IN APPRECIATION to Mr. Walter T. Helms

Having served the Richmond schools for 48 years, Superintendent Walter T. Helms will retire from his position on June 30, 1949. We, the Seniors of June 1949, wish to express our sincere appreciation and thanks to Mr. Helms for his loyalty, interest, and devotion in always furthering our education.

Mr. Helms, a native of San Lorenzo, Alameda County, is a graduate of Hayward Union High School, where he was presented with a "50-year" graduation diploma in 1946. He received his degree and general secondary certificate from the University of California. The San Pablo School trustees selected Mr. Helms as District Superintendent of Schools in July, 1901.

The growth of the schools in Richmond, Stege, and San Pablo was rapid when the Santa Fe Railroad Terminal and the Standard Oil Company refinery located here in 1901. In 1903 the San Pablo School District was divided into three sections: Richmond, San Pablo, and Stege. Mr. Helms transferred to Richmond.

Mr. Helms has served the Richmond Schools from the several small buildings and seven teachers with which he began in 1901 to the large efficient public school system of today.

During his years as superintendent, Mr. Helms met and overcame countless obstacles and problems. The rise of the schools' enrollment from 6,200 to 27,000 in a year and a half, the burning down of Roosevelt Junior High School, and war-time non-certificated teachers constituted only a few of the major problems which he skillfully dealt with and solved.

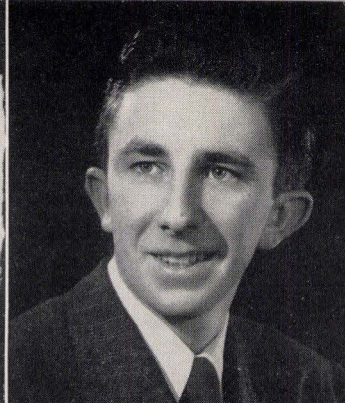
Mr. Helms has served as President of the California Teachers Association, on the Board of Directors of the YWCA, as Chairman of Richmond Red Cross, as President of the Rotary Club and as President of the California Horace Mann League. He founded the Richmond Health Center, an organization which he has led since 1922. All of his services are far too many to enumerate in the space at our disposal.

We, the members of the last class to benefit from his guiding hand, feel that it has been an honor and a privilege to have had Superintendent Helms, "the Dean of Contra Costa County Education," directing our course for the past twelve years. Thank you, Mr. Helms, for all that you have done for us, our city, and our state.

A.C.A.L. Highlights

Starting the season with only two lettermen, Coach Dick Christensen and a green Oiler basketball squad scrapped their way through an outstanding practice season against the best of local high school competition. Included in their 9-5 practice record were notable victories over Napa, North Bay Champs, and powerful McClymonds, winners in the O.A.L.

The opening ACAL game with Berkeley characterized the Oilers' fight during the rest of the league season. Giving way in height and experience but never in hustle, the Oilers were finally subdued 40-31. Captain Gene Valenti's great defensive play and Jimmy Brown's fifteen points spark-plugged the Oilers.

In their second game, the local cagers lost 34-20 on the Piedmont court. Gene Valenti led the Oiler scorers with 5 points, while Ron Walters rebounded well against the big Scots.

Pre-season favorites, Alameda dumped Richmond 50-36 on the home court. Rex McDougal and Jim Brown each hit ten points for the Oilers.

The Oilers finally began to roll as they overwhelmed the Albany Cougars 52-22. Center Dick Huffman seemed to put new life into the Blue and Red and poured in 14 points and played a great all around game.

With guard Rex McDougal shooting spectacularly, the Oilers overcame an early deficit to run away from Hayward 42-33.

Rex McDougal, assisted by "deadeye" Ron Ferrari, again saved the day as the Oilers beat traditional rivals, El Cerrito 31-29. Rex hit two hook shots in the final seconds to tie up the game. Dick Huffman canned a jump shot in the second overtime to win.

The entire second round saw the scrappy Oiler team threatening each of the league leaders but never quite getting over the hill. Jimmy Brown hit fifteen points for the second time as Berkeley edged the Oilers 45-41 in a thriller.

The Red and Blue avenged a previous loss by trouncing Piedmont 35-27. Captain Valenti and driving Duke Schale featured the Oilers play.

Duke Schale played the greatest game of his high school career against Alameda. Despite his 16 points and 14 by Dick Huffman, Richmond basketballers lost to Alameda 50-49 in a heartbreaking game.

