March 23, 1851. In July of the same year the erection of a wooden edifice was commenced, and completed the following September. It was occupied in part for a school, and a portion was temporarily used as a church, under the pastoral charge of the Rev. John Maginnis.

On August 18, 1852, the asylum was taken in charge by the Sisters of Charity. In 1854 a capacious brick building was erected on Market Street, near Third, at a cost of \$45,000. In 1864 an additional brick edifice was erected for a school, which was attended by several hundred day

In 1862 a farm of fifty-three acres, near Bay View, Sonth San Francisco, was purchased, where there has been established a branch institution for very young children, called the St. Joseph's Infant Asylum. On this same tract of land there has been recently erected a large and commodious wooden edifice with all the modern conveniences, to which the children have been removed from the Market Street Building, which property was sold in June, 1872. The present building is heautifully located on a hill, commanding an extensive view of the surrounding country. It covers an area of two hundred and four by two hundred and eighty-two feet, including an open center court, measuring eighty by one hundred and fortyfour feet. It will accommodate about eight hundred
