SAN FRANCISCO FEMALE HOSPITAL,—Located 917 Clay Street. This hospital was opened for the reception of patients on the first day of April, 1868. The object of the institution is the care of poor, sick women. There is no rule as to the nativity, religion, or social condition. It is a charity in the broadest sense of the term. Any woman who is poor and sick is entitled to share its benefits. It is a general hospital for all diseases, and for lying-in. During the eight years it has been open, there have been over six hundred births; of the whole number of births over fifty per cent have been illegitimate, showing conclusively the need of such an institution, as, if it were not for this hospital, the probabilities are that the greater number would have shared the fate of so many thousands of innocents nurdered in their mother's womh. There have been besides a large number of patients admitted for general disease. During the exist-ence of the hospital there have been but thirty deaths, nostly from that scourge of our race—consumption. There have also been a very large number of outside patients treated, the physician and surgeon being in tendance every morning from ten to eleven o'clock to reat any poor persons who may come. It was supported by voluntary contributions until 1870, when the State appropriated \$5,000 a year for its support. The Hospital is under the care of Dr. C. B. Hutchins.
