-seven runners.

In a tremendous finish drive, Poly's Warren Fairbanks thundered past Washington's Gordon Lee to become the first runner in San Francisco's cross-country history to win the gruelling mile and one-half run for the Parrots.

Bill Rodarte of Poly turned in a powerful eighth place, and Dan Radke, Frank Wright, and Milton Howard sprinted it out, with Radke taking eleventh, Wright twelfth, and Howard fourteenth.

The team was also backed up by such outstanding runners as Bob Derrigan, Bob Knuth, Walter Knutson, Fred Quinn, and Stan Burrows.

Next year's team should be equally as great, with veterans Fairbanks, Wright, and Howard returning and with the same expert guidance to the newcomers from Coach Edgar Williams that fostered this year's team to championship.

POLY 120's



At graduation time, the Glee Club sang, "Land of Hope and Glory," and "Dear Land of Home."






Tea and Reception



Busily selling tickets for all athletic events was Larry Fjelstrom, athletic manager.


The task of trophy polishing and putting up of



At the date of journal publication, the Parrot horsehiders were in the midst of the Academic Athletic Association's greatest year since the early '40's.

The Poly organization inaugurated the season with a resounding victory over Galileo. The starting lineup for the season's opener found Frank Addiego on the mound, with Frank Hall doing the receiving. The Parrot inner defense had Bill Taft on first, Tom Murray at the keystone, and Willie Sampson shortpatching. The infield was rounded out by third-baseman Stan McCarthy.

The fly-chasers were Lou Hilbert in the left field, Bob Jackson in center and Paul Holshevnikoff in right.

Addiego allowed four hits in defeating them 7-2.

After the running start the Parrots were slowed down to a trot by Mission's heavily favored Bears, by a score of 6-1. The Parrots lone tally came in the first inning when Bob Jackson walked and registered on Frank Hall's rainbow liner into the center field. Bob Comer, Poly's ace righthander, held Mission in check until the fourth inning when Paul Holshevnikoff let Harold Kelley's grounder go through his legs giving Mission two unearned runs. The Bears scored three in the fifth and one more in the seventh.

Poly came out second best once more as Lincoln handed the Parrots an 11 to 6 loss. The Parrots' full pitching staff appeared in this game as Addiego was driven from the mound in the third inning. Bill Ellis, the Parrots' third pitcher of the game, was charged with the loss. Lou Fetterman, Lincoln hurler, held the Parrots to six hits. The Links broke the game wide open in the third inning with a six run outburst.

Frank Addiego notched his second victory of the season with a two to one conquest over Washington. Willie Sampson tripled across the winning run in the seventh inning.

The Parrots suffered their third defeat of the season at the hands of the Balboa Bucs by a six to two count.

Art McBride's triple with the bags loaded featured a five run third inning, that all but clinched the Balboa victory. Lou Hilbert and Bob Comer slapped out two hits for the Parrots.

The Parrots were defeated by Commerce 10-1. Not much can be said of this game as Joe Gaggero limited the Parrots to three hits. The Parrots had a two won and four lost record at the time of this writing, and were a longshot to wind up in the playoffs.

Poly's strong varsity track team is unbeaten at the time of this writing. The Parrot cindermen have had five meets thus far, and have won four of them by very large margins. Poly swept over Galileo $81\frac{1}{4}$ to $31\frac{3}{4}$, stopped Saint Ignatius 78 to 35, beat Lowell $68\frac{1}{2}$ to $44\frac{1}{2}$, and toppled Lincoln 101 to 12.

In our most important meet, we nipped Washington, the defending champions, 57-56. It was a meet in which every point counted. Without Schweindig's third in the mile, Greenley's third in the discus, and Ryner's surprise third in the 880, we would not have been victorious. The most crucial part of the meet was the high jump. It was the last event, and in order to win the






With all these outstanding spikemen, Track Coach Edgar Williams' outlook on the rest of the season is very high.