Jimmy Brown and Ron Ferrari teamed up to lead the Oilers to another victory over Albany, 35-21.

After losing its second game to Hayward, the Richmond High basketball team met El Cerrito in the season's final game. Despite Rex McDougal's 14-point splurge and fine performances by Valenti, Schale and Huffman, the Oilers lost another heart-breaker 37-35 in the final seconds.

The Oilers ended the season with a fifteen won and thirteen loss record. The traditional All-American Blanket went to Captain Gene Valenti. Dick Huffman, for his fine academic as well as playing record, received the Redmen scholarship. Rex McDougal received a gold basketball in recognition of being the leading free throw shooter and first string all-ACAL guard. Jimmy Brown led the scorers with 20 points and made the second ACAL team. Duke Schale was second high scorer for the season. In addition to the above boys, the Block R was awarded to Ron Walters, John Noce, Richard Hill, and Ron Ferrari.

The J. V. team was comparatively short in height but made this up in scrap and fight. One outstanding factor on the "B" squad was the fact that the team was one machine. There was no one star and each player was a threat at all times. This extended through to the second and third teams.

The Oilers started their ACAL season with a closely fought battle which saw the Jackets edging out Richmond, 35-34. Bobby Doster and "Mutt" Goodwin played fine ball and scored 10 and 5 points respectively.

The Oilers had an easy time defeating Piedmont, 47-30, as Bobby Doster and Dan Taylor led the attack with 11 points each. The Oilers again were defeated by one point as they were edged out by a tall Alameda squad, 40-39. Again Taylor and Doster led the scorers with 12 and 10 points respectively. They received help from Dick Wilson, Soph guard, who scored 9 points.

Richmond defeated a surprisingly strong Albany squad, 48-47, as Doster and Youngblood scored 11 and 10 points respectively. 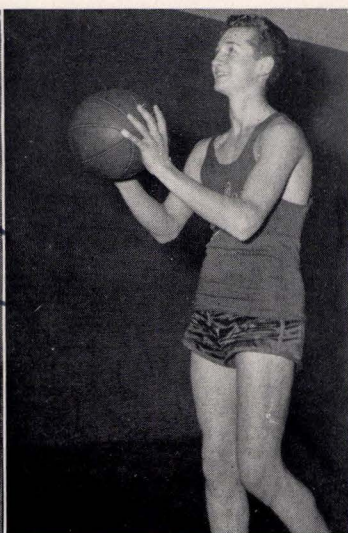


Upper left—Dick Huffman steals the ball from a surprised opponent from Poly.

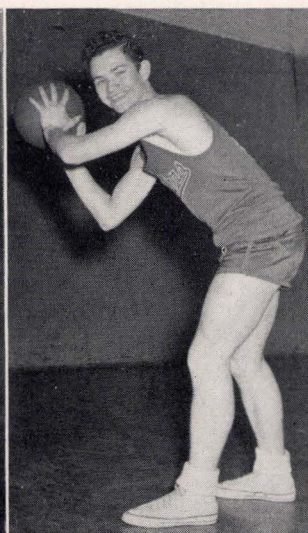




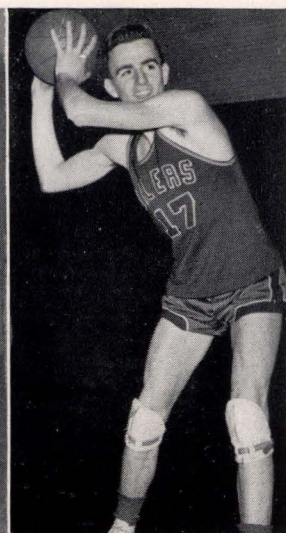

The Oiler cindermen, last year's ACAL and North Coast Section Track Champs, again came back with a strong team, winning the ACAL title for the third consecutive year and scoring a decisive victory in the sectional meet to win the North Coast Section Championship for the second straight year and again establish themselves as the outstanding track power in Northern California. Although hard hit by graduation, Coach Phil Hempler had four returning winners from last year to bolster his team. They were Dick Witham, in the hurdles; Bob Hudson in the sprints; Ray Hurlburt in the broad jump and George Molloy in the pole vault. With this nucleus and such boys as Ron Walters, Sol Mason, Dave Dixon, Gene King, and John and Jean Toffoli, to mention but a few of the 200 odd boys who turned out for track, this year's team steamrolled all opposition to compete their second straight year without a defeat and with but one dual meet loss in the past six years of competition against the strongest teams in this section of the state.

