Treasurer, four thousand dollars per annum. Deputies: Chief Deputy, two hundred and fifty dollars per month.—[Amendments April 4, 1863, and March 4, 1870.] Additional Deputy, one hundred and seventy-five dollars per month.—[Amendments April 4, 1863, and March 4, 1870.] Clerk to attend to Street Assessment Funds, one hundred and fifty dollars per month. County Recorder, four thousand dollars per annum. Deputies: Chief Deputy, two hundred and fifty dollars per month.—[Amendments April 26, 1862, and April 4, 1870.] Two additional Deputies, one hundred and fifty dollars per month each.—[Amendments April 4, 1863, and March 26, 1868.] Porter, seventy-five dollars per month. The Recorder may also employ as nany Deputy Clerks as he may deem necessary to duly perform the duties of his office, and they shall be paid at the rate of twelve cents per folio of one hundred words for all matters after registered or copied by them respectively. The Recorder or his Chief Deputy, when any apers are presented for registration or to be copied, shall write on the margin of each paper so presented the number of folios paid for; and shall in his monthly return to the Treasurer, cerify under oath the number of folios copied or registered by each one of said Deputy Clerks; and such certificate of the Recorder or his Chief Deputy shall be conclusive evidence to authorize he Auditor to audit such certified accounts of such Deputy Clerks, monthly.

The provisions relative to the salaries of the officers (and the organization thereof) of the Fire Department have been superseded by the Act of March 2, 1866, and the amendments hereto, March 4, 1870, April 1, 1872, and March 30, 1874.—[See Supplemental Acts II and III,

Policemen, not exceeding one hundred and fifty—the number o be determined from time to time by order of the Board of Supervisors—one hundred and wenty-five dollars per month each [Act March 23, 1872]: provided, that one of the same letailed to act as Property Clerk in the office of Chief of Police, to be appointed by him, shall eccive one hundred and fifty dollars per month. The Chief of Police may detail a regular Police Officer to act as his Clerk, who shall receive the same salary as the Property Clerk. The District Attorney, * * * * not being relieved from the obligation to attend per-onally in said Court (Police) whenever business of importance shall require his assistance. No ompensation shall be allowed to School Directors; and no fees or compensation, to be paid out f the City and County Treasury, other than those expressly allowed in this Act, shall be llowed or received by any officer of said city and county, or of any district; nor shall any llowance or provision be made for them, or any of them, at the public expense, beyond the ixed compensation aforesaid, under the name of office rent, + fuel, light, stationery, contingenies, or otherwise, except that the necessary and proper books, stationery, and official blanks nay, at the discretion of the Board of Supervisors, be purchased and supplied for the Police Court, Court of Sessions [abolished; see Amendment State Constitution, 1862, Art. VI], Grand uries, and offices of the County Clerk, County Recorder, Auditor, Treasurer, Assessor, Superntendent of Streets and Highways, and the Board of Supervisors; the expense whereof, when he amount in each particular case shall have been previously authorized and fixed by the Board f Supervisors, may be paid out of the General Fund, upon demands upon the treasury, duly udited as provided in this Act: provided, that the total amount of expenditures for all of the foresaid books, stationery, and official blanks, shall not exceed the sum of twenty-five hundred ollars in any one year.
