

This church was organized January 1st, 1866, by the Rev. J. T. Cooper, D.D., with thirty-eight members; it now numbers about two hundred. It uses the metrical version of the Psalms of David in praise. It is sustained entirely on the voluntary system, pews free.

Services are held every Sabbath at eleven o'clock A.M., and half-past seven o'clock P.M. Sabbath School at half-past nine o'clock A.M.

Location south side of Fell Street between Octavia and Laguna. Rev. ROBERT SCRINGEOR, Pastor; residence east side of Octavia Street nr Fell.

Services every Sabbath at eleven o'clock A.M., and forty-five minutes past seven o'clock P.M.

Howard Street Presbyterian Church.

Location east side of Howard Street between Twenty-first and Twenty-second. Rev. SYLVESTER WOODBRIDGE, D. D., Pastor; residence west side of Valencia Street nr Twenty-third.

Services every Sabbath at eleven o'clock A.M. and seven o'clock P.M.

St. John's Presbyterian Church.

Location north side of Post Street between Mason and Taylor, Rev. W. A. SCOTT, Pastor; residence 521 Post Street.

This church was organized March 6th, 1870, in Pacific Hall, by the Presbytery of San Francisco, with fifty-eight communing members. The number at present is two hundred and twenty. Soon after its organization the congregation purchased their present beautiful place of worship from the St. James' Episcopal Parish, for the sum of \$45,000, and have since expended \$20,000 for improvements, making the total cost \$65,000.

The Sabbath School connected with the church has five hundred members, and a library containing six hundred and seventy-five volumes, with numerous diagrams of Bible places and scenes.

Olivet Presbyterian Church.

Location, Tennessee Street near Sierra, South San Francisco. Rev. R. G. MCCARTHY, Pastor; residence, 6 Powell Street.

This church is built on a lot of land having fifty feet frontage on Tennessee Street by a depth of one hundred feet, presented by E. A. Lawrence, Esq.; the cost of church building was \$1,500; \$1,000 of which was contributed by the Board of Church Extension of New York, \$2,800 by the neighboring inhabitants, leaving a debt of \$700 which the members hope will be shortly liquidated. The church affords sittings for two hundred and fifty. Service every alternate Sabbath morning at 11 A. M., and evening at 7 P. M.

Sabbath School every Sabbath at half-past nine A. M. Erwin Smith, Superintendent. Connected with the school is a good library of five hundred volumes.

Memorial Presbyterian Church.

Location, South San Francisco on Eighteenth Avenue near Railroad Avenue. Pastor, Rev. R. G. MCCARTHY; residence, 6 Powell Street.

The Memorial Presbyterian Church was incorporated March 23, 1871, and a lot of ground 50x100 feet on Eighteenth Avenue given by Elijah Case and Messrs. Thornton & Williams. The church is neat and accommodates one hundred and fifty, and built at a cost of \$5,000; \$1,000 of which was contributed by the Board of Church Erection of New York, and the balance by neighboring inhabitants and friends of the church. Service every alternate Sabbath morning at 11 A. M., and evening at 7.30 P. M.

A Sabbath School is in process of organization.

First German Presbyterian Mission.

Present place of worship German Church, 524 Greenwich Street, Rev. F. Fox, Pastor; residence rear of the church.

This Mission was started by the Rev. F. Fox, on the first day of June, 1871, and is sustained by subscriptions from the liberal members of the American Presbyterian congregations in this city, the Rev. W. A. Scott being its main support.

A Sabbath School of two hundred scholars and teachers meet in the same building at half past nine o'clock A. M.

ROMAN CATHOLIC.

St. Mary's Cathedral.

Location northeast corner California and Dupont streets. Most Rev. JOSEPH S. ALEMANY, Archbishop; Very Rev. James Croke, V. G., Rev. J. Prendergast, Rector; Rev. William A. Speckles, and Rev. M. Slattery, Assistants; Rev. R. P. Brennan, Secretary; Archi-Episcopal and pastoral residence, California Street, adjoining the Cathedral.

The erection of this noble structure was commenced on the seventeenth of July, 1853, during which year the basement portion was built, and the work was resumed the July following. Dedicated December 25th, 1854. The church is seventy-five feet wide, fronting on California Street, by one hundred and thirty-one feet on Dupont Street, being the largest church in the State. Service was begun at midnight on December 24th, 1854. The basement portion is lighted from both sides, and well ventilated. The present expenditure for the building is \$175,000. The church portion is fifty-five feet high in the clear, and contains spacious galleries, and an organ loft. The ceilings are vaulted with a series of groined arches which are decorated, and every means have been resorted to for accommodation, light and ventilation. The church can seat twelve hundred persons. The tower is at present one hundred and thirty five feet high, and when completed with a spire, will be two hundred feet high. The edifice is of Gothic architecture, which has been carried out in every detail through the building. In all the arrangements for the erection of the church, the greatest attention has been paid to the selection of the best material, and to the combination of strength and durability, which are admirably effected in its construction.
