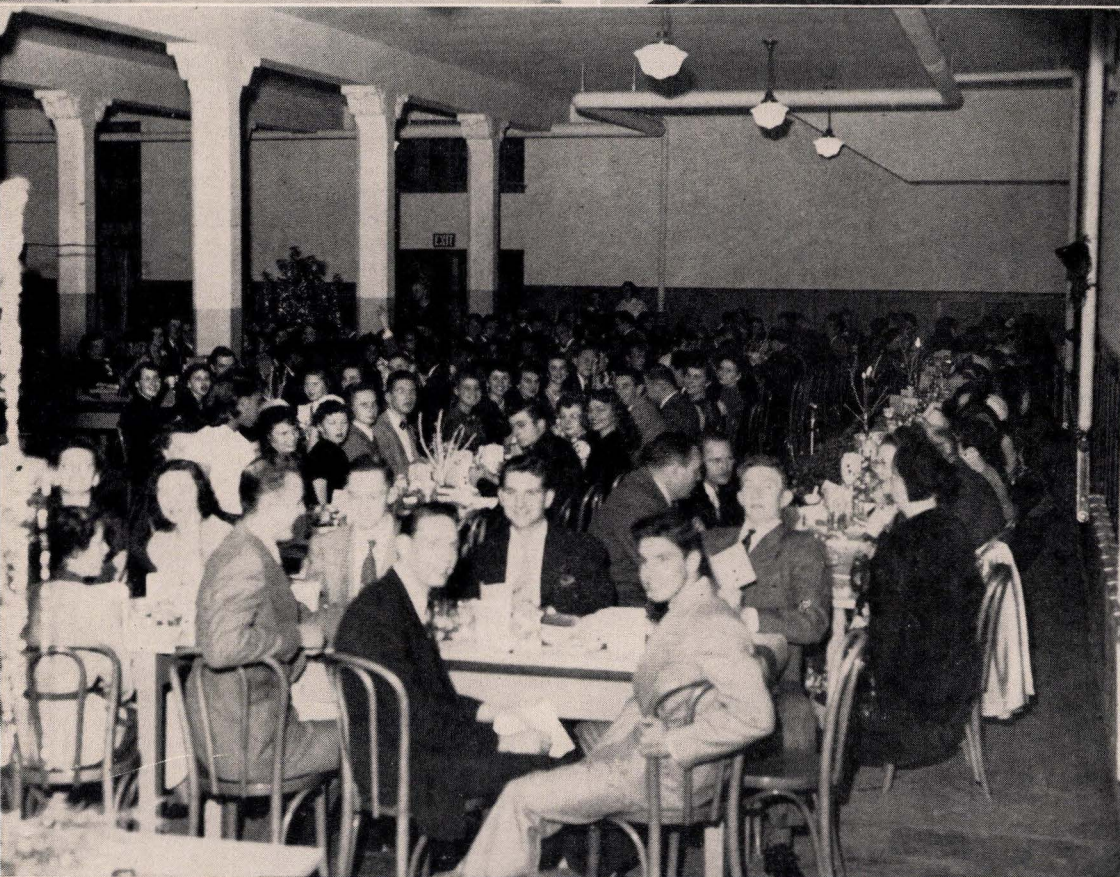

Varsity Football



The Richmond Oilers, trained by Mr. Joe Merlo, head coach; Mr. Bob Taupman, line coach, and Mr. Frank Porto, backfield coach, completed their football season with four wins and five losses.

In their first game of the season against the Napa Indians, the Richmond High School Football Team uncovered some of its potential stars of the 1949 football season in a 20-7 victory. Newcomers to the Oiler turf were Jim Colvin and Bill Eckles, who did the major part of the scoring. Quarterback Bill Glenn couldn't be topped in his running and passing.

Against the Woodland Wolves, the Oilers were down on the scoreboard by two touchdowns and a conversion at half time. The Richmond Oilers roared from behind in the third quarter and the opening of the fourth to take a 14-13 lead over Woodland, only to lose in the final two minutes of the game, 20-14, as a pass and lateral, good for 35 yards, and three line plays brought the Wolves a thrilling victory. A screaming crowd of 3,500 fans were thrilled to the core by the spectacular playing displayed by the two hard-hitting teams.

