SAN FRANCISCO PORT SOCIETY .- Organized March, 1860. Objects: The moral improvement of seamen, and others connected with the sea, in this port, by aiding the American Seaman's Friend Society of New York in sus-taining the Mariners' Church of San Francisco, and in such enterprises connected therewith as the society may approve. The society is organized and sustained on the approach the society is organized and sustained on the principle that it belongs properly to the people of Cal-ifornia to provide religious privileges and instructions for the sailors belonging to and visiting this port. Any person may become a member by paying \$5 a year, or a life member by the payment at one time of \$50. In 1866 they erected a fine house of worship for the

seamen of this port, on the corner of Sacramento and Drumm streets, at a cost, for lot and house, of more than \$20,000, the larger part of which was contributed for the \$20,000, the larger part of which was contributed for the purpose by citizens of San Francisco and others, and 80,000, the balance, was raised by loan secured by mort-gage on the lot. This has since been paid and the Society is now free from debt.

For the attainment of the foregoing objects, there shall be provided and maintained: A library and bath rooms, free to all members of this association. A reading room, free to all members of this association. A reading room, well supplied with current literature, daily, weekly, pic-torial, seenlar, and religions papers, free to all such as conform to the rules and regulations issued by the Board of Managers from time to time. There shall also be pro-vided, in as many be available, plain, clean, and suitable sociation as may be available, plain, clean, and suitable beds and clothing, etc., for the temporary accommodation of such needy persons as may be deemed worthy. The library contains upward of four thousand volumes. There is also a gymnasium connected with the institution.

A Prayer Meeting, to which all are invited, is held at the rooms every Saturday evening, from eight to nine o'clock; also a Daily Prayer Meeting, from quarter past twelve o'clock to one o'clock r. M. Bible Class, on Monday evenings at half past seven o'clock.

The association has a large and handsome building on Sutter Street, between Kearny and Dupont. The free reading rooms are open every day from eight o'clock A.M. to half past nine o'clock F.M.
