OILER HOOPSTERS TAKE SECOND PLACE

Despite the fact that the whole first string from last year's champions had graduated, the Dick Christensen coached Oilers came in second in the ACAL.

After a bad start, the Oilers came through with a record of 13 wins and three losses in practice games. Among the Oiler victims were San Leandro, Napa, Commerce, Sacramento, U.C. Lightweights, John Swett, Albany, Alumni, St. Elizabeth's, Oakland, Poly, Balboa and CCJC Reserves. Eural McKelvey with 187 points and Ron Ferrari with 146 points led the Oilers in the practice games. Ferrari scored 20 points in both the Napa and Commerce games.

The first ACAL game was with the Piedmont Highlanders on the Oiler court. The Highlanders had too much height for the Oilers and won 43-38. Willie Preston was the top scorer for Richmond as he bucketed 11 points. The Oilers broke into the win column the next time out when they traveled to Alameda. lead the game scoring. This game marked the end of Ron Ferrari's Richmond High playing days as he graduated in mid-season. Richmond was in third place at this time.







Mickey Quigley was the second best scorer in practice games but was hurt and missed much of the ACAL season. He contributed points at the end of the season to keep the Oilers in the race.


'B's' Win Eleven Out Of Eighteen

The Oilers opened against St. Mary's and found little opposition as they won 18-3. The big blow of the day was by Joe Porter as he blasted one over the center field wall 350 feet away. Bud McGee got credit for the win as he pitched the first four innings and gave up only three hits. The Oilers went ten innings before they got beat by Stanford Freshmen, 4-3. Mutt Goodwin lead the Oiler hitting as he got two hits in five tries. Dick Schroyer got the loss. The third game of the season was against the powerful Mission nine of S.F. Joe Porter did his best as he got two home runs and a triple in three times at bat to drive in seven runs, but it wasn't good enough as the San Franciscans won 8-7. Wilson gave up only five hits but he had to take the loss. A big fifth inning was all the Oilers needed to win against Pittsburg. Porter and Goodwin each homered to drive in two runs. Jimmy A. Landis also picked up two hits in four tries. McGee was the winning pitcher as he allowed only six hits, four of them in the first two innings. The Oilers let Acalanes get a two-run lead and then beat them 13-4. Dick Schroyer was credited with the win. Porter lead the hitting, as usual, with a double and a single. The alumni found the Oilers too strong as Richmond won 4-3. It was double day as Eddie Menosse hit two and Monty Urquhart and Mickey hit one apiece. The Oilers had their revenge against Mission as they beat them in the return match 9-4. The Oilers only got singles but it was enough. Menosse, Goodwin and Eural McKelvey each got two hits. McGee was the winning pitcher. Wilson pitched well and then hit well in the seventh inning to take the game against St. Ignatius 3-2. He got the side out and lead off the Oiler half of the inning with a double and scored the winning run. Wilson pitched a three-hitter the following game only to lose 3-2 to Sacred Heart. The Oilers beat Albany with one earned run and five unearned ones. Porter drove in the winning run in the seventh inning with a single. Ernie Fuller established himself as a varsity pitcher when he pitched a no-hit one run game and won 3-1. Fuller, a sophomore, was raised to the varsity just previous to this game. Vallejo was the loser. The second Acalanes game was worse than the first as Richmond rolled the Dons under 13-2. Porter, Menosse and Quigley all hit circuit blows to get the scoring high. Joe Porter tried the mound and gave up only one hit as the Oilers won 7-6. McGee helped Porter out of the seventh inning, retired one batter and got the credit for the win. Menosse got three for four in the hitting parade and Jim A. Landis drove in three runs. The Richmond nine found the California Frosh team easy pickings as the Oilers won 5-2. McGee limited the college boys to four hits. Quigley and Porter each got two for three to lead the hitting. Fuller was hot again when Richmond played Emeryville High as he pitched shutout ball and gave up only two hits. Fuller also picked up two hits himself to take hitting honors. Oakland Tech proved too much for Richmond and beat them 11-4. The Oilers couldn't get started and Oakland didn't wait around. The Oilers closed out the practice season with a 5-4 eighth inning win over McClymonds. Jim Anselmo was inserted and got a walk as expected in the eighth, was sacrificed to second and scored on a pass ball and an error to break up the game.

Richmond opened up the ACAL season with a win over Hayward, 7-4. Goodwin took hitting honors with three hits in four times at bat. McGee allowed only six hits as he pitched winning ball. McGee was back on the mound for the Oilers' second game in the ACAL and was robbed of a no-hitter by one lucky hit in the fifth inning by an Alameda outfielder. Jim H. Landis hit a home run into deep center field and made a sensational over-the-head catch to climax a winning day, Richmond 3, Alameda 0. A pitching duel between Richmond's Bud McGee and El Cerrito's Ernie Broglie was interrupted in the fifth by three long Oiler hits which were enough to win the game. Goodwin kept up his hitting spree as he got two for three. Richmond ended the game in front four to two. This meant that Richmond had split its series with the Gauchos. Ernie Fuller turned

in a pitching masterpiece against Hayward as he gave up only two hits and won 4-0. Jim A. Landis got two hits. The Oilers crushed Alameda 6-1 on McGee's three-hit pitching. Monny Urquhart hit two doubles and a single to lead the Oiler batters. The Oilers lost to Berkeley in the next to last game of the season. Fuller got the loss. This loss didn't count in the final standings as Berkeley was using ineligible men. The final game of the season was to make up a game that was rained out. Berkeley, with only eligible men playing, went down to defeat 4 to 3. Joe Porter hit a long homer with one on for the first two runs. In the sixth inning with two outs pitcher McGee helped his own game by hitting a single and then scored on Urquhart's triple. The winning run was scored when Jimmy Johnson got on second on a base error, was advanced to third on a wild pitch and scored when Mickey Quigley hit a pop fly to the infield which the catcher and the third baseman let drop between them. This game gave Richmond a tie for first with El Cerrito in the ACAL. The championship tie was a fine tribute for Coach Bill Outman who announced at the baseball banquet on May 23 that he was resigning as coach.

ACAL champions for the fifth straight year and North Coast Sectional champions for the third time in the last four years is the Oiler track team. 



Purley, Brown and the relay team got the best teams of their careers to take firsts. Purley won the mile in the excellent time of 4.33 and ran his opponents into the ground. Willie Brown cut .4 seconds off his previous best time in the 220 and won his race by four yards. He also won the 100 and ran the anchor lap on the winning relay team of Phil Shaffer, Wilbur Gary, Jack Harris and Brown. James Thomas took first in the low hurdles with Carl Turnipseed fourth. The Oilers scored 42 points which were almost twice as many as second place Vallejo. Willie Brown and Carl Turnipseed were elected co-captains for the season. Lawrence Purley was given the All-American blanket award.