Bill Eckles scored the only TD against Oakland in a game where the visitors were victors with a 13-6 score to their credit.

Three pass interceptions, one of which resulting in a 75-yard runback for the winning touchdown, plus three fumbles and a backward bouncing punt, ruined the hard driving Oiler team's chances of a victory.

In Richmond's opening league game against the Berkeley Yellowjackets, the fighting Oilers faced a 26-13 loss to Berkeley, who twice had to rally and make good several "breaks" to down a stubborn, fired-up, ferocious Oiler gang of "cripples." The Oilers, fighting with every last ounce of strength and every bit of courage and grit they possessed, almost scored another whooping upset for Richmond. The half ended, 13-6, and Berkeley in the third period unleashed a pile-driving attack sparked by rocket-propelled Wally Jackson, fullback, who got the second Berkeley score. It was a three-yard buck, and he also was to get the last and clinching Berkeley score after the Jackets picked up a fumble. He streaked 30 yards for the last score against a tired, reserve, thin Oiler team.

At the first ACAL night game against Hayward the Oilers won a complete shutout with a 37-0 victory. Don Wilcox, halfback, scored three thrilling touchdowns and Jim Colvin came through with his usual long runs and a 65-yard dash for a TD.

In the second shutout of the season Richmond tromped over Albany in a 25-0 win. All touchdowns were scored on long runs of 34, 23, 60 and 84 yards. Jim Colvin, Lefty Kent and Lou Bennett were credited for the points.

A brilliant run from end zone to end zone by Jim Colvin was the basis for the only Oiler score of the day when the Richmond High School team bowed to Alameda, 21-7, after a tie score of 7-7 at halftime. The Oilers drove from their own 44 to the Hornet six but ran out of downs. In the third quarter Frank Peixoto recovered a fumble on the Hornets 28 and gave the Oilers a chance to score but luck wasn't with them that day.

Through the biggest heartbreaker of the season the Oilers fought and drove in one of their best played games of the year. The continual fight and drive of the Richmond team gave the Highlanders a fight to the finish. The final score of 25-24 gave the Piedmont congregation a victory on a missed conversion by Richmond.

A completely different team than the Oilers had displayed at any other time during the season came onto the field to play the last game of the season and to tromp the El Cerrito Gauchos to a score of 20-13. A large crowd saw one of the best games of

the league with some of the finest and cleanest ball handling of the season. The Oilers, who were picked to lose, led the game with two brilliant touchdowns in the first half, and they came on again in the second to keep the lead until the end of the game.

