INTRODUCTORY.

N PLACING this, the first volume of the CROCKER-LANGLEY SAN FRANCISCO DIRECTORY, in the hands of its patrons, the publishers do so confident that it will meet the requirements of a large portion of the public, and are satisfied to let it rest on its merits as a work of its class, feeling certain that no more appropriate introduction could be offered than the assurance that nothing has been neglected on their part to secure the utmost thoroughness and accuracy.

The Street Guide is compiled entirely from reliable and authentic sources, and, owing to the many changes lately made by the Supervisors in the names of small streets, we have deemed it advisable to give both the old and new names of such streets and alleys.

Our Business Directory has been very carefully compiled, and we think we have succeeded in producing one that contains but very few errors, if any at all.
