The PIONEER PAPER MILL is located on Paper Mill Creek, at Taylorville, Marin County, near the head of Tomales Bay, and about thirty miles from San Francisco. It was built in 1856-57 by the present proprietors, who, after encountering many serious obstacles, were enabled to exhibit in April, 1857, the first paper of California manufacture. The machinery is driven by the water power of Paper Mill Creek, which is, unlike most all other streams in California, never failing, owing to the nature of the surrounding country, by which the fogs usually rolling in from seaward are condensed, and supplies the sources of the river.

Its capacity has been increased from a two to a four engine mill, and capable of turning out 2,000 lbs. paper per diem. It is the intention of the proprietors to make various other improvements and enlargements, by which its capacity will be largely increased, required by the rapid prosperity of the Pacific coast. Already there has been upwards of \$130,000 expended on it, and a further expenditure of \$25,000 is in contemplation, which will place their mill in rank with the first class print mills of the Eastern States.

Its chief product is newspaper, but also manufactures manilla papers of an unsurpassed quality, besides a common article for laundry and other purposes.

It must be gratifying to all Californians, to observe the steady increase of Home Manufactures. Then, let the motto of all be—ENCOURAGE BY YOUR PATRONAGE,—and the time will soon come when we will be able to supply all our own wants, and the wants of the Pacific coast.
