Sixth District—Is bounded on the south by Pine Street, on the north by Clay Street, on the west by Larkin Street and on the east by Kearny Street.

Seventh District—Is the triangle bounded by Market, Dupont and Pine streets.

Eighth District—Is bounded by Market Street on the south, Pine Street on the north, Larkin Street on the west and Dupont Street on the east.

North District—1s the triangle bounded by Second Street, Market Street and the Bay. Tenth District—1s bounded by the Bay, Har-

ris. Market and Second streets.

Eleventh District—Is an irregular space commencing at the foot of Harris Street, running along itarris to Market, along Market to Larkin, along Larkin to Bush, along Bush to the boundaries of the new county of San Mateo, and along this boundary to the place of beginning.

Twelith District—Is bounded by Bush Street on the south, the Bay on the north, the boundaries of the new county on the west and Leaven-

worth and Larkin streets on the east.
