CHARLES FRANCIS GILBERT

1890 - 1951

With profound sorrow we, the Class of January, 1952, record the death, on December 3, 1951, of Charles Francis Gilbert, teacher of Metal Work and Vocational Machine Shop at Richmond Union High School since 1928. To his memory we dedicate this Shield with the hope that we may be able, in some measure, to express the deep affection held for him by his friends, colleagues and students, as well as their feeling of loss at his passing.

Necessarily, the specialized subjects which Mr. Gilbert taught limited the opportunity of great numbers of students to know him. This fact, we feel, was most unfortunate, since Mr. Gilbert was not only a great teacher, but also a great man. He was born in Byron, Minnesota, educated in the schools of Albuquerque, New Mexico, and the University of New Mexico, and attended the University of California at Berkeley and Los Angeles, and the University of Oregon. Before he came to Richmond Union High, Mr. Gilbert worked for the Standard Oil Company and for the Santa Fe Railway as a machinist. Such a varied background was further enriched and leavened by wide and studious reading in which he delighted and the fond practice of touring the American countryside. Especially he knew and loved all the National Parks. To his subjects of Metal Work and Vocational Machine Shop he brought the talents of a master mechanic who could do practically anything well. He never wearied of trying to communicate to his students whose training he watched over carefully and patiently, that love of perfection which invariably went into his own work.

Able, gracious, quiet, and of penetrating discernment, he respected the rights and opinions of others. He never made a judgment without first bringing to bear upon the person or situation a sharp power of analysis and a superb sense of fairness. Without doubt, the loss of Mr. Gilbert is not only personal loss to all who were associated with him, but to the school which he served so faithfully and so well. An outstanding source of its soundness and strength has been taken away.

A.C.A.L. TITLE HOLDERS FOR 1951


CHAMPIONS FOR THE FIRST TIME SINCE 1939! With a record of nine wins and no losses or ties, the Richmond Union High School won the Alameda County Athletic League Championship in football for 1951. The Oilers dominated the league in every department. The Richmond team was first in offense and defense. John Sullivan led the entire league with 25 points, followed by Mickey Quigley with 24. Calvin Moore, Wilber Gary, and Greg Hearn, Oiler backs, were leaders in individual rushing for the season. Quigley placed second in individual passing with 23 completions, good for 274 yards, in six games and 19 completions in 37 tries in five league contests. Coaches Joe Merlo and Joe Vargas were able to put together a winning combination in every game and this is the first year since 1934 that an Oiler football team has won every game.

RICHMOND 33—NAPA 0

As the new football season got underway, the Oilers brought a new kind of hope for a successful season in the hearts of the students of Richmond High by trouncing the Napa Indians by a score of 33 to 0. Richmond scored first when Greg Hearn rammed through a giant-sized hole in the middle of the Indian line. Quarterback Mickey Quigley then bootlegged skillfully around left end for the final seven yards of a 37-yard march. Big Boy Pete Champlin, Oiler center, recovered a Napa fumble and again the Oilers went over for another T.D. Quigley passed to Sullivan for 5 yards, Moore went for another 5 and then over right tackle for another T.D. Several plays later Gary piled over left guard for six points after set-ups by Hearn and Moore. Long passes by Hearn and Quigley kept a long Oiler drive moving before Quigley went over on a quarterback sneak for the final points. Tony Ott kicked two conversions and Hammond one.



RICHMOND 29—McCCLYMONDS 25

The Richmond Oilers won one of the finest games of the season by just barely holding the McClymonds Warriors down to a close score of 29-25. Coach Joe Merlo found that he would have to replace the second string backs on defense in order to stop and to slow down the fighting Warriors. Quigley, Moore and Gary had to work a double-shift on both offense and defense. It was Tony Ott's conversions that helped make the difference in the score. It was Ott who punted a 68-yarder which rolled dead on the McClymonds' two-yard line and this set up the Oilers' fourth quarter safety.

The Oilers just couldn't be stopped on offense. Moore and Gary went around the Warriors' ends and then they bolted through the middle when the Warriors had the ends checked. Hearn and Quigley passed for a total of 71 yards and a T.D. when it came time to pass. Remarkable Joe Rich made a catch of Hearn's 35-yard sidearm pass. Quigley then pushed over from the three. Benny Hammond made a three-yard shot through center after an Oiler 60-yard drive for the last and final Oiler T.D.

