CHURCHES.

BAPTIST.

First Baptist Church.

Location, north side of Eddy Street between Jones and Avenworth. Rev. E. B. HULBERT, Pastor; residence, Post Street.

This church was organized in June, 1849, under the efforts of its first Pastor, Rev. O. C. Wheeler. The society purchased a lot on Washington Street between Dupont and Stockton in the spring of that year for the sum of \$10,000, and erected a wooden edifice thereon. It was dedicated in August, 1849, and was the first Protestant house of worship erected in California. Mr. Wheeler's pastorate ended November, 1850. He was succeeded by the Rev. B. B. Lerly in May, 1852, who officiated until May, 1858. In July, 1859, Rev. D. B. Cheney was called to the pastorate, and continued in charge until 1867, when he was forced to resign on account of ill-health. After his resignation, Rev. C. A. Buckbee officiated as pastorate supply until the arrival of Rev. J. B. Thomas, February, 1868, who continued in charge until December, 1868, when he also was compelled by ill-health to resign. The Rev. A. R. Edbury took charge in November, 1870, and officiated until June 1, 1872. During the summer of 1857 a substantial brick edifice was erected on the site of the old edifice, in which the congregation worshipped until the summer of 1875, when the lot and building was sold for the sum of \$29,500, and the erection of the present place of worship immediately commenced. Services were first held in the vestry of this building the second Sunday in January, 1876. While the edifice was being erected the congregation worshipped in Washington Hall.

Number of communicants, two hundred and ninety-two. The Sabbath School has an average attendance of about two hundred and fifty. The library contains about nineteen hundred volumes.

Sabbath services morning and evening. Sabbath School at half-past twelve o'clock p.m. Prayer Meeting every Wednesday and Friday evenings; Church Covenant Meeting the Friday evening preceding the first Sabbath in each month.

From this church the Columbia Square Baptist Church was organized, December, 1862; the Tabernacle Baptist Church, December, 1865; the San Pablo Baptist Church, February, 1867, and the Fifth Baptist Church, Sept. 1869.

Metropolitan Baptist Church.

Location, north side of Post Street, between Hyde and Larkin. Rev. ISAAC S. KALLOCH, Pastor; residence, 2314 Mission Street.

The Tabernacle Baptist Church (now Metropolitan) was organized November 23, 1865, with forty-five members, and duly recognized by a Council of Baptist churches December 12, 1865. Its church edifice was dedicated August 20, 1865. It is of plain exterior, but very attractive within, having a seating capacity for three hundred and fifty persons. On the call of its present Pastor, it changed its original name of The Tabernacle, and adopted instead that of The Metropolitan Baptist Church, March 3, 1875. At this time it invited the Columbia Square Baptist Church, worshipping on Russ Street, to unite with it under the pastorate of Mr. Kalloch. This invitation was accepted, and the consolidated body commenced services April 1, 1875, as one people. The first steps for the organization of the Columbia Square Baptist Church were taken in 1860, when Dr. Cheney's congregation established a Mission interest in the Nonantum School House on Third Street, near Bryant. The Sunday School was under the superintendence of H. H. Heath. After several changes, a lot was purchased on Fifth Street, corner of Jessie, and a church erected and organized December 22, 1862, where the congregation worshipped until the spring of 1869, when they erected a new edifice on Russ Street, between Howard and Folsom. Rev. H. A. Sawtelle was the first Pastor, who continued to officiate until October, 1866, when he retired from his pastoral charge and established the Union Square Baptist Church. Rev. C. R. Hendrickson, for several years Pastor at Stockton, was called by the congregation to fill the vacancy. He entered upon his duties on the first of January, 1867, and resigned June 15, 1870. The Rev. D. S. Watson, of Pittsfield, Mass., was unanimously called by the church to the pastorate January, 1871, and continued in charge until his decease, December 27, 1872. Neither house of worship, hitherto occupied by these churches is sufficiently large to accommodate the increased attendance, and a larger edifice in a suitable location is contemplated.

Services on Sundays at eleven o'clock a.m., and half past seven o'clock p.m. Prayer Meetings on Wednesdays at half past seven o'clock. Sabbath School numbers one hundred and fifty, with five hundred volumes in the library. Meets at half past twelve o'clock p.m.
