## St. Ignatius' Church.

Served by the Fathers of the Society of Jesns, connected with St. Ignatins' College. Location, north side Market Street, between Fourth and Fifth streets. Masses: Sundays, at 5, 53, 64, 74, 8, 83, 94, and 104 o'clock, A.M.; Vespers at 74, P.M.; week days, 5, 52, 62, 74, and 8 o'clock, A.M. The old build-ing dedicated July 15th, 1855, being found too small for the profile increases. for the rapidly increasing congregation, the new Hall of the College is at present used as a Church, and accommodates about 3,000 persons. The church will afterwards he built on the site of the old one. The present portion of the institution, recently erected, cost about \$120,000.

## Notre Dame des Victoires.

Rev. FATHER MOLINIER, Pastor. Location, north side Bush, between Dupont and Stockton streets. Services at  $7\frac{1}{2}$ , A.M., every day. Sundays at 7 and 10 $\frac{1}{2}$ , A.M., also, Vespers at  $3\frac{1}{2}$ , P.M. The congregation was organized May, 1856, and its splendid edifice dedicated on the fourth of the same month. It has a ground base of fifty by one hundred feet, is a very beautiful and massive brick structure, and with its basement, which is in-tended for school rooms connected with the church, has a capacity of comfortably seating seven hundred persons.

## Mission Dolores.

Rev. THOMAS CUSHING, Pastor; Rev. Father Delmas, Assistant. Services at 8 and 10<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> o'clock, A.M., on Sundays and Festivals. This adobe church is located on the southwest corner of Sixteenth and Dolores street; was dedicated on the ninth of October, 1776, although projected in 1769, by Father Ju-nipero Serra, the Father of the California Missions. The first Friar who had charge was Francisco Palon, who was assisted in his labors by Benito Cambon. At the organization of this Mission, and for its protection, there were fifteen soldiers located at the Presidio, under the command of S. Flores. A come-tery is attached to the church, in which the first interment was made in September, 1776. The first Indian convert was baptized on the twenty-seventh December, in the same year. In the introductory portion of the Sam Francisco Directory for 1862, page 5, will be found further details connected with the history of this Mission. Attached to this church is a large day school.

#### St. Joseph's Church.

Rev. H. P. GALLAGHER, Pastor; residence, next door to the church. Location, Tenth Street, between Folsom and Howard. Services on Sundays and Festival days. Mass at 71, A.M.; High Mass at 102, A.M.; Catechism at 3, and Vespers at 7 o'clock, P.M. Mass, week days, at 7 o'clock, A.M. St. Joseph's Church week ground for divine service on the eighth Church was opened for divine service on the eighth day of December, 1861. The building is a neat and substantial one-story frame, sixty feet long by thirtyseven feet wide, and stands on the one hundred-vara lot donated by Horace Hawes, Esq., for the

future Cathedral of the Arch Diocese. The forementioned building, removed back for a school, has been replaced by a new editice, over thrice the size of the above. It is cruciform gothic, and elegantly finished. The new building is designed to be, as nearly ns possible, earthquake and panic proof, the ceiling being done in finely finished wood, and the large entrance door to slide on rollers. During the past year two side galleries and a transit pave have been added to the church.

#### St. Rose's Church.

Pastor-(Vacant). Attended from the Cathedral. Location, Bryant Street. Mass: Sundays, at 8 o'clock, A.M. St Rose's Church was dedicated on the Festival of Pentecost, June 8th, 1862. There is the restrival of Pentecost, June Sta, 1802. There is a vnc.ncy in the Pastorship, which will be in a short time filled. There is connected with the church a school for girls, in charge of the Sisters of St. Dom-inic, which contained, within one month after its establishment, one hundred and fifty-six pupils. There are now more than three hundred girls in regular attendance.

# St. Bridget's Church.

Rev. MANES DUGGAN, Pastor; Rev. Hyacinth Denham, Assistant. Residence, rear of church. Lo-cation, southwest corner Van Ness Avenne and Broadway. The building occupied by this church Broadway. The building occupied by this church was completed in February, 1864. It is a one-story wooden structure, forty by seventy-six feet, erected upon a valuable lot purchased by Archbishop Alemany, at a cost of  $\$_{3},000$ . Services, Sundays, 8 and  $10\frac{1}{2}$ , A.M., and  $7\frac{1}{2}$ , P.M.; week days, 7, A.M. The services for the burial of the dead at Calvary Cemetery, is attended by the clergymen of St. Bridget's Church, from 3 to 5, P.M., from March to October and frau  $2^{1}$  to 4 P.M. from November to October, and from  $2\frac{1}{2}$  to 4, P.M., from November to April. St. Bridget's Church is the first established in the Western Addition. Services first held in February, 1864.
