MOKELUMNE is a flourishing village, situated on the line of the Central Pacific Railroad about fourteen miles north of the city of Stockton, and about thirty-five miles south of Sacramento, the Capital of the State, and is surrounded by an extensive farming country. The first house was erected at Mokelumne in August, 1849. Since then it has grown rapidly, until, at the present time, about one hundred buildings are embraced within its limits. A church building is now being erected under the auspices of the M. E. Church, which will soon be completed. Its dimensions are thirty by sixty-five feet, twenty feet story—Roman style of architecture.
