Mission Dolores.

Rev. THOMAS CUSHING, Pastor. Services at 8 and 10½ o'clock, A.M., on Sundays and Festivals. This adobe church is located on the southwest corner of Sixteenth and Dolores streets; was dedicated on the ninth of October, 1776, although projected in 1769, by Father Junipero Serra, the Father of the California Missions. The first Friar who had charge was Francisco Palou, who was assisted in his labors by Benito Cambon. At the organization of this Mission, and for its protection, there were fifteen soldiers located at the Presidio, under the command of S. Flores. A cemetery is attached to the church, in which the first interment was made in September, 1776. The first Indian convert was baptized on the twenty-seventh December, in the same year. In the introductory portion of the San Francisco Directory for 1862, page 5, will be found further details connected with the history of this Mission. Attached to this church is a large day school.

St. Joseph's Church.

Rev. H. P. GALLAGHER, Pastor; residence, next door to the church. Location, Tenth Street, between Folsom and Howard. Services on Sundays and Festival days. Masses: Sundays at 6½, 8 and 10½ A.M.; Catechism at 2½, and Vespers at 7 o'clock, A.M.; Mass week days at 6½ o'clock, A.M. St. Joseph's Church was opened for divine service on the eighth day of December, 1861. The building is a neat and substantial one-story frame, sixty feet long by thirty-seven feet wide, and stands on the one hundred-vara lot donated by Horace Hawes, Esq., for the future Cathedral of the Arch Diocese. The forementioned building, removed back for a school, has been replaced by a new edifice, over thrice the size of the above. It is cruciform gothic, and elegantly finished. The new building is designed to be, as nearly as possible, earthquake and panic proof, the ceiling being done in finely finished wood, and the large entrance door to slide on rollers. During the past year two side galleries and a transit pave have been added to the church.

St. Rose's Church.

Pastor—(Vacant.) Attended from the Cathedral. Location, Brannan Street near Fourth. Mass: Sundays, at 8 o'clock, A.M. St. Rose's Church was dedicated on the Festival of Pentecost, June 8th, 1862. There is a vacancy in the Pastorship, which will be in a short time filled. There is connected with the church a school for girls, in charge of the Sisters of St. Dominic, which contained, within one month after its establishment, one hundred and fifty-six pupils. There are now more than three hundred girls in regular attendance.

St. Bridget's Church.

Rev. B. M. DOOGAN, O. P., Pastor; Rev. P. Callahan, O. P., Assistant. Residence, rear of church. Location, southwest corner Van Ness Avenue and Broadway. The building occupied by this church was completed in February, 1864. It is a one-story wooden structure, forty by seventy-six feet, erected upon a valuable lot purchased by Archbishop Alemany, at a cost of \$5,000. Services, Sundays, 8 and 10½ A.M., and 7 P.M.; week days 7 A.M. The services for the burial of the dead at Calvary Cemetery, is attended by the clergymen of St. Bridget's Church, from 3 to 5 P.M., from March to October, and from 2½ to 4 P.M., from November to April. St. Bridget's Church is the first established in the Western Addition. Services first held in February, 1864.

St. Peter's Church.

Location, west side of Columbia Street between Twenty-fourth and Twenty-fifth. Rev. JOSEPH A. GALLAGHER, Pastor; residence west side of Tenth, near Folsom.

Services, on Sundays, at 8 and 10½ A.M. Sunday School, at 9½ A.M.

Chapels.

In addition to the services held at the different Roman Catholic Churches throughout the city, religious exercises take place regularly at the following institutions: Presentation Convent Chapel, Powell Street; St. Mary's Hospital Chapel, Brannan Street; Magdalen Asylum Chapel, San Bruno Road; St. Mary's College Chapel, San José Road, and St. Joseph's Infant Asylum, Bay View Turnpike.

Church of the New Jerusalem.

Rev. JOHN DOUGHTY, Pastor; residence, 1328 Polk.

Public services held every Sabbath Morning at 11 o'clock, in the church on O'Farrell Street, between Mason and Taylor. Administration of the sacrament of the Lord's Supper, at the same place, at the close of the morning's service, on the Sundays next succeeding the second Mondays in January, April, July and October. Meetings for instructions in the life and doctrine of the church every Thursday evening, at 7½ o'clock, at the same place. Sabbath School (Dr. A. Kellogg, Superintendent) every Sunday, at 12½ o'clock, P.M.

This society was organized February 15th, 1852. It has recently erected upon an eligible lot on O'Farrell Street, measuring fifty-five feet front by one hundred and thirty-seven feet deep, a very neat church edifice in the Gothic style, capable of seating about three hundred and fifty persons, and at a total expense, including lot and church, of a little over twelve thousand dollars. The seats are entirely free to the public.

There is a library connected with the church, containing all the theological and nearly all the scientific books of Swedenborg, both in English and Latin, and a large number of collateral works by various authors, explanatory of the New Church faith, which is free to all who desire to inform themselves concerning this peculiar religious system. Rev. HORATIO STEBBINS, Pastor. Location, south side Geary street, below Stockton. Services Sunday at 11 A.M., and 7½ P.M. Sabbath School, Sunday at 9½ A.M.

This Society was organized September 1st, 1850. The first edifice owned by the Society was erected in 1852, on Stockton Street, between Clay and Sacra-