After the first four track meets were rained out, the Oilers got on the victory path by defeating Vallejo 75 to 38 on their oval. El Cerrito and Piedmont fell to the Oilers in a three-way meet 62-42-35. Lowell High, perennial San Francisco City Champions and one of the top track teams in the north, was overpowered by Richmond 63-50 in an exciting meet. The Oilers again won over El Cerrito in a dual meet 74 to 39. Napa fell to Richmond's onslaught by the one sided total of 93 to 19. The hardest fought meet of the season was with Tamalpais who finally succumbed to the powerful Oilers 61½ to 51½. The dual season ended with the Hayward meet in which the home team came through as expected, 85 to 27, for its eighth straight victory.

In winning the ACAL title the Oilers piled up 86½ points. El Cerrito was second with 43½, followed by Alameda with 42½; Berkeley 32; Piedmont 21; and Hayward with 10. Big winners for the Oilers were Bob Hudson in the 100 and 200-yard dashes,

Dick Witham and Ron Walters in the hurdles, Ray Hurlburt in the broadjump, George Molloy in the pole vault, Sol Mason in the 880, and Dave Dixon in the high jump. A new ACAL record of 20.6 was set by Witham in the low hurdles.

In winning the North Coast meet the Oilers became the first school in recent years to retain the title two years in succession and scored 60½ points to record the highest total ever made by a team in winning the coveted trophy. Pittsburg scored second with 35½ points. Bob Hudson scored a double win in the 100 and 200. Dick Witham placed first in the high hurdles and second in the low with Ron Walters taking fifth and third respectively in those events. Ray Hurlburt placed first in the broadjump and George Molloy won the pole vault. Solomon Mason took a third in the 880 while Dave Dixon tied for fifth in the high jump. Hurlburt, Witham, Walters and Hudson paced the relay team to a first place.

During the past year several Richmond School records were broken. Dick Witham set a new record in the low hurdles with a time of 20.6; George Molloy vaulted 12' 1½" to erase the old school mark; Dave Dixon high jumped 6' 1¾" for another record; and Bob Hudson tied the 100-yard dash in the time of 9.9 seconds. Co-captains elected by the team were Ray Hurlburt, George Molloy and Bob Hudson. Coach Bill Hempler has done a marvelous job this year and should be congratulated on his fine work. He was ably assisted by Weight Coach Bob Troppmann and Distance Coach Frank Porto, and the three coaches teamed together in an excellent job of developing a team which Richmond High may long be proud.

A stimulus for Richmond future track teams holding promise for new records was foreshadowed by the competition during the current season of a reconstruction job on the track which provided a 220-yard straight away as well as a one turn 440 to give us one of the outstanding tracks in the state.

By winning the 1949 ACAL track championship, the Richmond "B's" retained the undisputed title they have held for the past two seasons.

The opening meet of the season found the lightweights defeating Vallejo 75 to 18, indicating again that the Richmond "B's" would be serious contenders for the ACAL title. The following meet was a triangular affair, with El Cerrito acting as host to Richmond and Piedmont and was scored on a dual basis. Again the lightweights showed their power by downing both schools, the El Cerrito score being 58 to 27 while the Piedmont encounter soared to the tune of 75 to 20. With three victories under their belts, and the campaign well under way, the league leading Oilers suffered their first setback at the hands of the bigger Lowell Indians by a score of 69 to 27. Bouncing back in the win column, they competed on the local field for the first time and defeated Alameda 82 to 13, which made a nice home coming for the "Little" Oilers. Staying on the victory road the "B" squad kept their record intact by smothering Napa 83½ to 11½ on the visitors home field. Tamalpais was the next foe to succumb to the Oiler power when they traveled to our field to take the short end of a 73 to 22 count. The dual meet season came to a close with the Oilers meeting stiff competition at Hayward. Again the Richmond depth was too much and they defeated the Farmers 57½ to 37½. Leading competitors for the Richmond Lightweights were, Dave Emery, in the 100, 150 and broadjump; Bill Sartain, 660; Bill Doolittle and Ron Kauffman, pole vault; Phil

