The theme of the graduation was the modern interpretation of America's constitution. Girls who spoke on the subject were selected by Miss Jane Comings, dean of girls, the boys, by Principal Francis J. McConville, on the basis of scholarship, high school achievement, and public speaking ability. Mrs. Marion Hedrick Bain had general charge of the exercises.





TRACK

SWIMMING


