THIS, the second town in size in the county, is situated in the extreme southern part, eleven miles from Woodland. Here the northern branch of the California Pacific, leaves the main line, running north to Woodland and Grafton. The town is in the center of a large and well developed farming district, and has a large portion of northern Solano tributary to its business interests. Fruit culture in the neighborhood, has become one of the paramount industries, many large orchards being located here. From 30,000 to 35,000 tons of grain are shipped annually from this point.

The town is enjoying a fair degree of progress, has good hotel accommodations (the Lillard House and the Gafford House, being both well kept hostleries) and a full quota of mercantile and mechanical establishments. The town has complete postal, express and telegraphic facilities. Population about 700.
