COUNTY HOSPITAL.—South-west corner Fran-cisco and Stockton. Resident Physician, W. T. Garwood, M.D.; Visiting Surgeon, F. A. Holman, M.D.; Visiting Physician, A. G. Soule, M.D.; M. B. Pond, Apothecary; M. C. Bateman, Contractor P. Difference and Stateman, Contractor for Diet, etc. Average number of patients, 290; daily admission, 3. Deaths about 5 per cent. per annum. The situation of the building occupied by the hospital is salubrious and beautiful-on the shore of the North Beach, commanding an extensive view of the bay, immediately opposite Alcatraz and Angel islands, with the village of Sancelito and the picturesque head-lands of Marin County in the distance. The structure is of brick, and, with the recent additions, capable of accommodating 200 patients. The present charge on our citizens, for all purposes connected with the care and maintenance of the indigent sick, is but \$5,000 per month, as com-pared with \$16,143, the average monthly expendi-ture for three years prior to the consolidation of the government of the city and county. An allowance of \$6,000 is made for the support of a small pox hos-pital. In addition to those within the Hospital, there is an average of 500 outside patients yearly. The small-pox hospital is located on Islais Creek, Potrero Nuevo.

Whitney; Resident Physician; Dr. J. Lee. The Sisters took possession of this building December, 1861. The portion of it now erected is 123 feet on Bryant and 75 feet on First—four stories high. Cost Bryant and 75 feet on First-Jour stories and \$100,000. There are private rooms and wards to acconmodate one hundred and eighty patients. The portion erected is about one-half of the contemplated Hospital. Architect: Wm. Craine.

Its situation is equal if not superior to the heat particular of Long Mountain Compared and the tivation. Its situation is equal if not superior to the best portion of Lone Mountain Cemetery, and excels it in natural advantages for the improvement and ornamentation of family plots. The association has laid out and macadamized over two miles of road in the Cemetery; have spent some \$2,000 in excavat-ing for a public vault—said excavation being into solid rock, and so situated that it is entirely sheltered from wind.
