The Rev. J. M. Caldwell was the first Paster con-nected with this Church, and was succeeded by the Rev. William C. Bartlett-services then being held in the hall southeast corner of Green and Dupont streets. The church was organized February 1865, with a membership of twenty-six persons. The building occupied by the society is of wood, and is neatly finished. It has an organ worth \$2,000. The edifice cost about \$5,000, exclusive of the amount (\$5,000) paid for the lot. The dedication services occurred in March, 1865.
