






A Bright Future For A Colorful Class





THE LONG AND WINDING ROAD


WE MAKE DUCK SOUP


Dear Students,




SUPER SOPHS SWEEP SEASON

The coaches are looking forward to see the 1978 Sophmores perform at Varsity level in the coming year.






A Disappointing Season








Small But Strong






Short Season For C's




This year's "D" basketball team was very well diciplined and ended their season with a 3 and 3 record, therefore advancing to the playoffs.






SLOW START

When asked if the team fulfilled his expectations, Coach Mullin replied, "I expected them to perform to the level of their ability, and they did."








High Expectations






WHEN IT COMES TO SPIRIT






