- CHICO.—Chico, the largest town in Butte County, is distant from Oroville, the county seat, twenty-five miles in a north-westerly direction; is connected with that place by stage. The Oregon Division of the Central Pacific Railroad, passes through this place, thereby connecting it with Sacramento, which can be reached in three hours. During the summer a weekly line of steamers is run between the two places, on the Sacramento River, from whence Chico is distant six miles; but during the winter months it becomes necessary for a daily line to be plied, for the transportation of grain and other produce. Agriculture has been the chief source of support of the people of Chico, but recently, that is within three or four years past, a new interest has become of importance, that of the lumber trade, the lumber being of fine quality and commanding a ready sale. Placer and hydraulic mining is carried on in the neighborhood, and that of the latter at Cherokee Flat, (twenty-two miles distant, are quite extensive. There is one weekly newspaper published here, The Northern Enterprise.
