GERMAN GENERAL BENEVOLENT SOCIETY OF SAN FRANCISCO (styled in German, Die Allgemeine Deutsche Unuerstuetzungs, Geeslischaft) so neof the largest and most efficient charitable institutions in this State. It was organized on the seventh of January, 1854, with one hundred and five members, and has rapidly increased, until now it numbers nineteen hundred and thirty-two city members, and two hundred and fifty in the interior.

Only Germans and persons speaking German are admitted to membership. The chief purpose of the association is mutual assistance in case of sickness, and when sick every member has a right to demand sup-

admitted to membership. The chief purpose of the association is mutual assistance in case of sickness, and when sick every member has a right to demand suport and medical attendance from the society. The society has a second purpose of doing charity to Germans not members of the association, and especially to German immigrants newly arrived. The society has a hospital situated on Brannan Street near Third, built of brick, two stories high, with a basement, one hundred and twelve and one half feet front, fifty feet deep, with a wing in the rear of twenty-three feet front, two hundred and twelve feet deep, furnished with steam, sulphur, hot and cold water and shower baths, and other conveniences for the treatment of the sick. The wards are smaller than any other hospital in the city, so that not many patients are put together in a room. The lot upon which the hospital is built is one hundred and thirty-seven feet six inches wide by two hundred and seventy-five feet long, the whole surrounded by a high fence and cultivated in a fine gardon, a part planted with ornamental flowers and shrukes, and a part with kitchen vegetables. The property of the society including the control of the society control of the society are controlly purchased, bounded by Sanchez, Noe, Dale and Vale streets, valued at \$12,000.
