

HAMILTON.—This place is the county seat of White Pine County, and is situated about 126 miles south of Palisade, at which place passengers may connect by stage with the Central Pacific Rail Road for further journeying. This is an incorporated city and principal town of Eastern Nevada. It has now less than one half of its former inhabitants; it having had at one time upwards of 5000. It was located in '68 on what is known as Treasure Hill, and was soon filled with adventurers of all classes. With the partial cessation of mining operations, the towns in this vicinity declined in population, but owing to rich mines still unworked the permanency of Hamilton though threatened, was not seriously affected. For so new a place, the churches and schools are remarkably well maintained. One paper, a large and handsome sheet, under the title of the *White Pine News*, is published here daily. The stage line above mentioned, under the proprietorship of Messrs. Woodruff & Ennor, can hardly be left without a notice of which it is well worthy. By the exertions of these enterprising proprietors the route is made pleasant and convenient. The road being supplied with best of outfits in the way of first class Concord coaches and good teams, quick time is made, which is both pleasant and profitable to passengers and those awaiting the arrival of the mail and express.