Shaffer, 330 and high jump; James Wiley, high jump; Dick McGee, Don Cherry and Jerry Harvey, hurdles; and Emery Phillips, Dave Whipple and Cliff Peters in the 8-lb. shot. This is just to name a few of the boys of the well balanced team that were responsible for the championship. In the ACAL finals the Lightweights amassed a staggering total of 77 8/15 points, which was 43 more than the next contender, Hayward, who scored 34 points, followed by Berkeley with 33 5/6; El Cerrito 29 2/5; Piedmont 17 2/5; Alameda 11 5/6; and Albany 5. The highlights of the ACAL meet were Phil Shaffer's new ACAL record in the 330 with the time of 38.5 and Dave Emery's 22¼ points which made him high scorer of the meet. The relay team, consisting of Don Wilcox, Richard Davis, Phil Shaffer and Dave Emery, upheld the record of past seasons by running to a decisive victory and retaining the relay title in the time of 46.5

In the North Coast section meet the local "B" squad again performed to advantage in scoring 26 5/6 points to place second to San Mateo with 37¾. Emery placed fourth in the 100 and fifth in the 75. Doolittle placed third in the pole vault with Kaufman fourth. Phillips scored a fourth in the shot and Shaffer won the 330. Wiley tied for first place in the high jump and the relay combination scored another victory to stage a fitting climax to a great season.

The efforts of outstanding sprinter and broadjumper, Dave Emery, and crack 660 man, Bill Sartain, were recognized by their teammates in electing them co-captains of this year's team.

A.C.A.L. Highlights

On March 8, 1949, Coach Bill Outman's Oiler nine opened its season by playing host to Mission. The game was called at the end of seven innings and ended in a 4-4 tie. Next came a practice game with El Cerrito. Richmond's last inning rally fell short by one run and the Gauchos won 3-2. Wally Hale chalked up two hits in three trips to the plate.

Richmond traveled to San Francisco to defeat the Mission nine, 8-1, under great pitching by Gene Stang. Stang also added three hits to his cause. Richmond tasted defeat, 5-2, at the hands of Fremont's Pitta who allowed but three hits. The Sacramento Dragons added to Richmond's defeats by downing the Oilers 3-1 on Richmond's diamond. Stang pitched and went the full distance plus three overtime innings. Joe Porter had a field day with three hits in four trips to the plate. Balboa next fell 5-4 under two-hit pitching by Stang and Hale. Porter and Hale each got two hits for the Oilers.

Revenge was sweet and the Oilers jumped on four Fremont hurlers for seven hits and ten runs and defeated Fremont, 10-1. Bill Weir got a single and a triple to further the cause. The Apaches bit the dust as Richmond defeated them 11-9. Bobby Doster got 2 hits including a triple. On April 5th Richmond handed the Cal Frosh a 7-5 defeat. Hale and Stang were on the mound for Richmond. Wally Hale got two doubles and a single and he accounted for 5 of Richmond's runs.

In the last practice game before the ACAL opened, Marin J. C. defeated Richmond, 7-6. Stan Jarvis pitched for Richmond. Joe Porter collected a triple, a double and a single on a wild hitting spree.

April 8th found Richmond facing El Cerrito on Seawright Field at Nicholl Park in the first ACAL game. The game was an extra inning affair and Richmond lost 8-7. Stang went the full game. During Easter vacation the Oilers defeated a strong alumni nine, 7-4. Ferrari and Smith pitched for Richmond.

In the second league game on April 19th, Richmond received the decision over Hayward, 4-3. Gene Stang, Oiler pitcher, allowed but three hits and issued only two walks while he struck out seven. Doster, Porter and Weir each got two hits for the Oilers. Next Acalanes went home defeated 5-2 by the Oilers under the three-hit pitching of "Spook" Smith.

Richmond bowed to Albany 5-4 on April 22nd. Jarvis started but was relieved in the pitching berth by Stang in the fourth inning. Porter, Meaders and Muratore each accounted for two hits for Richmond.

