




Lunch over, you head to your next class, and resume your studies, always with one eye on the clock.






Finally the long awaited bell signalling the end of school rings and you join the mad rush to lockers and buses.

Our "co-educational" school of 2400 students was quite different from her girls' school of 400 in Germany, not only in size and courses of study, but in the comparatively short American school day and year. Speaking and understanding our language was difficult at first, but with the help of teachers and friends, Crista now does very well.

Crista enjoys very much the many clubs and football games. Of the dances she says, "I just love them. I think I haven't missed a single one up till now and I am going to miss them very much when I go home."

After her enjoyable stay, filled with fun, opportunity, and experience in the American way of life, Crista will leave Vallejo in June. After a three-week tour through other parts of the United States, Crista will return to her home in Germany. It has been a privilege and pleasure to have her here. I know we all join in wishing her success, good fortune, and fond memories of Vallejo Senior High.


FOOD DRIVE

"Every one of the students did something for the history of Vallejo and rooting section in general. They deserved what we can call an All-America Championship Award for Excellence."





All three nights the audience was thrilled by the Vallejo High Pom-Pom Girls' excellent performance.











Driver Training at Vallejo Senior High is under the able instruction of Mr. Knapp, Mr. Leonard, and Mr. Yarnell.

The Driver Training equipment was purchased and installed in the summer of 1959 at a cost of about \$20,000. The cars cost \$16,000, the recorder \$2,000, the films \$1,000 and the cables about \$1,000.

The Drivo-Trainers teach the ways to manipulate the controls of a car and the basic fundamentals of driving. In these cars one can experience night driving and freeway driving through films. After 12 days of instruction in the Aetna Drivo-Trainers, the students have 12 days of driving cars donated by various Vallejo car dealers.

STUDENT COURT

Students who have been reported by teachers or student councilmen for violating certain school rules, such as those prohibiting littering or smoking on the school grounds, are subject to trial by the student court. The court meets at least twice a month during seventh period. It is composed of twelve student members and the advisor, Mr. Jones. The offices held by the students are the Chief Justice, eight associate justices, two scribes and a bailiff. When a student is brought before the court, he is given an opportunity to speak in his own behalf and to give an explanation for his alleged misconduct. After the student has appealed to the court, he is dismissed from the courtroom while the student court members decide, by majority rule, to what degree the student is guilty, and by what means he should be punished. The student is then brought back into the courtroom and told the decision of the court. Another major function of the court is the counting of all ballots in student elections.


Junior Varsity

Problems Committee

The Youth Problems Committee was formed early during the school year in order to better relations among students. After electing officers and appointing committees, the group held weekly discussion meetings.




