

et April 4, 1864.] To pay rent for Harbor Police Office a sum not to exceed fifty dollars per month.—[Act March 30, 1872.]

Porters City Hall.—To allow and order paid out of the General Fund, to the Porter of the City Hall of said city and county, a sum not to exceed ninety dollars per month in lieu of the salary now allowed to him by law.—[Amendment April 4, 1864.] To appoint an additional Assistant Porter for the City Hall of said city and county, after the same shall be enlarged, and allow and order paid out of the General Fund a salary to him not exceeding the sum of seventy-five dollars per month.—[Amendment April 4, 1864.] To appoint a Janitor for the City Hall at a salary of seventy-five dollars per month.—[Act March 9, 1870.]

Prison Wagon.—To procure a strongly-built covered spring wagon, capable of seating twelve persons, also two horses and harness, etc., to be used under the direction of said Sheriff and exclusively in the transportation of prisoners and insane persons, and to allow and order paid out of the General Fund, fifty (\$50) dollars per month to the Sheriff, which shall be full satisfaction for the keeping and maintaining said horses.—[Act March 9, 1870.]

Protection of the Public.—To require by ordinance, all contractors for street work, or other persons lawfully undertaking to improve, grade, or alter streets or public highways in the City and County of San Francisco, to erect fences or other suitable barriers to protect the public from damage, loss, or accident, by reason of such grading, alteration, or improvement, and to determine and prescribe the fines and penalties that shall be incurred for breach of such regulations and ordinances as may be passed by virtue hereof.—[Act April 25, 1863.]

Public Buildings.—To transfer from the General Fund, to the Building Fund, five thousand dollars, for the purpose of making repairs and alterations to the public buildings.—[Act March 1876.]

Public Grounds.— * * * excepting an allowance of two thousand dollars per annum, heretofore provided by law for inclosing, improving, and regulating all public grounds in said city and county.—[Act April 4, 1863.]

Public Pound.—To order constructed a common pound for all estrays, and to provide for taking up and impounding of all animals running at large within the streets of said city and county, north of Johnston Street and east of Larkin Street [jurisdiction extended over the entire limits of the City and County of San Francisco; Act May 14, 1861]: *provided*, the cost of the construction of said pound shall not exceed five hundred dollars, which sum, or so much thereof as may be necessary, may be paid out of the General Fund by order of said Board of Supervisors. The said Board shall have power to make all needful rules and regulations necessary for the proper management and control of said pound, and may appoint one or more Pound Keepers, who shall be paid out of the fines imposed and collected of the owners of any animals impounded, and from no other source.—[Act April 23, 1858.] To allow and pay out of the General Fund a sum not to exceed five hundred dollars per annum, for deficiency in the salary of the Pound Keeper in said city and county.—[Act April 4, 1864.]

Railroads.—To have the power and authority to restrict all railroad companies, in laying down their tracks along the streets of said city and county, to a space of not more than ten feet on each side of the center of such street or streets; and for a violation of such restriction the Board is hereby granted the power to prescribe and enforce such penalties as they may deem just and proper.—[Act March 21, 1868.]

Real and Personal Property Taxes.—To legalize and confirm the assessment upon real and personal property for the twenty-fourth, twenty-fifth, and twenty-sixth fiscal years, and the ordinances of the Board of Supervisors for the collection of the same. To enforce the provisions of the act, special counsel shall be employed.—[Act April 1, 1876.]

Sanitary Measures.—For the purpose of more effectually securing the sanitary purposes of the Act approved March 27, 1874, to which this Act is supplemental, and of abating the nuisance created by the lands therein referred to, the Board of Supervisors are authorized to proceed immediately to fill the lots referred to in subdivision four, section two, of the original Act, including streets and street crossings, so that the surface when filled shall not be less than the heights therein specified. The expense of such filling to be paid out of the General Fund of the city and county. As soon as said filling is completed, said Board shall proceed to advertise and sell said lots at auction, the proceeds from which to be paid into the General Fund.—[Act February 28, 1876.]

Sergeant-at-Arms.—To appoint a Sergeant-at-Arms who shall have the same power as is conferred upon Police Officers, to attend meetings of the Board, to serve notices, subpoenas, and to perform such other duties as may be required, at a salary not to exceed one hundred dollars per month.—[Act March 30, 1872.]

Sewerage.—To appropriate from the general fund ten thousand dollars to prepare a comprehensive and intelligent system of sewerage for that portion of the City and County of San Francisco where the grades have been established, and for making surveys and preparing a map showing the size and materials of all sewers constructed and to be constructed by order of the Board of Supervisors, and for reporting upon the mode to be adopted to secure ventilation of sewers, with plans and rules as to the construction and connections of private sewers with the public sewers, etc.—[Act March 16, 1876.]

* The Sheriff is authorized to appoint a driver at a salary of seventy-five dollars per month.—[Act March 9, 1870.]
