
PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

Barbara Baker, Jane Degner, and Peggy Harbold were our "Song Leaders."






The annual Block "S" dance was again the social highlight of the year, being well attended and enjoyed.




It was only appropriate that Biagi receive the coveted blanket award, and that he did, with Jerry Bick being selected as captain.


