charitable institutions so liberally sustained by the wealthy and benevolent, none is more worthy of support than this. The school will be free to all; yet it is expected of parents and guardians of children, who have the ability, to pay \$300 per annum; an allowance of \$250 for each pupil is provided for

The Legislature of the State, at the session of 1863, passed an act submitting to the people of the State, an act authorizing the issue of State bonds to the amount of \$75,000 for the completion and furnishing of this institution. The question was decided in the affirmative by a large majority, and the coming year will witness, no doubt, the completion of one of the most praiseworthy undertakings on this coast.