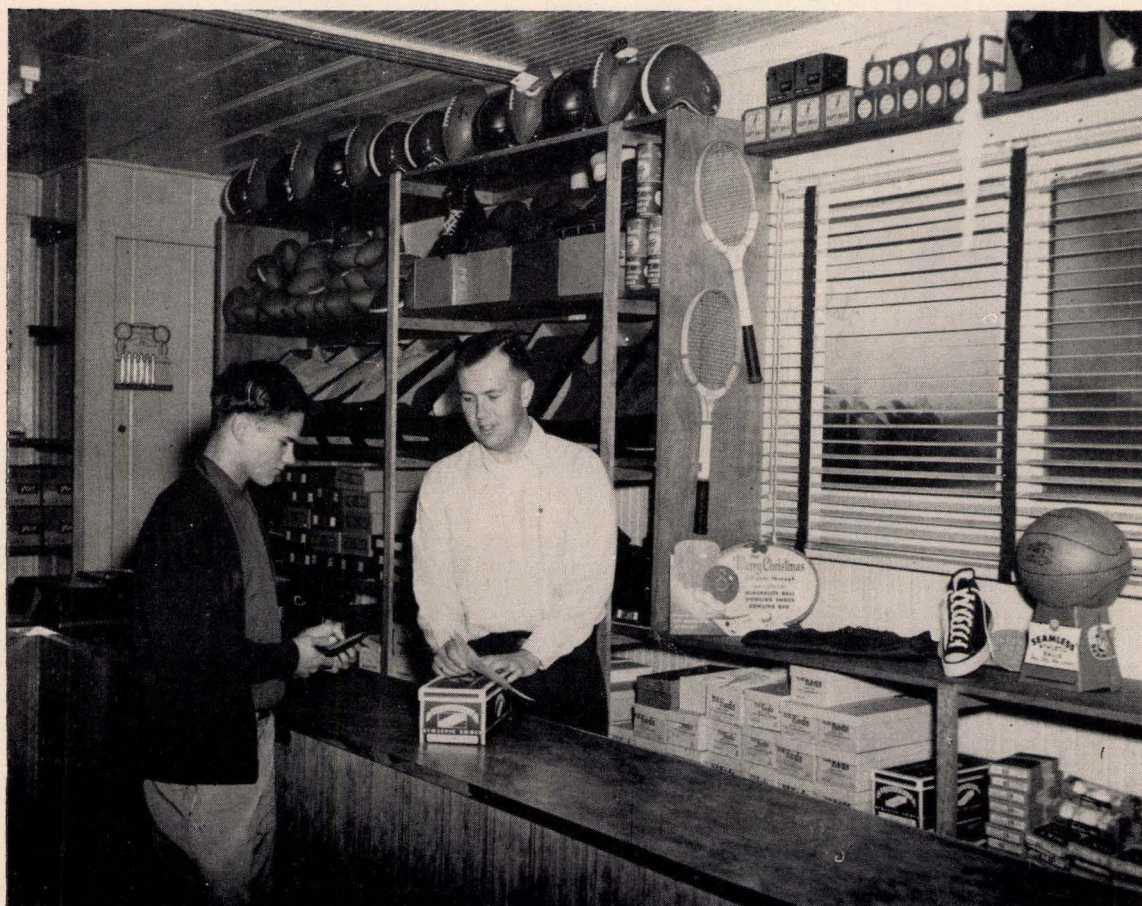
A safety was the margin between the "champs" and the runners-up. This result typifies the close action resulting from intramural play.

