



They now belong to us as alumni, and as alumni may they share with us the college as it will be in the years to come.










#### FACULTY COUNCIL







#### **BOARD OF DIRECTORS**

The Board of Directors holds the executive power of the Associated Students, a non-profit corporation. Composed of thirteen student and three faculty members, it legislates in the interest of the student body at large and supervises the execution of a wide program of student activities. Through delegation to subordinate boards for specialized areas, appropriate policies are developed to give substance to student wishes for a campus government providing services for a more enjoyable and educationally stimulating campus life outside the classroom. The student members of the Board are the five major officers of the corporation and eight legislative representativesat-large, all selected by general student body election. Presiding is Nick Cretan, President of the Associated Students and executive officer of the corporation.

#### BOARD OF CONTROL

Under Associated Students Treasurer, Jim Warford, the Board of Control sets financial policy for the student body, and budgets and controls the expenditure of student funds. These are disbursed to support: publications and forensics; athletics and recreational activities; musical, dramatic, and other creative arts productions; student leadership conferences and special trips for outstanding students; lecture series and other cultural events; as well as dances and other social activities for the entire campus. It is the Board's aim to administer student body funds in such a way that every student benefits therefrom.

# BOARD OF PUBLICATIONS

To the Board of Publications is delegated the supervisory responsibility of the Association over its publications. These are: the bi-weekly newspaper, the Golden Gater; *Transfer*, in which are published the creative writings of students and faculty; the orientation handbook for new students, the *Alligator*; and, this, your yearbook, the *Franciscan*. The Board, in effect, is the publisher of these organs, defining overall editorial and business policies, but in such a way as to leave their editors with a large measure of individual freedom and responsibility, so vital to any publication. #### JUDICIAL COURT

And, even more important, it is constituted to handle matters of student conduct regarding both individuals and campus organizations, recommending appropriate action in cases of violation of Associated Students and College regulations. This should, over a period of years, become a significant factor in student body affairs.

#### BOARD OF ATHLETIC CONTROL

By law, the responsibility for the conduct of inter-collegiate athletics is vested in the President of the College; but, in practice, he delegates and shares this responsibility with the the Board of Athletic Control which is composed of both student and faculty members. The Board establishes and revises general policies for the conduct of inter-collegiate athletics; negotiates with the Board of Control and Board of Directors regarding financial agreements; approves a detailed athletic budget; determines policies for scheduling inter-collegiate contests; and acts upon the recommendations of the Director of Athletics for the granting of awards. Traditionally, a student voting member has been selected chairman, this year Paul Aehnlich, and the General Manager of the Associated Students, secretary, of the Board.


The Business Office is headed by James Adams, general manager of the Associated students. He serves in a supervisory position in administering the many individual, organization, and all campus services.

### ALPHA OMEGA



The A.F.R.O.T.C. is a course designed to train college educated students for a commissioned career in the United States Air Force, primarily for duty as a pilot or a navigator. Under existing regulations the freshman Air Force R.O.T.C. student, after a period of observation, may be deferred from selective service call throughout his college career, provided that during those four years, he continues to meet the high academic and military standards expected of a potential officer.




Bib 'n' Tucker has just concluded a busy and productive year, with Anita Vieites as the president.




at S. F. State. By giving recognition to outstanding students in those areas and by giving student scholarships, it has helped to achieve that purpose.

## THE COMMONS



#### STYLE SERVICE

The Style Service is located in the Arts and Industries building. It is maintained by the college to advise students on proper campus attire and wardrobe planning. ## BLOOD DRIVE

The San Francisco State College All-Campus Blood Bank began as an effort to help a hemopheliac student, James Garner, in 1954, and has grown into an all-campus function which was formally established in the Fall of 1957.

The Bank is open to all students, faculty, and staff of the college and members of their immediate families. They are not required to be donors nor are they obligated to replace credits to be eligible to use the blood reserves. This is due to the response of the campus community to the two drives held so far in February 1958 and in September 1958.

Since February 1958, forty-four pints have been dispensed. These pints assisted in a wide range of cases, such as: filling a circulating machine which duplicates heart action during a heart operation, and replacing blood lost by a child who suffered first degree burns from the waist down. The Blood Drive has become a permanent campus service which benefits its entire community.

The organizations who served to make the September 1958 drive a success are: Arnold Air Society, *publicity*; Art Club, *posters*; Creative Arts workship, *quota bottle*; Golden Gater, *newspaper coverage*; Kappa Theta, *canteen*, Newman Club, *appointment book*; Radio-TV Guild, *publicity*; Social Work Club, *coordinator*; and Student Nurses Association, *registration table*.

The groups and organizations who donated in the September 1958 drive are: A.F.R.O.T.C., *highest proportion of donors*; Delta Gamma Tau, Faculty of San Francisco State College, Kappa Theta, Newman Club, Sigma Pi Sigma, Social Work Club, Staff of San Francisco State College, and Students of San Francisco State College.



#### BUS STOP



Children's Theater presents plays for children's audiences using college students as actors. The purpose of these presentations is to give children the experience of seeing live stage shows.


An active program in Creative Dramatics gives children from the campus school an opportunity to express themselves through drama.















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## THE CENTER

The Santa Rosa Center is an off-campus residence center offering upper division courses leading to bachelor of arts and education degrees and general elementary credentials.

Thirty classes and seven seminars for student teachers, teachers, and interns were provided by the faculty of nine full-time and three parttime instructors for some 225 students during the Spring semester.

The Center offers the special advantages of a small college. Relatively small classes permit teachers to give more personal attention to the individual student's work.

During the Spring term, student ages ranged from twenty to fifty-seven, the average age being thirty-three. One third of the students were forty years of age or over, a third were from thirty to forty, and a third from twenty to thirty.




## STUDENT ACTIVITIES