The 26 to 0 victory over the Oakland Wildcats probably gave the Oilers enough stamina to complete the season undefeated. Oiler halfback Cal Moore made the first touchdown in the game by cutting inside the Oakland right end for a 69-yard run. In the third period of the game, Hearn returned the Wildcat kickoff to the Oiler 27. Drives by Hearn, Allen, Moore and a pitch-out from Quigley to Rich brought the Oilers up to the Oakland 13. Moore went up to the 6-yard line and pushed through the middle for a T.D. The conversion was good, which was kicked by Tony Ott. Mitchell scored the next T.D. after a long Oiler drive from their own 47. Ott's conversion was again good to give the Oilers a score of 20 to 0. Elmo Bradley, Oiler quarterback, made the final T.D. in the game.

The Oilers had scored and lead with only one touchdown during the first three quarters of the Richmond-Hayward game. The last touchdown was scored after another long drive of approximately 71 yards. Tony Ott kicked a field goal. The touchdowns were scored by Quigley, Moore, Sullivan. Field goal and conversions were by Ott.

RICHMOND 14—BERKELEY 13

The Berkeley Yellowjackets, the team that hadn't lost a game for the past seven years, was finally forced to give up the ACAL Championship to the Richmond Oilers by a score of 14-13. A crowd of 3500 people watched a surprising game when the Oilers, being the underdogs during the first half, came back to completely outplay the Yellowjackets in the second half. When Richmond had possession of the ball, Gary, on the first down, struggled his way through the line of scrimmage at right guard and headed to the left side line and raced for a touchdown. Late in the same quarter Gary took a tossout from Quigley and outran the Jackets from the Richmond 46-yard line for the second touchdown. Tony Ott's conversions were both good and won the game for Richmond.





Greg Hearn, Oiler fullback, lunged over right tackle to make the first score of the game. Later in the first quarter, the Oilers launched a 48-yard drive, which made it possible for Gary to score a T.D. between right guard and tackle. The third Oiler touchdown came when Oiler Joe Rich snagged a Hornet pass and made a 58-yard run down the sidelines for a T.D. Richmond had not completed a pass during the game, but left the field at halftime with 197 yards gained from rushing.

In the third quarter Dan Holbrook, middle linebacker in the Oiler 5-3-2-1 defense, intercepted a Hornet pass to give the Oilers possession of the ball once more. Two plays after this, Gary ripped over guard for 36 yards to bring the ball up to the six. Moore went over to score from the one. Elmo Bradley, Oiler safety man, leaped high in the air to intercept a Hornet pass and fell on the Richmond two-yard line. Two passes from the end zone failed and Hearn tried for another pass but drifted back too deep to step out of the end zone for a safety. Oiler halfback Sid Mitchell dashed 38 yards for the final Richmond T.D. Tony Ott and Benny Hammond each kicked two conversions during the game.

Richmond First Downs—9; Alameda—11. Total yards gained—Richmond 302; Alameda 169.

RICHMOND 19—EL CERRITO 0

The Richmond Oilers had encountered trouble only at the very first of the game. From then on the Oilers had complete control for an easy victory of 19 to 0. With possession of the ball and with a few plays the Oilers moved from the El Cerrito 28 to pay dirt. This was done by fullback Grey Hearn and Gary driving over tackles to gain yards, and by Quigley passing to Rich and Sullivan. The second Oiler touchdown came after a 64-yard march which consisted of drives by Moore, Hearn, and Gary in spite of a 15-yard penalty. Then came Moore for another drive for 9 yards, then a Quigley to Sullivan pass and a touchdown by Sullivan. Joe Rich made the final T.D. after a 59-yard play. Ott kicked one conversion during the game. Richmond First Downs—10; El Cerrito—5. Total yards gained—Richmond 283; El Cerrito 91.

RICHMOND 33—SACRED HEART 0

The Richmond Oilers completed their first undefeated season for many years when the last game of the season was won from Sacred Heart, 33-0. There were 80 players who took part in this game—Sophomores, Junior Varsity and Varsity squads. The scores were made by Gary with a 17-yard dash around right end, Norman Allen with a 34-yard run, Hammond with a one-yard shot into the middle, Gary over left tackle, and a 25-yard run by John Sullivan. Ott kicked one conversion and Hammond kicked two. Richmond First Downs—14; Sacred Heart—5. Total yards gained—Richmond 307; Sacred Heart 25.

The Richmond Varsity had 16 returning veterans on the team this past season, but the outlook for next fall is not so bright. Calvin Moore will be the only one returning in the backfield combination of Moore, Quigley, Gary, and Hearn. The following members will graduate this year: Quigley, Bradley, Hearn, Gary, Holmes, Champlin, Roberts, Williams, Holbrook, Ellison, Shephard Brammeier, Olds, Brandenburg, Golden, Dixon, Barrios, Rich, Sjostrand, Rhinehart, Sullivan and Pearson. These men were the backbone of the Oiler team and will be difficult to replace next fall.