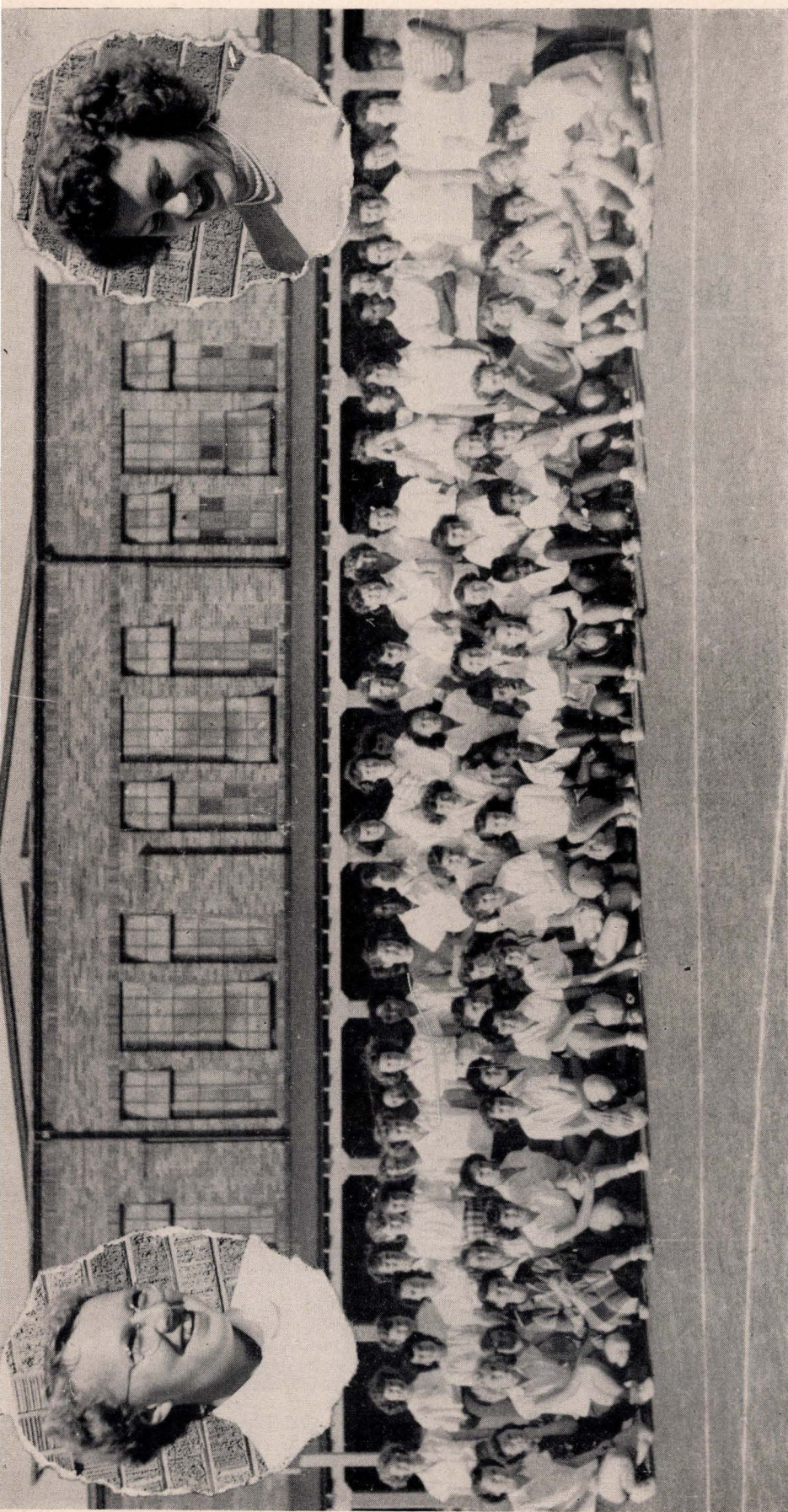

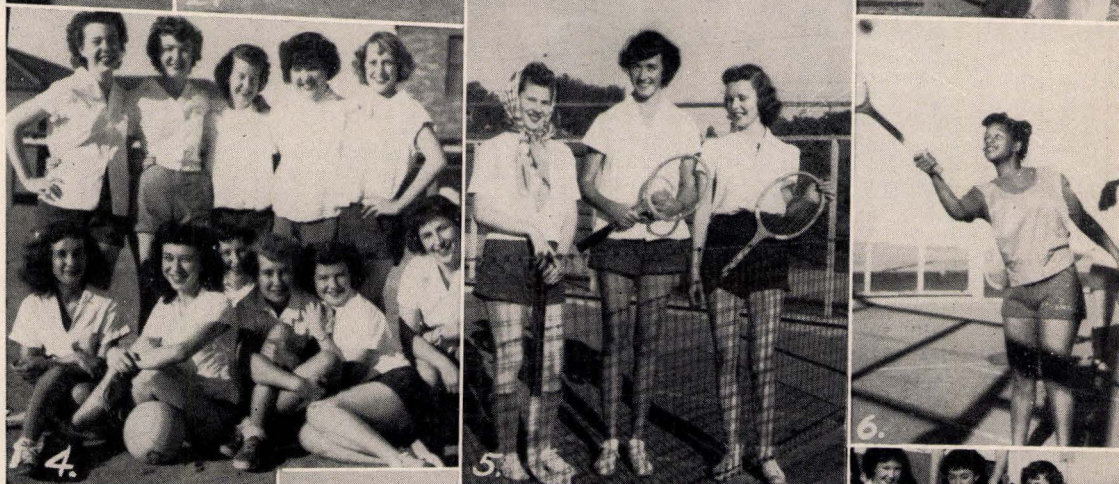
G.A.A. ACTIVITIES
