SAN JOSE, the beautiful, is the home of wealth and refinement, well deserving its appellation. It is the county seat of Santa Clara county, and has a population of ten thousand, which is rapidly increasing. The public buildings are many and are tastefully constructed. The Court House is the best of its class in the State, and visitors are attracted to its lofty dome from which a most delightful view can be obtained of almost the entire valley and the Bay of San Francisco. Eleven churches ornament the city, and indicate the devotional character of the people. Two or three religious societies hold meetings in public halls and school houses. Seven fine school buildings have been erected in addition to the colleges and private schools. The convent of Notre Dame for young ladies, is celebrated throughout the State. The various convent buildings were erected at a cost of over \$500,000. The State Normal School building, now in course of construction, will be a beautiful edifice, with a frontage of one hundred and seventy-two feet. The new building of the University of the Pacific, an institution under the control of the Methodist Church, is situated between San Jose and Santa Clara, and will be an additional ornament to the beautiful avenue known as "The Alameda." San Jose has societies of Masons, Odd Fellows, Sons of Temperance, Good Templars, three benevolent societies, two daily and three weekly newspapers, three banks, forty-one lawyers, thirty-two physicians, etc. It possesses in addition to these, foundries, flouring mills and other manufacturing establishments. The city is watered
