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
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


# Administration and Faculty







## ENGLISH DEPARTMENT

The English department, the largest in the school, truly reflects the atmosphere of the comprehensive high school.

It offers courses to meet the needs and interests of each student.

After the compulsory courses of English 3-6 have been completed, the senior student who wishes to improve his composition skills has a choice of Advanced Composition, English Review or English Essentials. Other electives include Contemporary Literature and World Literature for the student who enjoys reading and studying in depth great pieces of literature from the time of Homer to the present. Drama is for those who are attracted by the glamour of the foot-lights; Journalism, for those who take pride in publishing our school newspaper, the CENTURION; Yearbook, for the students who enjoy capturing the school's activities for posterity; and Public Speaking, for those who wish to develop their skills of oral discourse. A new development in the English curriculum is Advanced Placement English, a course for academically talented students who can begin college work while still in high school.

Woodrow Wilson is fortunate to have such a good and broad curriculum and such an outstanding department to impart this knowledge.

## SOCIAL STUDIES DEPARTMENT

Woodrow Wilson has an abundant variety of history courses offered to its many students under the direction of Mr. Metros. (Mr. Barnett was formally the department head, but this semester he is on sabbatical leave. We all know that these courses are stiff competition since they're based on a college level.

There are presently thirteen teachers providing a stimulating program so that all the students can be well informed about past American history as well as present day economic problems.

Besides the required classes of U.S. History I and II and Civics, there is a choice of a few electives for history majors. These selections are World History and Global Geography which are helpful to students planning to attend college to further their education. A new course offered this semester is Advanced Placement History. This course gives college credits and is an acceptable history course in college.







There's no doubt that Wilson has one of the best furnished business departments in the city, according to the department head, Miss Gallagher.


Since the beginning of Wilson's existence the business department has been beneficial to former students by preparing them for positions as stenographers, typists, and file clerks in many kinds of business offices.

## LANGUAGE DEPARTMENT

You have your choice of five languages at Woodrow Wilson: Italian, French, German, Latin, and Spanish. It is of benefit to each individual to know another language besides English, and the language teachers at Wilson provide this opportunity.

Mr. Fernandez heads the Language Department, and offers the courses of Spanish and French. His right hand aids are Mr. Morelli, teaching Italian, Mr. Rudee, Mr. Rueda, Mr. Oberhausen teaching Spanish, Mr. Metros instructing German, and Mr. Nuti teaching the basis of all languages, Latin.

In all the language classes, students are required to learn proper pronunciation and grammar. Literature is offered in the advanced classes. For example, Mr. Morelli's Italian 7 & 8 students strived earnestly to translate an involved book of literature pertaining to famous men such as Michelangelo, Galileo, Marconi, and Cellini.

In the beginning Spanish classes students are instructed by dialogues and records. At least it's a different method and keeps the students interested.

So, for those of you who are hesitant about taking a language, come alive and take advantage of such an opportunity for the benefit of yourself and the country you live in.

An economical savings is being able to sew. Everyone wishes she could sew, but only the determined one succeeds.

For the beginning sewers, Mrs. Wiese and Miss Shamlian teach their students to sew simple clothing and familiarize themselves with the fundamentals of simple construction. In Advanced Clothing the students compose anything from lined garments to floor length formals to elaborate outfits with accessories of hats and purses to match.

The tremendous favorite of most girls this year is Clothing Selection. Mrs. Mansfield's methods of teaching added to the success of this course pertaining to good-grooming. The purpose of this course is to encourage the girls to make the most of their feminine assets. The girls analyze their figures and hairdos, learn charm, and walk up and down the hall stairways to improve their posture.

Homeliving I is a course in which family and personal relationships are expressed by the girls. Home safety and child care are discussed in this class taught by Miss Shamlian and Mrs. Mansfield.

Homeliving II deals with interior decorating. The girls experiment with colors, furniture arrangement, architecture, and home accessories.

Miss Gulsvig and Mrs. Mansfield teach the Foods classess made up of boys and girls. In Foods I the students learn basic principles involved in nutrition and balanced meals. In Foods II advanced meal preparation is accomplished. The students are informed about marketing for correct foods economically.

For the chefs to be, International Foods is offered. The students learn about other countries through their foods. They also prepare the school lucheons, so there's no doubt that they're qualified cooks.

## The Industrial Arts Department, headed by Mr. Queiser, offers the boys of Wilson practical training and job information for mechanical jobs as well as theory and experience for professional engineers, architects, draftsmen and design specialists.

A favorite of all boys is Auto Mechanics taught by Mr. Minderman. Boys work with all car parts ranging from door handles to engines. In no time at all they can take a motor apart and repair the damage, and the car will be running like magic.


Mr. Lehmann teaches Electronics which contains vital information on electrical and electronic circuits. Boys experience the repairing of radios and televisions, and become acquainted with vacuum tube operated equipment.

Other electives in the field of industrial arts is Graphic Arts taught by Mr. Dietz, which includes printing, using set and linotype, silk screen process, wood block printing and photography. General Metals under Mr. Issacs teaches the use of metal forming machinery, foundery practice, sheet metal, and welding. Mechanical Drawing instructed by Mr. Lyons and Mr. Armstrong informs students of the language of industry which is drawing and reproducing of plans, known as blue prints. Mr. Queiser teaches Woodshop which concerns woodworking machinery and techniques for fabricating items of wood.

Girls, you are invited to enroll in Mechanical Drawing, Graphic Arts, Electronics, Woodshop or General Metals. Why not give one of them a try?

Vigorously working to strengthen and develop the muscles of boys at Wilson are Mr. Shea, Mr. Rueda, Mr. Quinn, Mr. Ingersoll, and Mr. Dalton, department head.

There are various sports in which the boys participate during their P.E. period. Cross Country, skill in running a a prescribed course, is a required activity. The entire length of the run is  $1\,1/2$  miles.

Less vigorous activities are basketball, football, and softball. Tumbling, trampoline, and weight lifting are also offered.

Also, boys go through a grueling battery of tests, which includes push-ups, sit-ups, rope climb, the man carry, pep board, and bar dip. The results from this battery determine what color group each individual will go into. The color groupings ranks from khaki, red, blue, green to gold and indicate increasing proficiency.




#### **Future Teachers**







#### Constitutional Committee Pushes Reform

The elections for student body office for the Spring term produced far-reaching results. A controversy developed over why one presidential candidate, Galen Norsworthy, was left out of a run-off election between John Lazarich and Travis Tatum, and why sloppy election procedures existed. The answer to these questions eventually led to the school Constitution.

The day after the controversy erupted, students of Mr. Talo's Public Speaking class debated the issues. Steve Baker suggested that the points made be brought to the attention of Mr. Knowles and the Executive Board. Next day Mr. Knowles welcomed Steve, Bill Rivas, Dan Baroni, Mike Bianco, Tim Fee, and Chris Estebez into his office for a talk.

The group made it clear that they and those who signed the petitions were not just supporters of the losing presidential candidates, but that many voted for the winner and merely disliked the clumsily manner in which the election was handled. Mr. Knowles encouraged the group to get to the heart of the matter and to go to the special meeting after school called by the Executive Board.

David Scuitto was chosen as an impartial moderator for this Board meeting. The atmosphere was tense as the petitioners listed their charges and demanded answers from the Board. Only partial answers were received.

At the next regular meeting of the Student Legislature, Acting Student Body President Nancy Hill accepted volunteers Steve Baker, Galen Norsworthy, Darryl Cox, John Ulrich, Dale Nelson, Tim Fee, and Ricky Mc-Donough to form a committee to rewrite the school Constitution.

The Committee labored hard and long in Room 235. By the first meeting of the Legislature in the Spring semester the proposed new Constitution was ready for debate. Debate kept student interest high and provided excellent parallels in teaching Civics classes about totalitarianism. It also led to the Constitutional Assembly, held on May 3, which demonstrated the issues to the entire student body.

Woodrow Wilson gridironers, led by All-City fullback Travis Tatum and aided by the passing of John Lazarich, finished the best season ever by winning five games and losing four. A 7-2 loss to Sacred Heart was the difference as the Warriors missed the playoffs by one game.

Travis developed into one of the league's top ground gainers, picking up 668 yards and placing third in that department. He had two great days as he banged his way for 112 yards against Poly and 115 yards against Mission in a game played in the mud. Travis was also one of the best linebackers in the city.

Robert Red frequently took off on long touchdown gallops. Against Lowell he received a kickoff and out-footed the Indians for 75 yards to score. Red literally covered the whole field as the Warriors opened the season by bouncing the Bucs 12-0. Red scored on a 30 yard pass from John Lazarich.

The Lowell contest featured a very controversial call by the officials and the Warriors were defeated 19 to 7.

After losing to S. I. 14-0, the Warriors took on Washington's Eagles and defeated them 12-6 with the help of a Lazarich to Red touchdown pass.

Wilson made it two in a row by "bombing" Poly 20-2, scoring three times in the first quarter. After taking a trouncing from the Lincoln Mustangs, the Warriors picked themselves up and beat Galileo 13-12 in a game featuring Ray Moore, a defensive guard, who intercepted a pass and returned it for a 40 yard touchdown. In a game highlighted by great defensive play, Wilson was on the bottom end of a 7-2 score against Sacred Heart. The Warriors finished their fine season by downing crosstown rival Mission 6-0 in a "Mud Bowl" contest. Thus Wilson's varsity achieved its first winning season.
















