Calistoga, Napa Co, P O 28 miles n w of Napa City. This is one of the most fashionable resorts on the Pacific Coast, celebrated alike for the valuable medicinal properties of its mineral springs and the comfort and elegance of its surroundings. It is beautifully located at the head of Napa Valley, 64 miles from San Francisco, and is the northern terminns of the Napa Valley Railroad. By this line Calistoga is made the center of trade and travel of an important section of country. Until 1874 the region was chiefly attractive as a resort for tourists in search of health and pleasure, the many medicinal springs of Napa, Lake and Sonoma counties, with the grand, romantic and strange scenery inviling visitors from all parts of the world. But recent discoveries of gold, silver, and quicksilver mines throughout the same romantic region have added greatly to the importance of the place as a business center. The Calistoga mine, on Mount St. Helena, a few miles from the town, has surprised the country with its wealth as well as with its occurrence in a range of mountains generally condemned as barren of the precious metals. Other gold and silver-bearing velns have since been discovered, and Calistoga, from being known only as a place of fashionable resort, or from its vineyards and whe cellars, will rank as a center of great mining industries, and advance in proportionate importance.
