JAMES J. BURKE

★ Ever since 1928, Mr. James J. Burke has been president of the Santa Rosa Board of Education, and has worked harder, and worried more than most of us imagine over the problems of our local schools, and in particular, over those of the high school. Farmer, philosopher, shrewd educational realist, Mr. Burke was among the first to realize that the needs of young people in an agricultural community are not purely academic needs. At the same time he acknowledged that courses in "Belles Lettres" are necessary in a school from which numerous graduates go in to institutions of higher learning. ★ ★ While not consenting to lower the academic standards of Santa Rosa High School, therefore, Mr. Burke has through the years devoted his energies to the upbuilding of a scientific training school in our institution for the future farmers of Sonoma County. This goal was achieved beyond our most daring expectations when, on December 15, 1940, Burke Hall, a \$50,000.00 building to house our agricultural department, was dedicated. ★ ★ We, the students, salute you, Mr. Burke, for your part in this important step in the progress of our school, and in appreciation of what you have accomplished, we dedicate this, our yearbook, to you. In the years that are to come, may we emulate your example of perseverance in the interests of our county, state, and nation!



## BURKE HALL

★ The newest building on our campus, Burke Hall, houses our agricultural laboratories, shops, classrooms, and library. It is everything a school building should be: Earthquake-proof, air-conditioned and thermal insulated, with lighting controlled by an electric eye, walls covered with acoustical plaster and floors with rubber tile. Besides these features, it is so spacious and of such workman-like appearance that everyone who has business there, students and teachers alike, has discovered a new zest in doing the job before him. Conspicuous as you enter the building is the display case which contains over sixty state and national trophies won by members of the Santa Rosa Chapter of the Future Farmers of America. At present this organization has some 120 members, who are under the direction of four specially trained instructors. Burke Hall, at the western end of our forty-five-acre campus, completes the quadrangle formed by the vocational shops on the north, the Sarah Pryor Music Building on the south, and the main school building, with the gymnasium and the auditorium on the east. It is the culmination of a project which makes Santa Rosa High School a model for all other school districts similar to Santa Rosa. We now have a school worthy of the county seat of the sixth richest agricultural county in the United States!




# IN APPRECIATION



★ Unusual achievement marks the twenty years of service rendered by Dr. Jerome O. Cross as City Superintendent of Schools in Santa Rosa. Credit for raising the local system from one of average to one of extraordinary rating is due largely to his vision and fine administrative capabilities ★★ A progressive building program has marked the superintendency of Dr. Cross and during his term both the City of Santa Rosa High School District and the City of Santa Rosa School District have undergone reorganization. New sites were obtained and, with the exception of the junior high school, each unit, both high and elementary, was replaced by a new, thoroughly modern and well-equipped building. ★★ Not alone the schools, but the entire community, bears the indelible imprint of his thoughtful planning and executive acumen. Dr. Cross took a leading part in bringing the Santa Rosa Junior College District into existence, and was no less instrumental in promoting the organization and growth of the Sonoma County Symphony Orchestra, which he has served for thirteen years as its business manager. ★★ The Rotary Service Club honored him as its president, and the Boy Scouts have considered him one of their best friends and most ardent supporters. President of the Santa Rosa District Committee of the Boy Scouts of America, Dr. Cross possesses the coveted Silver Beaver Award which is given only to those men who have rendered distinguished service to Boyhood. ★★ Dr. Cross has given lavishly of his thought, time, money and energy to one civic project after another. He demanded only that the project be worthy, and that it contribute the greatest amount of good to the largest number of people. "A bigger and better Santa Rosa, and a finer and more efficient school system" was his unalterable creed. ★★ Jerome O. Cross will long be remembered as one of Santa Rosa's most able and stimulating citizens. The best wishes of the student body, faculty and Board of Education are extended to him in sincere appreciation of his years of unselfish loyalty and devotion to the city and to the schools of Santa Rosa.






LLOYD K. WOOD

# FEBRUARY SENIORS






# Governing Board-Fall








# SANTA ROSAN



## Girls' - Boys' Glee



## Girls' Drum - Band








# Forum - Laurean

# French - Japanese






# Ra Ravas - Block "S"




# Red Cross - Philomel




A fairy kingdom come true