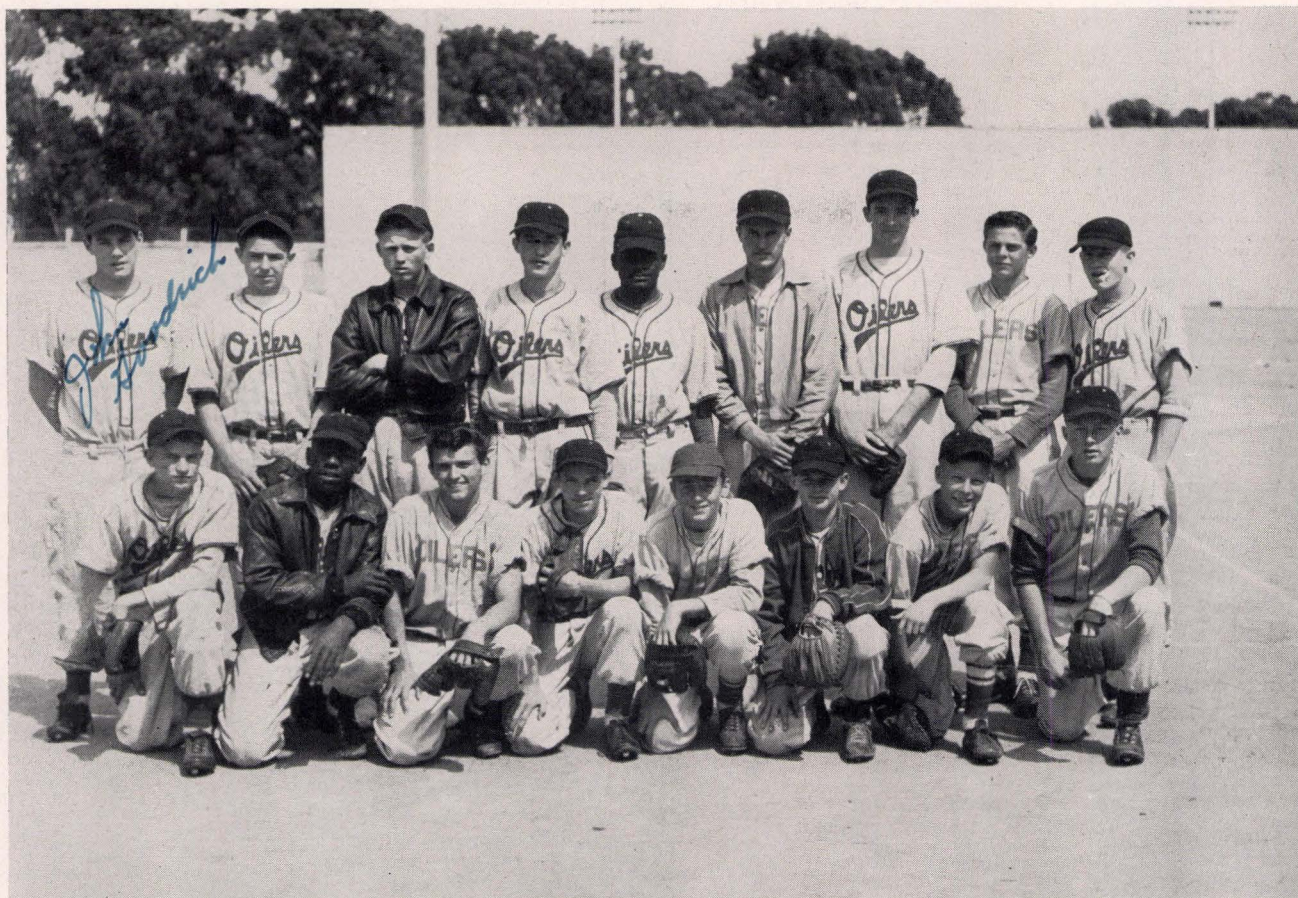
Alameda, hitherto undefeated in league play, fell 1-0 in a grueling pitchers' duel. Hexem, Alameda's hurler, pitched a perfect game until the seventh inning when Valenti's hard single to the left was booted and Valenti raced all the way around the bases. Stang allowed only two hits.

Berkeley traveled to Richmond on April 29th and went home with a victory of 2-1. Doster's clutch single drove across the only Oiler run. It was indeed a sad day when Richmond was again defeated by El Cerrito on May 3rd. Stang pitched for the Oilers and allowed but four hits but the Gauchos won 8-4. A.C.A.L. Highlights

The Junior Varsity Baseball Team at Richmond High is composed of the second and third string varsity players. All the other ACAL J.V. teams have been defeated at least twice.

The most impressive victories by Coach Jeff Yates' baseballers against Varsity Baseball Clubs were their 16-0 shut-out over San Rafael Military Academy and their win over Mt. Diablo.

The J.V.'s are composed of Juniors and Sophomores. A brief glance at the usual starters would show the following:
